Garbage Collection On Council Agenda

With Mayor A. Wathen Gaudet leaving today to attend the mid-term meeting of the Canadian Federation of Mayors and Municipalities in Montreal, Deputy Mayor Walter Cox will preside over tonight's regular meeting of the City Council.

Aside from presentation of the customary reports at the monthly meetings, the item of major importance expected tonight will be the statement of Councillor John Nicholson regarding arranging of tenders for the new compulsory garbage collection.

When tenders were original- ly placed, there were several firms and individuals responding, but it was later revealed not all could meet the terms regarding posting of a performance bond. Mr. Nicholson, chairman of the tender committee, was asked to review the situation and confer with certain tenders.

It is believed his committee may now be prepared to award, or recommend the awarding, of the contract.

Compulsory garbage collection was decided on by council when Mayor Walter Cox will preside over tonight's regular meeting of the City Council.

Once the incinerator is in operation, expected by the end of this month, no further private dumping will be permitted.

PC Caucus On Today

Land For Shipbuilding Discussed At Geo'town

GEORGETOWN — Industry and Natural Resources Minister Leo Rossiter met informally with officials of Bankwest Marine Limited in Georgetown yesterday to discuss some of the problems of the establishment of a new firm.

Mr. Rossiter explained that it was only a semi-official talk where discussion touched such matters as the ownership of the land on which the new plant is to stand and the site.

Other topics were relative to housing developments in Georgetown which Mr. Rossiter said were out of government hands but the idea was supported morally.

3 Accidents Occur Near Harrington

An accident near the drive-in theatre at Brockley Point last evening sent one person to hospital with minor cuts and damaged two vehicles.

At approximately 5 p.m. yesterday a small foreign car driven by Allan MacKay, Kensington was in collision with the rear of a vehicle driven by Mrs. Rose Skippington of Brackley Point. Damage to both vehicles was estimated at about \$150.

A passenger in the MacKay vehicle, Margaret MacDonald, Charlottetown, sustained minor cuts to her head. Other passengers in the two vehicles were unharmed.

A second accident occurred on this same stretch of highway a short time later when an RCMP patrol car was in collision with a car which is reported to have backed out of a parking area in front of the Presbyterian Church at Harrington. Names of those involved were not available last night.

The patrol car was dented. A third mishap occurred a few hours later at the same spot when a car sideswiped a parked vehicle. No one was hurt.

Canada Opens Philadelphia Trade Fair

PHILADELPHIA (CP)—Canada put on a splashy front Monday as she opened a drive for a bigger share of the U.S. market with a week-long trade fair, biggest of its kind.

It was one of the eye-catching hoops of an international carnival as this Quaker city responded by officially marking this as Canada Week.

While concentration was on an exhibition of Canadian products in the basement concourse of a downtown hotel, Canadian fair officials whipped up local enthusiasm by an exhibition of Canadiana that included Quaker, a stuffed Arctic owl; totem poles and Eskimo craft; free movies and RCMP officers in scarlet uniforms; Highland dancers and pipers and gronies of a 60-foot Canadian Christmas tree for this city of brotherly love.

The extravaganza also included five Canadian demonstrators lined up on the Philadelphia waterfront and manned by 1,300 sailors; a speech by a Canadian admiral in a downtown department store with a 100-man naval guard of honor and a 35-piece RCAF band drummed against the display counters.
