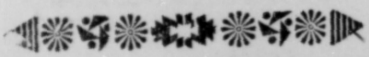

TRANSVAAL CRISIS.

Boer Opinion at Pretoria—Acts Speak Louder Than Words.

LONDON, Sept 6.—Amid the crowd of conflicting despatches from South Africa regarding the Transvaal situation, it is still impossible to say exactly what had happened. It seems evident, however, that President Kruger has withdrawn the five-year franchise, which was dependent on Great Britain's acceptance of impossible conditions regarding suzerainty, and has made some sort of temporizing counter-suggestions regarding a conference.

The Standard and Diggers' News gives what purports to be a report of the secret session of the Volksraad on Saturday. According to this account the Volksraad not only determined to reject the five-year proposal, but also stoutly opposed President Kruger visiting Cape Town, and resolved to make a stand for the abrogation of England's claim to suzerainty. The Boer organ then asserts: "The Government, both the Raads and the Burgers, feel that they have offered all they intend to offer, and are now resolved to stand or fall by this decision."

Boer statements of this kind, coupled with the arrests at Johannesburg, speak louder than the wriggling pretences of Pretoria about arriving at an understanding. Certainly, Mr. Moneybags and the refugees will not be in a hurry to return to Johannesburg on account of the fine assurance of the State Attorney.

SOUTH SEA HOUSE SOLD.

Where the Famous Financial Bubble Was Blown.

LONDON, September 6.—The South Sea house, where the famous financial bubble was blown nearly two centuries ago, has been sold, and in a few months will be razed to the ground. The famous old pile of buildings in Threadneedle street has gone through many changes since it was the home of the South Sea Company early in the last century, and it is now let out in offices. The purchase price of the freehold was \$1,750,000, equal to nearly \$250 per square foot. It is likely that during the demolition some interesting historical discoveries will be made.

A Canadian Hero.

MONTREAL, September 7.—Major Girouard, who won fame in the Sudan, was tendered a public reception yesterday and presented with an address of congratulation on behalf of the citizens of Montreal, to which he briefly replied. The gallant major was banqueted last night by the local militia.

Serum For the Plague.

BERNE, Sept. 3.—The Government of the Confederation has ordered the Swiss Serum Institute at Berne to make and distribute the bubonic pest serum in sufficient quantities throughout the cantons, as a precaution against a possible outbreak of the plague.

—The deliberations between the Premier and members of the Provincial Government and Sir Louis Davies have ended; the working out of the scheme resolved upon will probably soon begin. No doubt all the resources of civilization and the Federal Government will be exhausted to the end that the Provincial government may "get out of the fix it is in." In the meantime, the administration remains practically paralysed.

OUR ISLAND MAGAZINE.

The Rev. Maurice Swabey has furnished an interesting contribution to the Prince Edward Island Magazine for September, entitled "Fox-hunting in P. E. Island," describing the method of the hunt, the packs and the people who attended the meets in those days. It will be found full of personal interest to many among us.

The Hon. J. H. Fletcher furnishes the first chapter of a story entitled "A Reckless Adventure," a brightly written and decidedly funny reminiscence of the author's school-teaching days at Cavendish, in which the people of that section will recognize many well-known characters.

"About Pownal—Acorn's Mill" is the title of a valuable contribution by John T. Mellish, M. A., who treats exhaustively, but most readably, of the old mill at Pownal and the family in whose possession it has been for three generations. The history of the old mill has been thoroughly learned by Mr. Mellish, and readers of the magazine are to be congratulated on benefiting thereby.

The poetry of the number comprises: "In the City Streets," by May Carroll; "The Loss of the Portia," by W. C.; "Lines written on Visiting Tryon River," by James McDonald; and "A Sonnet, Foregleamings," by the late Thomas A. Lepage. The other contributions include a good short story by A. E. Arsenault; "A Year in a Teacher's Life," by D. J. M.; "The Birds, the Pretty Birds," excellent because it is the first article we have yet seen on the subject of our own birds, and because it is so gracefully written; and the first of a series of articles on Captain Holland's letters and survey, republished in the Magazine by permission of H. J. Cuddeback; and the conclusion of "A Story of Newfoundland," by Hon. B. Davies. The Magazine is as usual well printed and modestly illustrated. It is fast becoming valuable to all who are interested in their native Province, and the extremely reasonable subscription, fifty cents a year, should place it within the reach of everybody.
