

LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

Curfew at the Park this afternoon.

Diphtheria is prevalent in St. John, in the vicinity of the Marsh Bridge. Several deaths have been reported.

POLICE COURT.—This forenoon the case of Philip Curley charged with selling liquor to an Indian, was adjourned until Monday.

POLITICAL MEETING.—The political picnic at the Hotel Acadia, Tracadie Beach, today is very well attended. The weather is excellent.

PREACHING.—Rev. Thos. Duncau, formerly Pastor of St. James' Church in this city, will preach in Zion Church at 11 a. m. to-morrow.

RAIL FOR POWER.—On Monday next, Mr. H. J. Palmer will make application before the Chief Justice for bail for Michael Power, senior.

SALVATION ARMY.—The Salvation Army are expecting big times the next three days. Special meetings conducted by Bengdier and Mrs. Jacobs, of St. John, assisted by the Frederick Brass Band, will be held commencing to-night at 8 o'clock. A big open air meeting to-morrow afternoon, in the Park, at 3 o'clock.

THE MAINE STATE FAIR.—This great fair will be held in Lewiston on September 5th, 6th, 7th and 8th, and the attractions promised will exceed any previous year. In the horse races there are to be nineteen in four days, and all races are open to Maritime Province horses, except the colt stakes.

THE CANDIDATES CHOSEN.—At the convention of Liberal-Conservative delegates, held at Glenwilliam, Lot 63, yesterday afternoon, Messrs. James C. Low and Angus Macleod were unanimously chosen candidates to contest the Fourth District of King's County at the approaching general election. The choice is an excellent one.

TWO CASES BEFORE THE COURT.—Yesterday two cases were tried before J. T. Mellish, Esq., J. P. The first was an action brought against the defendant for having in his possession a dog that had worried and killed sheep. Judgment for plaintiff. The other was a Scott Act case against James Duffy. It was adjourned to Friday, August 4th.

A WIFE BEATER SENTENCED.—Alfred Crowley, who was arrested on Monday for assaulting his wife on Sunday night, was tried before Police Magistrate McCauley on Tuesday. He was found guilty and sentenced this morning to four months imprisonment in the county jail, and to be bound over to keep the peace for two years.—Chatham World.

IN SOLENS COMPLAINT.—The Halifax Herald says: Premier Fielding, L. H. Davies, of P. E. Island, and H. E. Emerson, of Dorchester, were in close consultation on Wednesday at the Learmont Hotel, Truro. It is said they were at work on the proposed Maritime grip organization. The time they spent and the worried look they bore, would lead to the conclusion that they had accomplished something—or tried to.

A HEAVY LOSS.—A young man named Chas. Samit, of Derby, N. B., claims to have lost about \$500 worth of stuff by the recent Shelburne fire. Mr. Samit travels about the country selling dry goods, jewelry etc. He was away in Halifax at the time of the fire, and had left his horse, wagon and goods in the Union Hotel barn. The horse was got out, but his wagon and goods were burned. He places his loss at about \$500.

BACK TO CANADA.—The Montreal Star says: The Canadian exodus to New England has been completed into New England exodus to Canada. All the seats in the outer waiting room of the C. P. R., Windsor station, were occupied this morning by exiles returning home. They were nearly all French Canadians from Lowell, Lynn and Manchester, and other places in Massachusetts and New Hampshire. "The mills are closing, the times are hard, and we can get no work in the United States." That was their tale of woe.

VICTIMS OF LEAD POISONING.—The lighthouse keeper at Tiverton, N. S., and his whole family are victims of lead poisoning. The wife and daughter have died in terrible agony and convulsions. The water used for domestic purposes is conveyed from the roof into a tank in the cellar. During the past few years the roof has been more than once covered with white paint, and through this they have contracted the disease which has carried off two and threatens the whole family.

RESHING TO BOSTON.—A St. John gentleman received a letter from his brother in Boston the other day, stating that carpenters were rushing into Boston from the western states in great numbers and offering to work for any wages they could get. Poor fellows! the writer says, they have struck a hard place, as owing to the dullness of trade there is not work enough for the regular hands, who have been discharged by hundreds. The bank failures and business collapses in the west are driving young men to the east in multitudes in search of employment.—St. John Sun.

NOVA SCOTIA BIGAMIST.—A Boston despatch says: "Chas. W. Hutchinson was arrested here today for bigamy. He was married in Nova Scotia, and there, his wife says, he deserted her. He says after he came here he heard his wife was dead. He married again. His first wife came here six months ago and had Hutchinson arrested, but the case was settled when Hutchinson agreed to pay his wife \$300 and not live with the second Mrs. Hutchinson. It is said he has not fulfilled these conditions, hence the second warrant, issued several weeks ago, was served this morning. Hutchinson has been coxman for J. Reed Whipple.

DOGS AND SHEEP.—A correspondent of the Colestar, N. S., Sun writes: The people of Five Islands, N. S., have been going into dog raising on quite an extensive scale, until nearly every house has one dog, and others with two and some three. That dog raising and sheep raising do not agree well together, we have had a specimen of late, when a number of dogs made a raid upon Bentley's Mountain and left from 30 to 40 dead carcasses, mostly belonging to James Bentley, son of Jonathan Corbett and Osborne Waldman. Four of the dogs met a watery grave. We think this discouraging to Mr. Bentley, as he left California to come home and work the place, and was going into sheep raising quite extensively. Outrages like this do more to drive our young men away than any thing else.

The Esquimaux Fortifications.

Ottawa, July 29. General Herbert, who has lately returned from England, says that until he has reported to the Minister of Militia the results of his mission, he is not at liberty to indicate what arrangements he has made in regard to the construction of fortifications at Esquimaux. He might fairly state, however, that his mission was successful with regard to the works when the works would be commenced. There is no likelihood of any portion of the appropriation for the construction lapsing because of its being used. The construction will be pushed forward without delay.

Coal Miners on Strike.

LONDON, July 29. In accordance with the decision of the miners' Federation, the great strike of English coal miners was inaugurated yesterday. Something like 350,000 men are directly affected. No disorder has been reported from any quarter.

The Trouble in Siam.

BANGKOK, July 29. The Siamese government continues making every effort to maintain peace with France. They are encouraged by the events of the last twenty-four hours to believe that an understanding will be reached shortly. The French flag has been hoisted at Hoh Si Chang.

LONDON, July 25. Sir Charles Tupper will sail for Canada August 17th, by the steamer Parisian. Sir John Thompson and Hon. C. H. Tupper will sail as usual in judgment in the Behring Sea case is rendered.

An Increase of Revenue.

Ottawa, July 29. The total amount of inland revenue accrued last year shows an increase of \$40,740 over the preceding year.
