when a cow gets sick on the Prairies,
clang goes the gate on the U. S.
livestock market and we have
no place to send our livestock."
Canada, Mr. Shaw emphasized,
must make every effort to regain
its former markets. He admitted
he did not know just how this can
be done, but felt that there must
be a way of regaining this lost
ground. Industrialization of Can-
ada, the deputy minister said, had
taken many men from the farms.
An example of this is to be found
in Prince Edward Island where the
last census showed the number of
farms reduced by 2,000, and many
other farms used not for agricul-
tural purposes but simply as homes.

Food, Mr. Shaw told the gather-
ing, is as important to peace as
are guns, and while it is necessary
to provide arms for allies, they
should be provided with food as
well when and where they need it.
