

# Another Large Crowd At Night Race Meet



## DOWN THE BACK STRETCH

One of the most interesting horses at the Charlottetown track is the trotter Question V, 2:09 2/5, a 7-year-old chestnut stallion by James Jim, that was bought by Andy Ferguson of Sydney last year. He won the Two Mile Trot at Truro towards the end of the season and also other events. We asked his caretaker, why he had been given the name Question V, and he showed us a very large white question mark on the horse's forehead and further down between his nostrils was a distinct V.

Willard Stewart's good pacer Just Lucky 2:11 3/5, an 8-year-old by Peter Hal, son of Sampson Hal 2:02 3/4, has found a new and very fine owner in J. Henry De Witt of Woodstock, N. B. Just Lucky was one of the sensational horses of 1951. His career up until the early part of the summer was largely doing light work around the farm, but Willard thought he had speed, in fact thought that while stepping him over the ice the previous winter, so he was placed in training with Elwood Shaw and later he took his fast mark. This year he met with an accident early and had only very slight training when he started some nights ago and won easily in 2:15 3/5.

The many friends of Dr. F. W. Christopher of Boston, are welcoming him back again on a visit "home". The opening gun of the racing program of Old Home Week was fired last Saturday night. There was an estimated attendance of nearly 3,000 and the racing was splendid. In the first dash You'll See, owned by A. B. Cutcliffe and driven by Blair Andrew, won in 2:17 2/5—a new record for this daughter of Calumet Budlong and the famous race mare Margaret Jean 2:10 1/4. The 3-year-old Maxey Federal, driven by Claude O'Brien, was second. The Free For All Trot had six starters, but regrettably Jennie Kalmuck was not in racing shape, having suffered an injury some weeks ago that sidelined her. The 14-year-old trotter, Brooke of Athlone, owned by C. L. Dauphinee, Halifax, and driven by Wendy Carroll, won the first heat in 2:13 3/5 from Nell Kalmuck (W. Kelly). Nell won the second heat in 2:14 3/5 with Bud Kalmuck (Given) 2 and the third heat was won by the 4-year-old

trotter Pet Hanover, owned by Roy Bevan and driven by Cyril Smith, Hunter River. Judy Budlong that we had featured early in the season as a likely comer, won the third race with Gahagen (Shaw) close up in 2:14 2/5—a new record for Judy. Bonnie Frisco, owned by Clark & Horne, Summerside, and driven by George Sobey, won the 1st race with Sister Verna (O'Meara) 2 in 2:20. The trotter Judy Kalmuck was the best in the 6th race which had six trotters as starters. She is owned by Lester Johnston, Fortune, and was driven by Willard Kelly, and is a daughter of Dude Potempkin 2:07 1/4 and sired by Kalmuck 2:15 1/2. We look to see her take a much faster record in years to come. Second to her was the 14-year-old son of Kalmuck, Wait 'N' See, owned by George Gregory and driven by Len O'Meara. Wait 'N' See's sprint at the last end almost connected. He has certainly been a wonderful horse and a popular one.

The 7th race which had four starters, was really a very exciting one. Jo-Jo Spencer 2:10, owned by Norman Acker, St. Stephen, and driven by Billy Burt, went away flying and opened up several lengths lead on Babe Britton, Doctor J. A., and Ohio Hal, but after leaving the three-quarter pole they commenced to cut it down and at the wire Babe and Doctor J. A. had photo finish and were only a length back of Jo-Jo Spencer, time, 2:11 2/5. The 8th race winner was Sandy Budlong, another of those Calumet Budlong's he put on a great burst of speed to take the lead after leaving the half and held it to the wire, but by only a small margin from Rosalie Hooper (O'Meara). Close up was Dale B. Lucky Number and Mannister Direct 5, time, 2:11 4/5—a new record. Sandy Budlong had gone three races in twelve days and was shipped from New Brunswick to Sydney and from Sydney to Charlottetown. He is out of Alestra 2:12 1/2, by Real Money, that Prof. S. A. Rockford brought here years ago and is now a brood mare at Bert Younker's farm. He is easily a 2:10 pacer.

