

Islanders Deadlock M.M.H.L. Finals At 4-4

Japanese Mining Engineer Sets New Mark In Boston Marathon Win

BOSTON, (AP) — Japan's tiny Kenji Yamada, a 25-year-old mining engineer who weighs 108 pounds, shaved six minutes, 48 seconds off the historic Boston Marathon record Monday with a smashing 2:18.51 performance against a brilliant international field of 158.

Yamada, whose first and last names literally mean "respect mountain field," clinched his triumph over his only serious challenger, Finland's Veikko Karvonen, and Sweden's Earl Gosta Persson, by running their teams out on killing "Heartbreak Hill," the last of the course's three steep grades, about six miles from the finish.

Karvonen completed the 26 mile 385-yard course in 2:18:19 and Persson in 2:19:36. Japanese champion Katsuo Nishida finished fourth in 2:21:35. All four were under the record.

The old mark was 2:25:39, set by Korean Yun Suh in 1947.

Canadian 16th

Clarence Cote, four-time winner from St. Hyacinthe, Que., led the

Canadian contingent home with a 16th place in 2:42:46. Seven-time winner, 65-year-old Clarence Demar of Boston was 82nd in 3:36:32. Young Johnny Kelley, heretofore regarded as a Boston University star, snapped the foreigners' string by finishing fifth in 2:38:19. The others in the first 10, in order, were Hideo Hamamura of Japan, oldest runner, 67; John Kelly, the last American victor 1945, another Japanese, 67; Kura o Hiroshima, Johnny Lafferty of Boston and Hawaii's Norman Tamana, who placed fifth a year ago.

Mexico's lone entry, Pedro Peraltia Jimenez, made the sad mistake of wearing new shoes for the punishing endurance test. After they raised blisters during the first mile, he ran in his stocking feet before dropping out almost at the halfway mark.

Cote was the only member of the huge Canadian delegation to be regarded seriously. But that four-time victor never was able to get far up in the pack. Barry Lush of Hamilton turned in the second best Canadian performance by finishing 27th and his home townsman, Bill Husband, wound up 38th.

Boston Red Sox Take Twin Bill From Senators

The slugging display by the young first-baseman, who did his power-hitting for Kentville Wildcats of the Halifax and District League three years ago, served notice on Red Sox fans that the departure of such titans as Ted Williams, Vern Stephens, Wall Droop and Bobby Doerr hasn't left Boston without dynamite at the plate.

The first homer by the 23-year-old Temple University graduate broke a 19-inning scoreless streak for the Sox, whose double victory boosted them into third place in the standings.

In the National League, Robin Roberts led the door, New York Giants with three hits to lead Philadelphia Phillies to a 2-1 victory, evening his score with New York's Larry Jansen, who beat him on opening day. Granny Hamner's ninth-inning home run broke up the battle with Johnny Wyrostek accounting for the first Philadelphia run the same way in the sixth.

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STALLION ENROLMENT

According to the provisions of the Stallion Enrolment Act all stallions two years old and over, standing for service in this Province, must be enrolled in the records of the Department of Agriculture. Horses offering for service must be inspected and graded and carry an inspection certificate. Applications for enrolment and inspection should be made immediately.

Applications for enrolment should be accompanied with the required fee of Two Dollars (\$2.00) and should include name of horse, breed, age, colour description and registration number, if horse is registered.

Stallion owners who use horses for service not enrolled or inspected, or in grades not authorized by the Act will be subject to the penalty provisions of the Act. Only horses enrolled, graded and authorized by the Department of Agriculture will be permitted to travel for public service. All horses that have graded "out" will not be permitted to stand or travel for service.

Pound Out Impressive 6-2 Win Over Atlantics In Spirited Contest

The Halifax Atlantics won't soon forget the Charlottetown Forum and the treatment accorded them by the Islanders in their last game here as they fell before the determined Charlottetown attack by a 6-2 score last night and saw four game apiece.

The scripts were completely reversed in last night's well played hockey game at the Forum and the man who played the biggest part in it was left winger Marcel Clements. The big raw-boned defenseman scored three times as he let Hughie Campbell worry about the checking duties.

Murph Chamberlain pulled a switch that aided the Islanders extensively. He moved Lyle Wiseman back to defense and shifted Steve Brklicach up to right wing. Wiseman turned in a terrific chore on the blueline and gave the Islanders defense the solid plugging that it needed.

The Islanders were a super-charged outfit as they jumped on the Atlantics from the opening whistle and raced into a 3-0 lead in the first twenty minutes. Each team scored twice in the middle period and the Islanders added one in the third.

Clements with three goals led all marksmen. Other Islanders goals were scored by Wiseman, Bob Gray and Gus Gustavson. Bob Gray scored one for Halifax and Billy Watson received credit for the other.

