"Presented to Mr. John Corbett, Architect, by the Bishop of Charlottetown, as a token of gratitude, for his honesty, devotedness, and ability in superintending the building of schools, churches, and the Episcopal Residence, in the Diocese of Charlottetown."

LATEST NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

To Reading Room and Examiner.

Duessy, N. S., Dec. 15th.—This morning while a gang of labourers were working at gravel pit, on the Western Centre Railway, about three miles from Digby, and the bank of earth under which they were excavating, suddenly gave in; killing one man named Charles Ryan, and severely injuring two or three more, whose names have not been ascertained. The body of Ryan was fearfully mutilated. George Saunders was the only other man seriously injured. He is expected to recover.

LONDON, Dec. 15.—Turkey has informed the Suez Canal Company, that it considers its management satisfactory, and has no intention to interfere.

The barque, Terrie, from Newfoundland, reports passed the French steamer L'Americaine, from New York, on 1st December.

The Archbishop of Cologne, left that city yesterday, and is not expected to return. It is understood that he delegated his power to subordinate ecclesiastics.

New York, Dec. 15.—The time of the Alabama Claims Court has been extended, six months.

Duessy, N. S., Dec. 16.—Robbins, the murderer was hanged this morning.

Ottawa, Dec. 16.—The Railway policy of the Quebec Government has been adopted by the House. The vote stood 40 to 20. Mr. Joly has been proposed to the leadership of the Opposition. Brehaud succeeds him.

LONDON, Dec. 16.—Two hundred British soldiers, auxiliaries consisting of irregular troops and police, routed to 4 to 8 hundred Malays, near Poleak—killing 60 to 80 of them. Of the British force 8 were killed and 125 wounded.

Thomson, who was the cause of the explosion at Bremen, has twice attempted suicide, but is yet alive. He has confessed the names of his accomplices, which the authorities will not reveal. The number injured by the explosion, already reaches eighty, and others of the injured are not expected to recover. Forty corpses were buried on Tuesday—altogether with some chests filled with unidentified fragments of bones.

The managers of the Direct Cable Co., state that the recent breaking of the cable must have been by some vessel, by accident or design. They offer £1000 for the discovery of the vessel.

On motion it was resolved that Mr. Arthur Simpson take the chair, and the undersigned be secretary. After the question had been discussed and speeches made by Arthur McEwen, Esq., M. L. C., Messrs. John Hogan, Alexander McNeill, John Simpson, Hugh John Montgomery, William Hogan, and Dr. McNeill, and several others, it was moved by Dr. McNeill and seconded by John Hogan,

That Hogan, North and South Ristice, comprise a large and populous tract of country, second to no part of this island.

And whereas, these sections have many natural disadvantages to contend with through their inaccessibility.

Therefore Resolved, that in the opinion of this meeting the Local Government should at once take up the question of railway extension and pass such laws as will secure for this inestimable boon at no distant day.

It was then moved and seconded, and carried, that a committee of five be appointed to make arrangements, and advertise for a general public meeting in this place, and invite the local representatives and other leading politicians to attend. Said committee to consist of Dr. McNeill, Arthur Simpson, John Hogan, Hugh John Montgomery and John Simpson.

As other sections of the island are strenuously advocating this question, delegates from these sections are cordially invited.

SHIPPING.

The Bark "Isabella Hayden" wrecked off Arichat. Crew saved.

By cable to Messrs. Peake Bros. & Co.—Barque *Moselle* arrived at Plymouth on the 15th inst. making the passage in 21 days and received orders for London. This splendid ship has done good work this year, having left London for Charlottetown in April last, with a cargo of general merchandise, arriving at Charlottetown early in May, returning to Plymouth with a cargo of grain, returning to Charlottetown with limestone; thence to London with cargo of deals, and arrived back from London with a cargo of general merchandise; thence with a cargo of oats for Plymouth, where she arrived at above date—making her three round trips as usual for the season. This favorite vessel will at once go on the berth at London for spring goods.

To the Editor of the Examiner.

DEAR SIR—On the night of the 10th November last, I crossed the Gulf from Gut of Canada in the Evening, loaded with limestone from Grand Digby. Had to run into Georgetown on account of a gale blowing, and it being a bar harbor, could not enter with safety in the dark. Came to anchor in Georgetown harbor about three, on the morning of the 11th, the gale from south-east increased to almost a hurricane. About twelve o'clock, a m., lost both anchors, had to look for a safe place to run ashore, which we fortunately found. By lightening her part of her cargo, got her off on evening of 13th; found both chains and anchors, found gentlemen in Georgetown very kind in assisting me to get the vessel off; on Tuesday morning, 16th left Georgetown harbor for Grand River on account of being calm all day; we did not get into Grand River until dark, as the channel for about a half mile is crooked and narrow, we had to anchor for the approach of daylight, as we had to still proceed about five miles further up the River. But on Friday, 17th, it blew a complete gale of wind from the north-west, which was right ahead of us. About 15 a. m., dragged our anchors, when the vessel struck on the flats, both chains parted, and as there was a very high tide that night, we were driven ashore, high and dry inside Grand River beach, but the vessel is not hurt. That night we thought we would perish, as it turned very cold, and the sea made a clear break over us. On Friday, the 19th, left for home, locked the cabin, and as we thought left everything secure. On Tuesday, 23rd went down river to the vessel, found the cabin had been opened, and left open, and an old coat that had been hung up in it left lying on the deck, and a quantity of matches taken, and two barrels of herring taken out of the hold, also a very long handled steel spear was taken, the barrels; the meat tins, or thieves left, but the contents they carried off. Now you see, Mr. Editor, we have worse than pirates robbing somewhere, not far off, for a pirate would be more honorable than to rob a poor, unfortunate man. Perhaps they call themselves christians, that did the deed, but they are something of the stamp of christianity, as the Turk remarked about to an English merchant, that had landed in some part of Turkey, with a number of boxes of merchandise, and asked the Turk where he could get a watchman to watch his goods for the night. Oh, says the Turk, you need not be afraid, there is not a Christian within fifty miles of this place. But I think that there were some of these Christians, came too near my little vessel.

WAS IT A MURDER?

A MAN MISSING—A JACKET FOUND AND A BLOODY AXE—SUSPECTED MURDER—TWO MEN UNDER ARREST.

murders, which lead to the belief that murder has been committed, reach us from Alberton. According to these reports, three men—Robert Lateman, David Roche, [both riggers] and a sailor belonging to the barque *Sylvia*—were drinking at Mountain's tavern. On Friday morning Lateman was missing. His cap was found alongside the railway wharf at Cascumpe, and it was thought that he had fallen over and been drowned. Subsequently, however, a jacket, identified as his, was found on the wharf. This jacket was stained with blood. Then a blood-besmeared axe was picked up. Foil play was, of course, suspected, and his companions of the preceding night were placed under arrest. It is said that Roche's remark, when the drowning was reported, was—"not a man; only a Newfoundland dog has been drowned." Lateman was a native of Newfoundland. Roche belongs, it is said, to St. Peter's. We have no particulars respecting the sailor implicated. The affair will probably be investigated before the Magistrates to-day. The body of Lateman had not been found up to latest advices.
