### Senators Dump Boston Sox 4-1

BOSTON (AP)—Pedro Ramos, mixing a sweeping curve with his fastball, doused the sputtering Red Sox with a fine three-hitter Wednesday as he pitched Washington Senators to a 4-1 victory over Boston.

An old Boston nemesis in Fenway Park—Roy Sievers—tagged his first home run on the campaign and scored on a wild pitch after walking. But it was Ramos, possessing little more than speed last year, who showed the way.

The 20-year-old righthander who had a 3.88 earned run average with the Senators last season, outpitched veteran Bob Porterfield who didn't have it against his former teammates.

NEW YORK (AP)—Gil Hodges slammed a home run, double and single, Jackie Robinson stole home and Carl Erskine pitched a seven-hitter as the Brooklyn Dodgers thrashed the New York Giants 7-2 Wednesday night to break a first place tie with the Milwaukee Braves and go out in front by half a game.

Erskine, giving no evidence of the arm ailment that troubled him last year, pitched a strong game as he went the distance for his first victory of the season. ## Bible Reading Fighter Back In Doncaster After Victory

DONCASTER, England (Reuters)—Kilone Lave, Negro heavyweight boxer from the South Seas and protégé of Queen Salote of Tonga, was back in Doncaster reading his Bible Wednesday after mauling Don Cockell, the British and Empire champion, in London Tuesday night.

Lave (pronounced lah-vay) took less than two rounds to end the ring career of Cockell. It took Rocky Marciano nine rounds to finish the pudgy, British pig-farmer in their title fight at San Francisco last May.

The 33-year-old Tongan is fast becoming as popular in this country as his beaming sovereign, Queen Salote, who captured the hearts of Britons when she left her South Sea island kingdom to attend the Coronation in 1953.

Son of a Methodist minister, Lave is deeply religious. He said he spent more than an hour reading the Bible before entering the ring against Cockell.

### PERSONAL INTEREST

Queen Salote takes a personal interest in Lave, a household servant in her Tongan palace. She writes to him two or three times a week and he writes to her. His first act after beating Cockell was to cable her news of the victory.

The "Tongan Torpedo" first got his name in the papers when he arrived unheralded in Auckland, New Zealand, claiming he was champion of the South Pacific.

He asked for a bout with New Zealand's heavyweight champion, Don Mullett, and backed his demand by knocking out four New Zealanders and two heavyweights imported from Australia.

Lave eventually earned a bout with Mullett and beat him on a seventh-round technical knockout. Then he went to Britain, paying his own sea passage.

He lost in one round to former British champion Johnny Williams. Since then, however, the 200-pound Tongan has knocked out five opponents including former Italian champion Ueber Baciliere and now Cockell.

He has lost two decisions in Britain—one of them hotly disputed.