A packed house watched the Islanders even the series. The deciding game will be played at Halifax on Wednesday night.

Playing coach Dugger MacNeill, wearing his gear to protect his injured cheek, played his first game of the series, taking the place of the injured Frank Bergeron. MacNeill teamed up with Genie Joe Lepine to form one defense unit for the Atlantics.

The Islanders were in control nearly all the way as they outplayed the visitors by a big margin. The locals passing plays were working smoothly, the defense was solid and Al Millar was again superb in goal.

The Atlantics flashed their best form early in the second period and again in the last half of the third. Both their goals came in the middle frame but their efforts in the last frame were thwarted. Millar, in the net, received Kelly and O'Donoghue handed out fifteen penalties with ten of them going to the Atlantics. Penalties played a big part in the goals as the Islanders scored four times while Halifax was short-handed and the Atlantics scored both their goals while an Islander sat in the penalty box.

Clements combined with Hub Beaudry to send the Islanders into a 1-0 lead at the 7:34 mark of the first period. The hard-working Hubber, playing his usual hard game, took the puck from behind the Halifax net and fired a weak back-handed shot that MacNeill stopped. Clements grabbed the rebound and slipped the puck under the goalie into the opposite corner.

Twenty seconds after he scored Clements clashed with Joe Lepine in a roughing duel and the two went to the penalty box with minors. A few seconds later they were joined by Ronnie Hurst who snared Carroll Bloom into the boards. While the Islanders were a man short Gustavson, Wiseman and Beaudry held the Atlantics off the score sheet.

MacNeill and Bloom were sitting out minors and King a misconduct when the Islanders struck for two goals within the space of a minute on well executed power plays.

Lyle Wiseman blasted home the first goal with a sizzling drive from about forty feet. He took a short pass from Gustavson inside the blueline and drilled a shot that MacMeekin just managed to tip with his stick.

Thirty-nine seconds later Wiseman engineered a play with George McLagan to set up Clements for the Islanders third goal. Wiseman fed McLagan a pass inside the Halifax blueline and Clements deflected McLagan's hard low shot into the corner of the Halifax cage.

Both teams scored one disallowed goal. Lauffman kicked the puck past Millar at the 13 minute mark and Whitlock scored on an off-side play a minute later.

George McLagan handed out the best body check of the period when he turned over Hayes at the 18 minute mark.

The second period was only 31 seconds old when Clements was chased with a minor penalty for cross-checking Hughie Campbell. While he was off the Atlantics counted two goals and came within an ace of changing the course

of the game.

Lyle Wiseman scored the first goal for the Islanders with a 20 foot backhander into the Islanders cage. He was working a passing play inside his own line with Gus Gustavson when his back-hand pass went astray and zipped into the open side of the net. Billy Watson received credit for the goal.

Defenceman Bob Hayes made it 3-2 less than a minute afterwards by drilling a 30-foot screener shot into the top of the cage. The goal followed a wild scramble around the Islanders net.

The teams played an even terms game for the next several minutes until Ronnie Hurst started the play by taking the puck from Watson at the side of the Halifax net. Hurst slid around the cage and centered out front to waiting Clements. Marcel whacked the die into the twines from about 25 feet out.

Play speeded up during the middle part of the period with the line of Beaudry, Clements and Hurst playing outstanding hockey and when they went to the bench for a rest the Whitlock, Gray, Holdaway unit came on to maintain the pressure.

Bob Gray scored the final goal of the period while Bob Bowman of the Atlantics sat in the penalty box. Gray took a pass from Whitlock and fired a slap shot that struck Bloom's leg and bounced towards the net. MacMeekin stopped the puck but it struck Hayes skate and hopped into the cage.

Seconds later Holdaway and Whitlock sent Gray into the clear on a perfect passing play but this time MacMeekin made the stop.

Hurst tested MacMeekin with a hard shot 30 seconds after the start of the third period but the stocky one made the stop on his skate.

Joe Lepine was chased for holding Bob Gray at the 4:04 mark and while he was off the Islanders scored their final goal. Gary Gordon shot the puck into the Halifax zone took Bloom out of the play and centered the puck to Gustavson. Gus took two strides and drilled a scorcher through MacMeekin's pads.

Seconds later Hayes was banished for slashing Brklicach. The line of Gordon, Pawlshyn and Brklicach along with the defense of McLagan and Gustavson swarmed all around the Halifax net and could not connect.

Millar came up with a sharp stop off Billy Ford around the nine minute mark and on the return play MacMeekin was brilliant as he stopped Beaudry with a sprawling save. Twice shortly after the midway mark of the game, Miller made a save on clear chances. On one occasion Watson had a breakout but Miller came out to poke-check the puck away.

Clements drew the last penalty of the game for cross checking Bloom. While he was off the Islanders scored their last goal. Whitlock by King for the last sensational play of the contest.
