

Island Meeting Is Drawing Near

SUMMERSIDE — Plans are nearing completion for the 11th annual P.E.I. provincial conference of United Church of Canada Men.

Sessions will be held at the Montgomery Hall in Charlottetown during the coming Labor Day weekend, September 2, 3 and 4.

The theme chosen for this year's conference is "The Church Has Seven Days".

Speakers will be Canon H. L. Puxley, presently an ecumenical leader in the world council of churches and recently president of Kings College in Halifax; and Ralston Young of New York City, better as "Red Cap 42".

Both men have spoken to island gatherings before and are widely known.

The weekend meetings, formerly called the "Stanhope Conference", are being organized and sponsored by the P.E.I. Presbytery Men's Council of the United Church Men under the direction of David L. Murphy, Parkdale, who is the provincial president.

Conference chairman is David Hall, Charlottetown, with Windsor, Seattle in 1:27.8; Tessa Harvey, Vancouver, in 1:27.8 and Irene Sigismund, Vancouver, in 1:28.6.

Muir, 13, of Kimberley, South Africa, set an unofficial world record of 2:28.2 Thursday night in the women's 200-yard backstroke at the British Columbia centennial swim meet.

Miss Muir, who already holds the world 110-yard and 200-meter backstroke mark, shaved 3-10th of a second off the world 220-yard backstroke mark.

The former record was set by Satoko Tanaka of Japan in February, 1963, at Perth, Australia, and equaled by Linda Ludgrove of England last September.

Miss Muir gradually drew away from Elaine Tanner of Vancouver, a 15-year-old student who holds the Canadian record.

New Swimming Record Set At B.C. Swim Meet

By DON MACLACHLAN VANCOUVER (CP) — American Sue Jones Thursday set an unofficial world record of 1:18.3 in a women's 110-yard breaststroke heat at the British Columbia centennial swim meet.

The 18-year-old from Palo Alto, Calif., had a 20-yard lead when she finished her heat 1.3 seconds under the world mark jointly held by Karen Bayer of East Germany and Diana Harris of England.

Miss Jones completed her first lap on the 55-yard University of British Columbia outdoor pool in 37 seconds, turning several feet ahead of her opponents.

Dark horse Zac Zorn of Los Angeles unofficially set a Canadian open record of 34.0 as he led swimmers into the final of the men's 110-yard freestyle. Zorn, 20, was 1.5 seconds ahead of the joint Canadian and open native record held by Sandy Gilchrist of Ocean Falls, B.C. and Dan Sherry of Hamilton, their Canadian native mark stands.

Greg Charleton of Los Angeles followed in 55.8, John Wilson of Seattle in 56.1, Luis Nicolao of Buenos Aires in 56.2 and Bob Casting of Lethbridge, Alta., in 56.3 and Geoffrey Grylls of Port Elizabeth, South Africa in 56.3.

Times were slow in the women's 110-yard freestyle heat with Poky Watson, 17, of Santa Clara, leading six swimmers into the final in 1:02.1.

Ann Fairlie of South Africa was second in 1:03.4, Pat Gibson of Vancouver third in 1:06.7.

Miss Jones' mark, which put her 5.5 seconds ahead of her nearest opponent, was accepted by the Canadian Amateur Swimming Association, which is running the meet.

Zorn came within 3-10 of a second of the world record set by Frank Wiegand of East Germany in Berlin a year ago.

Joining Miss Jones in the final were Shirley Vand er Poel of Johannesburg, South Africa, in 1:21.3; Lynn Colella, Seattle, in 1:23.7; Kathy John-