By Monday morning all the horses had arrived that would take part in Old Home Week races—about 150 of them, and every available barn was requisitioned to house them. Everywhere one looked there was activity and the track in the mornings was actually full of horses, while Emmett Gallard, the only blacksmith available, could hardly get time to eat. Not in years has there been so many horses at the track and so much speed on tap, except in the trotting events. For several years now we have concentrated on the pacers and have neglected

**CONNAUGHT RIFLE RANGES, South March, Ont., Aug. 15—(CP)—** A 59-year-old marksman from Saint John, N.B., today won the silver medal in the Macdonald match at the 84th annual Dominion of Canada Rifle Association meet.

Alban S. Emery, who has competed in every D.C.R.A. meet since 1922 and is a former Bisley shoot, scored a perfect 25 to win the shoot-off and beat out 11 other riflemen who earlier in the day scored 122 of a possible 125.

Ten rounds are fired in the match from the 300-yard range and 15 from 600 yards.

Emery was a shooting member of the Canadian Bisley team in 1927 and qualified again in 1929 but was unable to make the trip.

In the regulation five-round shoot-off, Emery was the only one scoring the possible Seven others tied with one off the possible. They were: Cadet R. M. Crossan, Hamilton; Maj. R. W. Hampton, Ottawa; Sgt. A. Parnell, Verdun, Que.; Sgt. Lee Straight, Vancouver; S. Sgt. J. R. Sullivan, Weston, Ont.; Sgt. C. C. Wilson, Ottawa, and Maj. H. Bowen, also of Ottawa.

G. F. Booth, British rifle team, H. Rusk, Ottawa, and WO2 E. L. Warner, Sherbrooke, Que., finished with 238 and Lieut. H. E. Underhill, British rifle team, scored 227.

The British rifle team achieved two major victories.

An eight-man British team chalked one up by defeating a Canadian team in the Empire Match, and the only woman member ever to accompany the British rifle team to Canada registered the other.

It was the second win over a Canadian in as many days. Thursday, the team defeated the Canadians in the Canada Match, shot from 300, 500 and 600 yards.

**U. S. Takes Lead In Golf Cup Play**  
SEATTLE, Aug. 15—(CP)—The United States amateur golf team squeezed out victory in the first international matches for the Americans Cup today but the surprising performance of Canada's top players provided most of the excitement in the singles matches.

## HUNTERS' CORNER

Grain in stock and the whir of binders are beginning to lend a fall-like air to the countryside. Mid August nights take on a hunting tinge and conjure up visions of long skeins of ducks on a twilight skyline and ragged formations of wild-geese hovering over a stubble field. Coveys of sizeable Huns whirring from uncut meadows give promise of sport to come and cause one to give thought to the stock pile of shells on hand.

A few evenings ago I sat in a boat near the head of a large mill pond. As the sun sank behind the trees and dark shadows crept across the water broods of black ducks edged out from the shoreline weed fringe into more open water. I spotted three broods averaging eight or nine that followed their mother to the opposite side of the pond. It was hard to make an accurate count as the night shadows hung low over the water and the birds resembled a ragged line of large black crows drawn on a string. They'd strike out and then bunch into knots. Two of the families were almost as large as the parent bird but the third were only slightly over half grown.

As a large yellow moon topped the ridge off to the southeast several flocks dipped in to feed or rest for the night. One bunch of nine looked as large as brant as they circled clear cut against the fading light. A flock of mature blacks on wing always gives a died-in-the-wool duck hunter a thrill, especially in such a setting. Once I involuntarily ducked as, with a sound like tearing cloth, a bunch of teal were glimpsed momentarily as they bore to vanish in the wall of blackness that lay under the ridge of spruce spires. Teal make a tricky target and, on the opening morning, unless it's a blue-wing, this columnist lets the Winchester double lie across his knees.

Blue-wing teal are always fat and toothsome but the Green-wings are poor table birds until October has entered on its last lap. Early in the season they are covered with black down with the old exception. When November frosts form tinkling ridges of ice along the edge of quiet ponds and sheltered waterways they are white and fat and resemble over grown sausages when plucked. One night last week I watched the moon throw a beam of yellow light across a mill pond for the first time in close to 40 years. . . . the old Acorn Mill, now Worth's is Pownal has once again come back into its own. For the past four years there has been considerable discussion over who would re-build this dam but recently John Worth, Pownal, took the bull by the horns and engaged "Ginger" MacKay to do the job. In the old days when I was at an age the older men used to inquire: "Daddy, your mother know you're out?" Acorn's Dam during the winter months was the Mecca for the youth of Pownal and the surrounding districts.

