

ACT QUICKLY TO SAVE LIFE

Doctors Amputate Man's Leg In Caved-In Tunnel

EDMONTON (CP)—Four mud-smearing doctors found under a tide of muddy water in a dramatic underground operation Wednesday to amputate the left foot of Emerson Knott and free him from a beam which pinned his leg after a sewer tunnel caved in.

Spring Park Meeting Rejects Plan For New School Building: Suggests Addition Of Wing

BURIED TO NECK

Knott was given a general anesthetic and was unconscious when four doctors amputated the foot. Knott's condition was described as good following the operation. Mike Pagliuso said he saw a section of wall slide down, pitching Knott on his back and burying him to the neck. When he was dug free, they found Knott's left ankle pinned behind the vertical beam he was installing.
