THE HORSE TRADE.—The number of horses exported from Montreal to the United States during the past fiscal year, ending June 30th, was 7,093, costing \$683,110.11, against 8,267 head for the year previous, valued at \$670,657.89, showing a decrease of 1,174 in the number of animals shipped, but an increase in value of \$12,452.22. The average cost per head during the past year was \$82.39, against \$81.12 for the previous year.

THE first prosecution under the Scott Act was commenced at the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this forenoon. The defendant was Mr. Stephen Carroll, Saloon Keeper, Dorchester Street. He yesterday opened his house in defiance of the law and sold to all without distinction. The rush of thirsty souls to his door was so great that at times the way was blocked by crowds. He was promptly served with a summons and appeared to-day to answer the charge. Mr. Hodgson, Q. C., appeared on behalf of the prosecution and L. H. Davies, Esq., on behalf of the defendant. At the request of the defendant's counsel, the case was adjourned until Monday, when the court will go fully into it. We learn that one of the most important points to be raised by the defense is the invalidity of the election for this city.—the objection to which is that the electors of Royalty voted for the adoption of the Act in the city, and that they had no legal right to do so, according to the provisions of the Act.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

EUROPE AND THE EAST.

LONDON, Aug. 4. The Times says Baker Pasha will leave England shortly to take command of Turkish troops in Tripoli.

The Daily News, discussing the proposed amendments to the Land Bill in the Lords, says: "The obstruction offered to Liberal measures will continue so long as the constitution of the House of Lords secures the presence of an overwhelming Tory majority whatever may be the preponderance of Liberal opinion in the country. The modification of the second Chamber is a question which the Lords are rapidly bringing into the range of practical politics."

CORK, Aug. 4. Swanton, the old gentleman who was shot, supposed mortally, near Ballydehob, July 31, is much improved.

PARIS, Aug. 4. Unless there is a change in the disposition of the country which is not anticipated it may be taken for granted that Gambetta will obtain a majority in the new Chamber of Deputies.

LONDON, Aug. 4. The Liberal leaders in the Lords, except Granville, had a conference with Gladstone to-day to ascertain what amendments to the Land bill the Government are willing to accept. Granville was present in the House of Lords to-day, although he had to be wheeled to his seat. Lord Denmore's motion, of which he gave notice on Tuesday, for the rejection of the Land bill of the House going into committee to-day, was rejected without a division.

In the Central Criminal Court, Patrick Talfourd Hickie was found guilty of threatening to kill Hon. W. E. Forster, unless he released the Irish prisoners and resigned the chief secretaryship for Ireland; the verdict was accompanied with a recommendation to mercy. The counsel for the Crown said Mr. Forster desired that the lightest sentence consistent with justice might be given. The sentence was postponed.

In the Lords, to-day, the first amendment to the Land Bill, providing for execution from the operation of the bill of parts of estates managed on the English system, was adopted without division. The amendment stood in the name of the Duke of Argyll, (Liberal), and was carried by a vote of 219 to 67, giving the landlord a right to compensation in case of the sale of a holding of which he had formerly bought up the tenant right. An amendment offered by Earl Donoughmore (Conservative) to clause of the Land Bill limiting compensation for disturbance to £250, which was opposed by the Government, was carried. The Duke of Argyll voted with the minority. Salisbury's amendment that the words "The court should have reference to interests of tenant and landlord respectively," be struck out, was carried.

Lord Lansdowne's amendment to strike out the words "prohibiting court from entering a proposal for resumption of any part of holding for any purpose other than for providing for laborers cottages and gardens during the statutory term," was carried.

Lord Salisbury's proposal to exempt the English managed estates from the jurisdiction of the law court for fixing judicial rent was agreed to without division. The amendment including tenancies from £100 upwards from the operation of the bill was withdrawn. The debate then adjourned until Friday, it still being in the clause.

ROME, Aug. 4.

The Pope to-day held a secret consistory at which 22 cardinals were present. The Pope referred to recent disturbances here. Osservatore Romano says the Pope declared the disturbances proved that the Vicar of Christ enjoyed neither liberty nor safety in Rome. He was, however, prepared to confront the dangers of the future.
