Geological Probe Suspended Here

The diamond drilling rig which has been doing "surface drilling" in the province for more than two months, to gather geological information, was expected to wind up its work at Crown Point yesterday, it was learned from B. Graham Rogers, geological officer for the province.

It is expected that the drilling rig will be back next autumn, and Mr. Rogers, who said the drill ran into difficulty due to the heavy silt formation at Crown Point.

The "exploratory drilling" that was done was to check for "surface formations" and to examine the geology of a 2,000-foot deep shaft.

The hope was to get enough information out of this shallow drilling, to warrant deeper drilling at a later date, Mr. Rogers said.

All cores from the one and one-half inch diameter drill are being sent back to Ottawa, where they will be studied by experts to determine formations. This layers of salt, it was learned, have been found here in drilling efforts in the past, and it was "very heavy drilling for their light rig," he said.

The procedure was likened by Mr. Rogers to a farmer soil-testing his land to find what properties it contained, so he could determine future action on his farm.

Three Injured Drivers Are Fined \$75 Each By Prince Co. Magistrate

SUMMERSIDE — Three men were fined \$75 and costs each on 15 days in jail by Prince County Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonnell on charges of driving motor vehicles while their abilities were impaired by alcohol, during a busy court session yesterday.

Louis Gaudet, of Summerside, was apprehended by Highway Murphy, the St. Eleanor's village policeman, and at an earlier sitting of the court he entered a plea of not guilty, at which time the evidence for both the crown and the defence was heard.

George Henry Nelson, of Stanley Bridge, represented by J. Watson MacNaught, QC, pleaded guilty to the charge, which was apprehended at Richmond by Sgt. Robert MacLean of the Summerside RCMP detachment.

The other case was brought forward by the Borden RCMP detachment, as the result of their apprehending Melvin George Doucay, of Albany, on March 17, in Albany.

A fine of \$50 and costs or 30 days was assessed against Arthur Ray Fayerly, of Carleton, after he pleaded guilty to a charge of driving while his license was suspended.

A Cape Traverse man, Sheldon James O'Halloran, was a fine of \$50 and costs on a charge of damaging the house of Joe McBride, Borden, by smashing a window, and the accused was warned by Magistrate MacDonnell that this was the last time he could expect leniency from the court.

Judge Trainor Orders Crackdown on Slots

Judge C. St. Clair Trainor said in a crackdown on slot machines during a session of the Queens County Court yesterday.

Before passing sentence on two Charlottetown men convicted of a first charge in which slot machines were involved, Judge Trainor suggested that it was time for the appropriate department took some action to get P.E.I. of these machines.

"I have always been opposed to slot machines and other such devices being present in clubs and other establishments," he said.

"I suggest that the department of the attorney-general should take the appropriate steps to have these illegal machines done away with."

The matter arose when Deputy Attorney-General J. Arthur McGuigan commented on the sentence to be meted out to Elmer Daniel O'Brien and Francis Vernon Donnelly, both of Charlottetown.

Mr. McGuigan said that although the break and entry into the Railway Employees Club, Charlottetown, had involved the removal of money from slot machines, which is illegal, it still constituted a serious offense of the commission.

On the other hand, Lester O'Donnell, counsel for O'Brien, claimed that the portion of the theft which involved slot machines was a "minor matter."
