

52' Oldsmobile In Two Series

Oldsmobile for 1952 presents two series—the Classic '98' and the Super '99'—with such innovations as a more efficient 160-h.p. 'Rocket' engine with the new high performance Quadri-Jet carburetor; new styling and more luxurious interiors with new upholstery combinations; a new super range for increased performance of Hydra-Matic Drive which is available on both series at extra cost; and GM Power Steering offered as an extra cost option on the Series '98'.

The Classic Series '98' is available in three body styles—four-door sedan, Holiday coupe and convertible. The Super '99' is powered by the same 'Rocket' engine and has five body styles—four-door sedan, two-door sedan, Holiday coupe, convertible coupe and club coupe.

The overall length of the Classic '98' Series has been increased from 208 to 213 inches. Wheelbase has been increased two inches to 124 inches. A rear stabilizer bar has been added, improving car handling and stability and minimizing side sway at high speeds. There is greater deck length, making more luggage space available in the spacious trunk.

In exterior styling, the Classic '98' with its high rear fenders and long deck creates a new styling silhouette. The wrap-around rear window is now one single piece of curved safety glass. The Holiday coupe has a distinctive round Holiday medallion on the bright-work where the roof and rear window meet the rear quarter panel.

Interior appointments of the Oldsmobile 1952 models reflect more luxurious upholstery combinations and a tasteful selection of matching colors. Instrument panel, seats, carpeting, headlining, door panels and interior trim all harmonize in pleasant and colorful shades. Cradlecloth, leather, nylon Bedford cord offer a broad choice of upholstery in both series to promote the individualized treatment available in Oldsmobile body styles for 1952.

The 1952 Super '99' is powered by the same 'Rocket' engine that makes the Classic '98' so popular. The Super '99' uses the Quadri-Jet carburetor that accounts for the improved efficiency and boosts the horsepower rating from 138-h.p. to 160-h.p. Compression ratio is 7.5 to 1. The Super '99' also has a new rear stabilizer that improves car handling and reduces side sway.

Due to the 25 additional horsepower developed, other changes have been made in the 1952 'Rocket' engine. Sturdier pistons have been installed. This in turn has necessitated the addition of heavier counter-weights on the five-bearing crankshaft to compensate for the power increase. Increase of the ratio of the valve travel to the rocker arm has raised the valve lift and thus contributed to the greater horsepower.

The Quadri-Jet carburetor is a further advance in high compression engine development achieved by Oldsmobile engineers. It consists essentially of a primary and a secondary carburetor, each of the dual downward type. There are four barrels in this compound carburetor set-up. The Quadri-Jet is more efficient at metering the fuel for starting or low-throttle operation due to better distribution of the fuel and air mixture. On starting or low throttle operation, only the primary carburetor with its two barrels is used. The automatic choke also applies only to the primary carburetor. At half throttle opening or beyond, the secondary carburetor adds its two barrels to the system, giving the carburetor much greater "breathing capacity".

Quebec Girls Carry Canadian Colors Today

By JACK SULLIVAN OSLO, Feb. 13—(CP)—Four girl skiers, all from Quebec Province, carry Canada's first bid for Olympic honors in the international winter show opening tomorrow.

Their assignment is a tough one—descent of the rugged, snow-fied giant slalom course at Norefjell, 70 miles northeast of Oslo.

Rhoda Wurtelle Eaves of Montreal will be the first in a field of 45 down the twisting, steep monster. Far behind her in the order to take-off are Joanne Hewson and Rosemarie Schutz of Montreal and 18-year-old Lucille Wheeler of St. Jovite, Que.

Contrary to custom, the formal opening ceremonies of the games will not take place until Friday, second day of the competitions. But there will be bugle-blowing and flag-raising at Norefjell for the skiers and at the bobbed run.

Canada has no entries in the bobbed events, in which the United States hopes to overcome the champion Germans.

In all, 1,178 athletes from 30 countries, including Germany and Japan, are competing in this biggest of all winter-Olympics, with a total attendance of 750,000 expected before the closing ceremonies Feb. 25.

More than 300 soldiers, working day and night, have brought the giant Slalom course into reasonably good shape by shovelling in snow from every nearby gully. The bobbed course at the Frognerstern Hills is icy and considered dangerous for four-man sleds.

The first two heats of the two-men bobbed competition will start the games tomorrow just before the skiers get away.

An American girl, Andrea Mead Lawrence, 19-year-old star from Rutland, Vt., is considered the favorite for the women's giant slalom, but only slightly ahead of Trudy Jochum-Beiser of Austria.

Trees take a much longer time to grow than do cattle.

Sees Opportunity For Much Greater Woodlot Revenue

Mr. J. Frank Gaudet, chief forester of the Forestry Division, Department of Industry and Natural Resources, yesterday expressed the belief that Island woodlots could produce a much greater revenue than at present.

In offering advice to owners the Chief Forester stated: "The majority of farm woodlots can be made much more useful and profitable than they are. To enable a woodlot to produce more wood of better quality continuously and more quickly is the aim of forest management. In other words, forest management means making full use of the capacity of the soil to grow trees, or to produce wood, for the needs of the people."

"A coal mine is worked until the coal peters out, then it is abandoned. Farm crops are sown, reaped then sown again. The woodlot should not be treated like either of these but should always be kept a growing concern. It should be handled like a large herd of cattle, which keeps breeding and increasing all the time so that the younger stock, without loss of time, replaces the mature animals that are killed."

"Many people think of forestry only as planting of trees, and protection of the woodlots from fire and animals. They are wrong. Sound forest management does not necessarily include planting in its agenda. Planting, as a rule is only needed where forest management has not been sound, or where a woodlot is going to be established artificially on ground where trees never existed."

Seldom Practicable "Clear-cutting a woodlot then planting young trees is seldom commercially practicable, as planting involves considerable expense and returns cannot be realized for a great number of years to come. Such a practice would be as lavish as that of a cattleman who sold all his stock, both young and old, and then started from scratch to build up another herd by buying calves."

When a good sound system of management is practised, nature replaces every tree that is cut. The system used depends on a number of cutting methods, which will result in prompt and good restocking with desirable kinds of trees. All of these cutting methods will be discussed in detail at a later date. Such cutting is usually partial or selective so that only the trees which should be cut at that time are taken and the ones that are left standing grow faster because of less competition.

Returns from a well managed woodlot are not confined to some period in the future. Management should pay dividends not only now but always."
