

Prince County Exhibition.

One of the best features in the Prince County Exhibition was the large number of people present. There was almost as much truth as poetry in the remark "There is such a big crowd that the exhibition cannot be seen."

The crowd, was a good-looking crowd, mainly made up of farmers—men and women, who by their countenances and dresses, their horses and wagons, their appearance, generally, demonstrated the truth of the remark made by the poet some two thousand years ago:—"O happy, if he knew his happy state, The swain, who free from business and debate Receives his easy food from nature's hand, And just returns of cultivated land."

A harmless life that knows not how to cheat. With home-bred plenty, the rich owner bleats; And rural pleasures crown his happiness. Untried with quarrels, undisturbed with noise, The country king his peaceful realm enjoys."

About one o'clock, the Lieutenant Governor arrived at the Drill Shed, and received the following address:

SUMMERSEIDE, PRINCE CO., October 6th, 1881. To His Honor the Honorable THOMAS HEATH HAVLAND, Q. C., Lieut. Governor of Prince Edward Island, etc., etc.

SIR,—We the Commissioners appointed for the management of the Prince County Fair and Exhibition, for 1881, beg to tender our thanks for your presence here to-day, and for your kindness in acceding to our request to formally open the exhibition.

We have noticed with much pleasure that since your Honor has been appointed Lieut. Governor of this Province, as well as previously, your honor has, on all occasions, taken an active and patriotic part in everything relating to the encouragement of the agricultural and industrial prosperity of Prince Edward Island.

We hope and believe that, although in many sections of this County, the wheat and the root crops are not so good as in the past year, 1880, yet on the whole, your Honor will notice a steady and continued progress, and that the labor and toil of the people have been rewarded by a kind and beneficent Providence.

On behalf of the whole population of Prince County, we take this opportunity of expressing to your Honor our deep sorrow and regret at the death of General Ga. Bell, late President of the United States, and our abhorrence of the Act by which his estimable and heroic life was so hastily shortened.

Beginning to assure your Honor of our personal esteem and of the confidence of the people in your Honor's able and impartial conduct as Lieutenant Governor of the Province,

In reply, His Honor the Lieutenant Governor delivered a short address, in which he evinced the deep interest he takes in the advancement of the industries upon which depend the material prosperity of the Province, and declared the Exhibition open. Judge Hensley followed with a few felicitous remarks, one of which was a well timed comment upon the good policy of the Government in doing more than formerly to advance the interests of agriculture. The Chief Justice, in a short speech, adverted to the evidences of industry and prosperity in the Drill Shed and on the grounds.

IN THE DRILL SHED.

Here, the ladies, certainly, carry off the honors. Indeed if it were not for the products of their art and industry, there would be little in the Drill Shed worth looking at. Miss Pope's oil painting is much above that of the paintings usually seen at exhibitions; and the point lace shown by Miss Sims, of Kensington, is very fine. Of mats, quilts, bead and needle work there is a very creditable display; while over forty ladies compete for the prizes for butter. Their zeal in the butter department suggests the means by which they maintain sway over husbands, etc.; and, seriously, it should be encouraged and rewarded, as His Honor the Lieutenant Governor suggested, by providing them with the latest and best dairy appliances, for the manufacture of their favorite product. Just now when Island butter does not stand high in the markets of the world, and when the large cities of the continent are raising a piteous wail because of the bad butter with which they are supplied, new or refurbished dairies, with churns, etc., of the most improved kinds, seem to be "in order."

Beside the butter, there are a few cheeses said to be very good; and passing from the ladies work we come to two cases of excellent boots and shoes, nicely assorted, the manufacture of Messrs. Fanning and Duggan, respectively. There, there are a few sides of well tanned leather, the exhibitors being Messrs. Hinton, of Summerside, and McDonald, of St. Eleanor's; and two sets of first-class harness, rather too fine for the ordinary farmer's use, the work of Messrs Mark Pound, of Kensington, and C B Saunders, of Summerside. Further there is a small exhibit of canned fish; and then we come to the potatoes. Of these there are five different varieties, and the samples are very good, fully as good as

the best shown at Halifax; but the competition is weak and disappointing. Indeed there are but few exhibitors of either roots, vegetables or grains; and when the cause is asked the reply is that the harvest this year is late and farmers had not time to prepare samples.

ON THE GROUNDS.

One of the Mason and Haulin Organs, for which Mr. Leonard Morris is the pushing agent, is sounding forth its finest notes, so it is with reluctance we leave the drill shed, and sally forth to see the horses. At once the want of suitable exhibition buildings and grounds is felt! Where are the horses to be found? That's the question; and after some delay we are directed to Green's field at the north of the town. This field, it may be remarked, would be an admirable site for permanent exhibition buildings and grounds. But here are the horses. Here are All Right, Brown Stout, Challenger, Iron Duke, Prince of Wales, and Craswell's horse, with other fine animals, by which the standard of Prince County horses is maintained. But, as a whole, the horse exhibit does not strike one as being an improvement on those of former years. In the interests of the country, some of the stallions shown should not be allowed to travel. Imposed upon farmers unacquainted with the art of breeding, they thwart, to a large extent, the efforts of those who are patriotically endeavoring to improve the horses of the Island. The ill effects produced by such horses are painfully evident in some of the colts and foals on the grounds. But there are some really fine animals. Mr. Isaac Schurman's mare, with her foal, by All Right, one of the right kind, and so are the mare and foal shown by Mr. David Walker, of New Annan. One of the largest two year old fillies we have seen this year—not excepting those shown at Halifax—is that of Mr. James Heffel, of Travellers Rest. She is by Abdallah, out of a Vulcan mare. In size, style and action, she is A 1, and she bids fair to be a clipper. Mr. W. H. Schurman shows a large and handsome filly by Wallace, dam by Robbie Burns. The two year old filly shown by Mr. Thomas Robbins, is All Right. She is a beauty and so is the yearling filly, also an All Right, shown by William Reid. All Right and his progeny take first places (in their class) in this exhibition. Among the draft stock there are some very fine foals by Challenger and Brown Stout.

The "exhibits" of cattle are few, but good. Among them are Mr. George Compton's magnificent first prize bull. Hon. Mr. Richards shows a fine three year old short horn bull, weighing 1795 lbs., and Mr. Archibald McCallum shows another of the same age, which, though not in good condition, turns the scale at 1720 lbs. A yearling bull, shown by Mr. J. H. McDonald, of Bedouque, has many fine points, and weighs about 1000 lbs. Mr. Robert Glover's milch cows are excellent of their kind, and so is his heifer. There are several very fine calves—a short horn bull calf shown by Mr. James Heffel, and an Ayrshire Bull Calf, shown by Mr. George Bollum, being both exceptionally large.

Of sheep there is a good show. Mr. James Heffel is the leading exhibitor of gray-faced sheep, and he shows some first-class specimens of the short wool tribe. But scarcely less excellent are those of Mr. James Marchbanks. Among the exhibitors of long wools, Mr. E. T. Wright takes first rank, while Stewart Burns, M. L. C.; George Schurman, Montague Gardiner and Willie Lefurgey are close competitors.

Of pigs there are a few fine ones; and of poultry also a few. Some finely finished wagons adorn the square, and Mr. Hall's combined thrasher and cleaner is an object of great interest. The following is a list of THE PRIZES:
