SIR JOHN MACDONALD has arrived at Ottawa. As a result of his successful negotiations, he is reported to be in fine spirits.

ACCORDING to an Ottawa despatch the imports for August were \$8,443,757; duty, \$1,690,554. The duty for the corresponding month last year was \$1,276,311. The exports for August, 1880, were 11,569,899.

THE Right Hon. Hugh C. E. Childers, Secretary of War, is in Ireland for the purpose of personally inspecting the country and obtaining information as to its condition. It is good to hear of statesmen trying to learn something definite about the country they are called upon to govern.

At a banquet recently given in his honor, the Postmaster General, speaking of the Pacific Railway, is reported to have said that the arrangements which had been entered into by the Syndicate meant the carrying out of Sir John's original plan, and stipulated that the road from one end to the other would be completed by 1890. He further remarked that the details of the contract with the Pacific Railway Syndicate would be submitted to Parliament for ratification in a few weeks, perhaps in a few days. This announcement is as important, as it is satisfactory.

THE following is a comparative statement of vessels and tonnage at Quebec from sea in 1879 and 1880 up to 24th of Sept:— 1879—601 vessels; 447,163 tons. 1880—727 vessels; 574,063 tons.

THE following is the number of ocean steamers arrived at Quebec up to this date and to the corresponding date last year:— 1879—150 steamers; 234,540 tons. 1880—209 steamers; 324,192 tons.

THE Montreal Gazette says: "We remember no event that has brought so many buyers into the city as that of the present Exhibition, and to all appearances the wholesale trade has derived considerable benefit therefrom, while the retail trade has reaped a rich harvest. In dry goods, business has seldom been brisker, and an unusually large volume of transactions has been reported by the wholesale grocers. Hardware merchants have likewise done an unexpectedly good business, as have also boot and shoe manufacturers. In some descriptions of oils an extensive business has been done at a considerable advance. Drugs and chemicals have shared in the 'boom,' as well as have most other departments of trade. The fall trade is progressing admirably. Remittances continue very good, and trade generally is in a much better condition than at this time last year."

AMONG the number who took passage for Montreal, on Wednesday last, were Mr. Hector A. McDonald, of Belfast, Mr. Archd. McLeod, of Orwell, and Mr. Alex. McNeill, of West River. The two first-named young gentlemen being matriculated students at McGill, belonging to the graduating class for 1881, and are now returning to resume their work, while the latter, who for some time past has been studying medicine with Dr. Taylor, of this city, is about to enter the above named College to further prosecute his studies. It will be remembered that the names of Messrs. McDonald and McLeod stood forth quite prominently at the last examination of McGill. We hope to see them fully equal to their work this year, and have every reason to believe that they will have the pleasure of seeing their names, together with that of Mr. McNeill, among those deserving of honorable mention at the close of the present session. We wish them every success.—Argus.

AVIER JOY COMES SORROW.—A few days ago, Havelock, Kings Co., was excited over a little transaction which took place there. Mr. Geo. Alward, twice a widower, aged 74 years, was joined in wedlock to the widow of the late Daniel Keith, aged 64 years.
