

# Col. MacDonald Returns From Meeting Of Legion

Col. J. A. MacDonald of Cardigan returned home early this week after attending a meeting of the Dominion Council of the Canadian Legion at Ottawa. After several days' deliberations the members of the Council met with the Prime Minister and the Cabinet on Thursday morning, November 10th. For the past few years the Council has concentrated the main effort of its work on obtaining an increase in the basic rates of War Veterans Allowance. This year their recommendations were granted almost in their entirety and it was requested that the remaining one, that of more substantial increase in the permissible earnings ceilings, be implemented as soon as possible. Council urged again that veterans of World War I who served in England be enabled to qualify for W.V.A. in the same manner as those of World War II veterans.

It was strongly recommended that where applicants for disability pensions who had served in an actual theatre of war were found to have a disability resulting from an injury or disease not recorded on enlistment, such should be presumed to have incurred since enlistment. It was also requested that awards for pensions be made retroactive to the date of application.

Various reports including those of the Service Bureau, Educational and Welfare services were discussed along with the Army Benevolent Fund, World Veterans Federation and many other matters.

The new Legionary, which will go out to all members beginning in January, will be of a size and format similar to that of the present Legion and will be available in a French edition to any who request it. It will be a considerable improvement over the old edition and the first copy will be awaited with interest by Legion members.

Legion membership is exceptionally high and the new Poppy is expected to bring sales to an all time high again this year.

## Walt Disney Presents Mighty Motion Picture

CinemaScope-Technicolor Drama, "20,000 Leagues Under the Sea" is a Miracle of Screen Entertainment. Man-eating tiger sharks, glinting jewels of a buried treasure, a pre-war wrecking squid, a submarine with a Victorian wardrobe, and the vast beauty of a sparkling tropical realm stretched out on the ocean floor, all come to life in their original splendor as Walt Disney's newest live-action drama, "20,000 Leagues Under the Sea," unfolds on the screen.

In the Jules Verne story such things as electrically propelled jet guns, an explosion with an odd characteristic mushroom shape, and the ability of a ship to surface or submerge are not part of a modern movie-writer's mind. They were described in amazingly accurate detail by a man who lived and died before the advent of submarines, before motion pictures were known, before the extensive field of dynamics was even dreamed of, before such topical things as radio, television, airplanes, diesel engines, jet planes or nuclear fission were part of daily life. Indeed in 1905, the year Verne died, only the most experimental dreamers saw any future in such a foolish thing as the horseless carriage.

Yet Verne's 19th century concept of twentieth century life was so accurate that it is difficult to bear in mind that the Disney CinemaScope-Technicolor film is based on a highly imaginative story by a modern writer.

Kirk Douglas, James Mason, Paul Lukas and Peter Lorre star in the live-action film which Richard Fleischer directed and Buena Vista distributes. Made on location, literally on the floor of the Caribbean Sea, the production required special cameras, special training for cast and crew, an entirely different movie-making technique than that usually employed.

Disney, like Verne, has demonstrated many times in the past the full scope of his imaginative powers. His ability to invent practical tools with which to capture a desired cinematic effect comes to the fore again. Inspired by the distinguished classic which has been a dream production of his for years, Disney's technical genius once more surmounts untold production problems and brings to the screen a superb film version of a book the popularity of which has remained constant for almost a century.
