

# Banquet Is Held In Honor Of St. Mary's Academy Graduates

Dr. W. E. Callaghan was the guest speaker last evening at the annual banquet in honor of the graduates of St. Mary's Academy. After extending his congratulations to the graduates, Dr. Callaghan impressed on them the value and advantages of an advanced education in this present day and age. The young people today, he said, must prepare themselves with a good sound education in order to assume positions of importance and responsibility.

"The standards required of students today," he said, "are high, but if you have the will to attain an education you can do so. It will require hard work and application, but everything you accomplish in this life is priced high and the greater the accomplishment, the higher the price."

Dr. Callaghan said that he had a very personal interest in the present convent of St. Mary's because when it was built on its present site the first sod that was turned by his grand uncle, Rev. Father Doyle, who was then the parish priest. He said, too, that his mother had been a student in the convent when it was first opened.

The banquet was sponsored and served by the members of the Catholic Women's League and was presided over by the president of the local sub division, Mrs. Carol Delaney.

In her address to the graduates, Mrs. Delaney said, "The C. W. L. is actively interested in the education of young girls and contributes annually to a scholarship which on two occasions has been awarded to Island girls. This sub division also contributes prizes locally and gives a assistance as well to the new man club."

Mrs. Delaney reminded the girls that their graduation is just the finishing of the first step of their education and she admonished them to remember the principles which had been repeatedly impressed on them during their school years and to live up to the high ideals they had been taught.

# Sea Cadets Enjoy Cruise On Destroyer Algonquin

About 75 Summerside Sea Cadets went to sea yesterday and formed the first welcoming party to greet the H. M. C. S. "Algonquin" arriving on a four-day visit at Summerside.

Assembling on Holman's Wharf about 7 a.m., the Sea Cadets were grouped in divisions and inspected by their commanding officer, Lt. Roy Boates. Then, with officers of the Sea Cadet Corps and members of the Navy League, the cadets climbed into four motor boats and headed seaward for a rendezvous with the H. M. C. S. "Algonquin" about 10 miles from the harbor.

On the way to the ship the cadets enjoyed the choppy boat ride, sang songs, and kept a look-out to see who would be the first to spot the destroyer hidden in the beams of Northumberland Strait.

Arriving alongside the sleek destroyer the boys boarded the ship with a helping hand extended by members of the crew. After brief introductions, the boys divided into small groups and were escorted about the ship by the sailors.

The natural curiosity of youth together with their interest as Sea Cadets, led to the fullest enjoyment of one their most memorable experiences as members of a Sea Cadet Corps. Everything seemed of interest to the youthful "sailors". On the open flowed the questions as the destroyer moved ahead slowly, later giving the cadets a demonstration of speed in revving up the propellers and leaving a white bubbling wake trailing behind at a speed of 25 knots.

With the sea calm, and warm sunshine prevailing, Captain Desmond "Iam Piers, D. S. C., C. D., R. C. N., demonstrated the maneuverability of his ship in an hour long cruise in the strait between Summerside harbor.

Guided by a harbor pilot, the ship under command of Capt. Piers, entered the harbor and nosed gently alongside the new Marine Wharf where lines were made fast, and the ship will remain at berth for four days.

Shortly after arrival, the Captain, together with local Sea Cadet officers, called on Mayor W. A. Currie in his office in the Town Hall building, as the first phase of a four-day program in which the public will have the opportunity to inspect the ship, and the sailors will be entertained at dances, movies, ball games, fishing trips, scenic tours, and a public band concert by the exceptionally fine Summerside Sea Cadet Band which includes some 20 members.

With the party of Sea Cadets which met the Algonquin yesterday were the commanding officer of the Summerside Corps, Lt. Roy Boates, Surgeon Lt. H. B. McNeill, Padre J. D. MacKay, Lt. George Oldscamp, Lt. Verno Arsenault, all of the Summerside Sea Cadet Corps, and members of the P. E. I. Navy League and Local Sea Cadet committee, including president Gordon Kelly, Fred Folland, and Victor Sanderson.

## ALGONQUIN ON VISIT TO S'SIDE

H. M. C. S. Algonquin, presently on a four-day visit to Summerside, is 337 feet in length, and carries a crew of 225. (Capt. D. W. Piers, D.S.C., C.D., R.C.N. Inset). Built as a Fleet "V" destroyer, this ship was commissioned in February 1944, and carried out patrol and escort work in Norwegian and United Kingdom waters before taking part in the naval bombardment supporting the Normandy invasion. In 1945 she came to Canada for refit, and after some further service in European and Pacific waters, underwent radical innovations converting her to a destroyer escort. Reconstructed from her hull up, her forecastle deck was extended to the stern and a new superstructure, largely of aluminum, replaced the wartime silhouette. Top weight thus saved has allowed roomier working and living conditions. Her enclosed bridge and lookout posts make it possible for her to operate without a man on the open decks.

On Sunday following a church parade to the Catholic and Baptist Churches in which the Sea Cadets and the Sea Cadet Band will march with the ship's company, a march-past will be held at the corner of Summer and Fitzroy Streets with the salute taken by Captain Piers and Mayor W. A. Currie.

During the afternoon from 2:00 to 4:00 p.m. the ship will be open to the general public. During the afternoon some of the sailors will be taken on a scenic tour through the National Park, and others will be taken on a trout fishing trip. In the evening the Sea Cadet Band will present a one-hour band concert in Memorial Square.