This sheltered pond was a natural skating rink and on winter evenings and nights the ring of skates and the happy laughter of young couples were a common place occurrence. Parties from Charlottetown often drove out to dine at the Forrester House, then at the peak of its fame, and later to skate on the pond. I still remember the crack speed skater and bicycle rider from Charlottetown, tried his luck with Jack McInnis, the local speed King on skates. It was a hip and tuck race with the more experienced city skater nosing him out. Jack, if he had taken up the speed skating game, could have made quite a name for himself and the Pownal community. I wouldn't go so far as to say he might have eclipsed Art Gaudet in this field of endeavour. It took the best Saint John had to offer, and this was world record material, to do that. Here's hoping that the old Acorn dam will again become the meeting place for the young people of Pownal and vicinity.

## Veteran Drivers Share Spotlight; Semple Gives Namesake New Record

Two of the oldest drivers in the Maritimes shared the spotlight at the Old Home Week Harness Racing meet here last night as they battled for track honors before another exceptionally large crowd of spectators at the Exhibition track.

The two men were Tyndall Semple of Kensington and Col. D. A. Macinnon of Charlottetown who along with Willard Kelly of Southport drove their horses to thrilling finishes in the 2:20 Trot, the fastest event of the night.

Tyndall Semple, who first drove a race horse over the Exhibition track 55 years ago, drove a bay gelding named Tyndall Semple to a new mark in winning the first heat of the 2:20 Trot. The gelding trotted the mile in 2:14 3-5.

Semple then came back to drive his namesake to another win in the second heat in the time of 2:14 4-5. The final heat was won by Willard Kelly's Milldale.

And battling it out for top honors in all three heats was Col. Macinnon's Feather Duster. The Duster finished third in the first heat but came in a close second in the last two dashes.

Sam Kennedy's Carl Aubrey won top honors in the 2:21 Pace by winning the first and third heats. Carl Aubrey came from far back in each heat to win.

Dean Swift won the second heat of the Pace and was on the way to winning the third when he broke at the top of the back stretch on the second trip around. Johnny Early struck Dean Swift's skulkie and went down but fortunately neither drivers Joe Hennessey of Dean Swift, M. Chaisson of Johnny Early nor the horses were injured.

Waymark won the second and third heats of the 2:25 Pace to take the top honors in that event. Sam Kennedy, who had a good night, drove Tracey Direct to victory in the first heat.

Tyndall Semple went into the lead at the three-eighths pole in the first heat of the 2:20 Trot and was never headed as he raced home a winner. Guy Harvester set the early pace but broke as he rounded the upper turn on the first trip around.

Guy Harvester again went into the lead at the start of the second heat of the Trot and remained there for more than half the mile. Tyndall Semple and Feather exchanged second and third places on the way down to the half. In the back stretch Tyndall Semple moved up from third place to go into the lead and from there on in every post was a winning one.

The final heat of this event was one of the best of the night. As usual Guy Harvester led for more than half the mile. Milldale who stayed in fifth place to the back stretch started her drive just before the three quarter pole. She moved up inside on the rail and went into the lead on the upper turn with Tyndall Semple in the middle and Feather Duster on the outside.

As they moved onto the stretch it was Milldale by a nose. The three horses trotted abreast to the wire with Milldale maintaining the lead and Feather Duster placing second.

Carl Aubrey came up from fifth place to win the first dash of the 2:21 Pace. Joe Hennessey drove Dean Swift to a good win the second dash without licenses this season, both Resident and Non-resident. There is a possibility that the attitude adopted toward licenses by some of our local anglers and some of those who sell licenses may have something to do with this situation. Several times I came across Non-resident anglers trying their luck without the necessary scrap of paper. Two in particular stated that they didn't know a fishing license was required but during the resultant conversation admitted that they had friends locally who were out on the streams or dams every spare moment.
