



# Moncton Hawks Begin Eastern Allan Cup Play In Kitchener With Dutchies Tonight

KITCHENER, (CP)—Moncton Hawks, who have won 18 of their 21 playoff games this season, meet the Kitchener-Waterloo Dutchmen in the first game of the best-of-seven Eastern Allan Cup final here tonight. The Hawks arrived in Kitchener Sunday night.

Moncton coach Dugger McNeil, who preceded his team here to watch the Dutchmen polish off Sault Ste. Marie Greyhounds for the all-Ontario Senior A championship Thursday and Saturday, wouldn't make a prediction beyond saying the eastern Canada championships would be a high-scoring series. McNeil, however, didn't lack confidence.

"We've been a good road team all year," he said, indicating he thinks the Hawks have a good chance to make the Allan Cup final. All games of the semi-finals will be played in Kitchener.

McNeil's main concern is whether the Hawks will be sharp after two easy playoff series against New Glasgow, N.S., and Ottawa RCAF Flyers. Moncton breezed through both series without losing a game but McNeil said neither team was of senior A calibre.

SEASONED TEAM  
From their goaltender out, the Hawks seem to be a seasoned team and many of their players have had professional experience. Netminder Nick Pidsodny played with Windsor Bulldogs in the same league as the Dutchmen in 1953-54 and was formerly with Sydney.

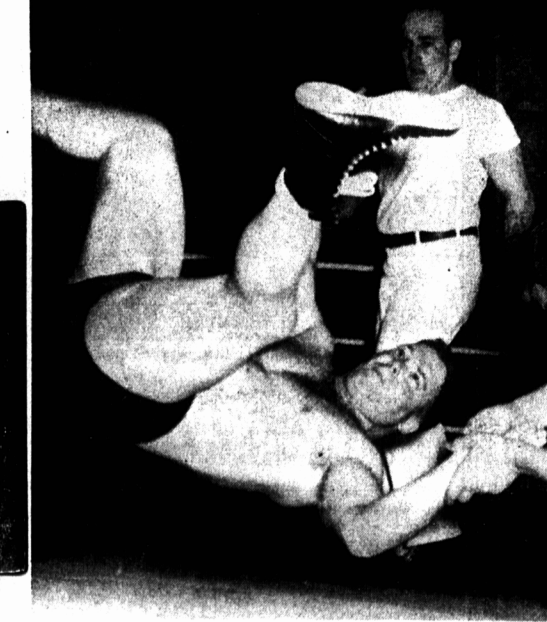

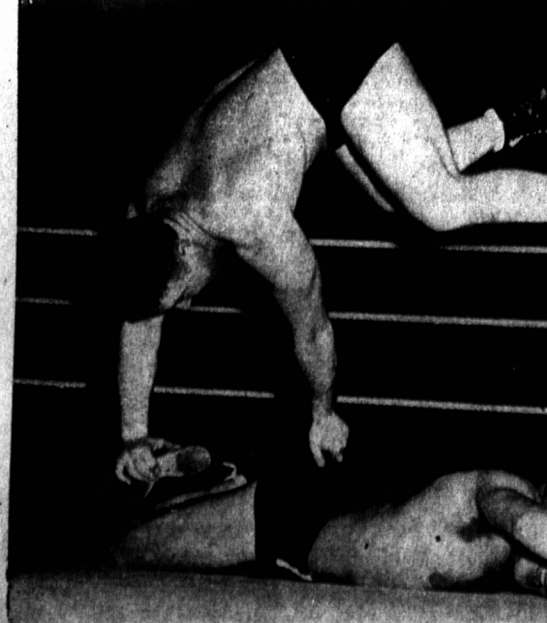
## Gil Turner Wins In 10-Rounder
