Attorney-General McLeod, Mr. W. S. Stewart, and Mr. W. A. Weeks, Clerk of the Crown, returned to the city this morning.

COMING THIS WAY.—A large Raymond excursion party (American) arrived in St. John, from St. Andrews, on Tuesday last. They left the following day for Halifax, where the party will divide into two sections, and visit P. E. Island and the Bras D'or Lakes in Cape Breton. The party will re-form at St. John, and visit Fredericton. They will take their departure homeward from Fredericton June.

HANDSOME PRIZES.—His Honor Judge Young has offered for competition by the Park Cricket Club, two very handsome medals for batting and bowling. This competition is to be open for three years. The Judge also gives a separate prize for the best batter this season. A series of matches has been arranged. The man making the best average in all the matches—or in any five or more of them, if unable to play in all—will be the winner. The first match will be on Saturday next, of which members will please take notice.

WEDDING BELLS.—By reference to the proper department, it will be seen that Rev. Benj. Chappelle, of this city, was married at Tokyo, Japan, on the 21st ult. Among the numerous presents on the occasion was one from the Empress of Japan, because of the connection of the bride with the Princess School, of which the Empress is patroness and patron. We extend hearty congratulations to Mr. and Mrs. Chappelle, and wish them many years of unalloyed happiness.

OLD BANK BELLS AGAIN.—A man named Hinckle was arrested at Little Rock, Ark., last week on a charge of passing counterfeit money. Hinckle lost a leg in the war, and now wears a wooden leg. Examination of the wooden member disclosed the fact that he had arranged the inside of it as a receptacle for the "queer." It was stuffed with bills, some of which were genuine. There were a number of bills on the defunct Bank of Prince Edward Island of the denomination of \$10 and \$20, which passed readily through the Little Rock Bank.

YOUNG HENDERSON DISCHARGED.—The matter of the examination of George Henderson, charged with feloniously killing Eva S. Gay, was resumed this morning before J. T. Melish, Esq., J. P. The accused appeared and also his sureties. His counsel, Mr. Hodgson, Q. C., and the Attorney General, were also present. No further evidence was offered. Mr. Melish said that after the most careful consideration of all the evidence, and of the law bearing on the case, he had arrived at the conclusion that the prisoner should be discharged. He, at the same time, suitably admonished young Henderson, and suggested that the legislature lose no time in passing a law restricting the use of firearms in this province.

MEDICAL MEN IN COUNCIL.—There was a very good attendance at the meeting of the New Brunswick Medical Society in Moncton on Tuesday. Nova Scotia, P. E. Island and Maine were represented at the meeting. At the close of the evening's session it was decided to form a Maritime Medical Association, and provisional officers were elected as follows: President—Dr. Bayard, St. John. Vice-Presidents: For Nova Scotia—Hon. Dr. Parker; for P. E. Island—Dr. Johns; for New Brunswick—Dr. Walker, St. John. Secretary and Treasurer—Dr. Morrow, Halifax. Committee of Management—Drs. Bruce, Melish, Hillsborough and Christie. It was decided to hold the first meeting of the Maritime Association in St. John, on Wednesday, 22nd July, 1890.

Canadian Riflemen Abroad.

LONDON, July 16. The firing to-day at Bisley was in the Daily Graphic match. In the all comers' and grand aggregate series, the prizes were a silver cup, value 52 guineas, ten hand-somely bound volumes, containing original pen and ink drawings by artists of the Daily Graphic, value 21 guineas, one prize of £10, eighteen prizes of £5, and forty prizes of £3. Position standing, distance 200 yards, seven shots. The Canadian team did not do quite so well in this match as last year, in the matter of prize winning, nevertheless they did very good shooting as the scores were very good all round. The Canadian winners in this match were: Private C. A. Windatt, 458th Battalion, Bowmanville, £5; Capt. H. H. Gray, Governor-General's Foot Guards, Ottawa, £5, and another member of the team divided a prize in the £3 list.

Halifax Notes.

HALIFAX, July 16.

Halifax workmen are making great preparations for celebrating Labor Day. The Mayor will be asked to proclaim it a public holiday.

A story is afloat here that the Newfoundland bait steamer Fiona had fired upon a French fishing vessel which was securing bait, but the report cannot be traced to any authentic source.

The inquest on the victims of the Dartmouth disaster was concluded to-night. No new facts were elicited as to the cause of the disaster. The Jury's verdict was "accidental death."

New Professor in Physics.

WOLFVILLE, N. S., July 17.

At a meeting of the senate of Acadia College, held to-day, F. H. Eaton, M. A., of Truro, was nominated professor of physics in the college. Mr. Eaton is a graduate of Acadia and of Harvard, and has a fine record as a teacher. He will study for a time in Germany in further preparation for his work. The selection will be well received by the alumni and friends of Acadia.

A False Rumor.

VICTORIA, B. C., July 16.

The statements that two Canadian vessels which recently sailed out of Maple Bay were armed with guns and would resist the American Revenue Cutters is said to be false. Messrs. Hall & Marwen who own seven of the thirty vessels running out of Victoria, say the reports were sent out to prejudice the Foreign office in London against the cause of the sealers.

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., July 16.

A Lake City special to the Journal, says that twenty-five bodies were found to-day, making a total of ninety thus far recovered. It is believed that ten to fifteen are missing.
