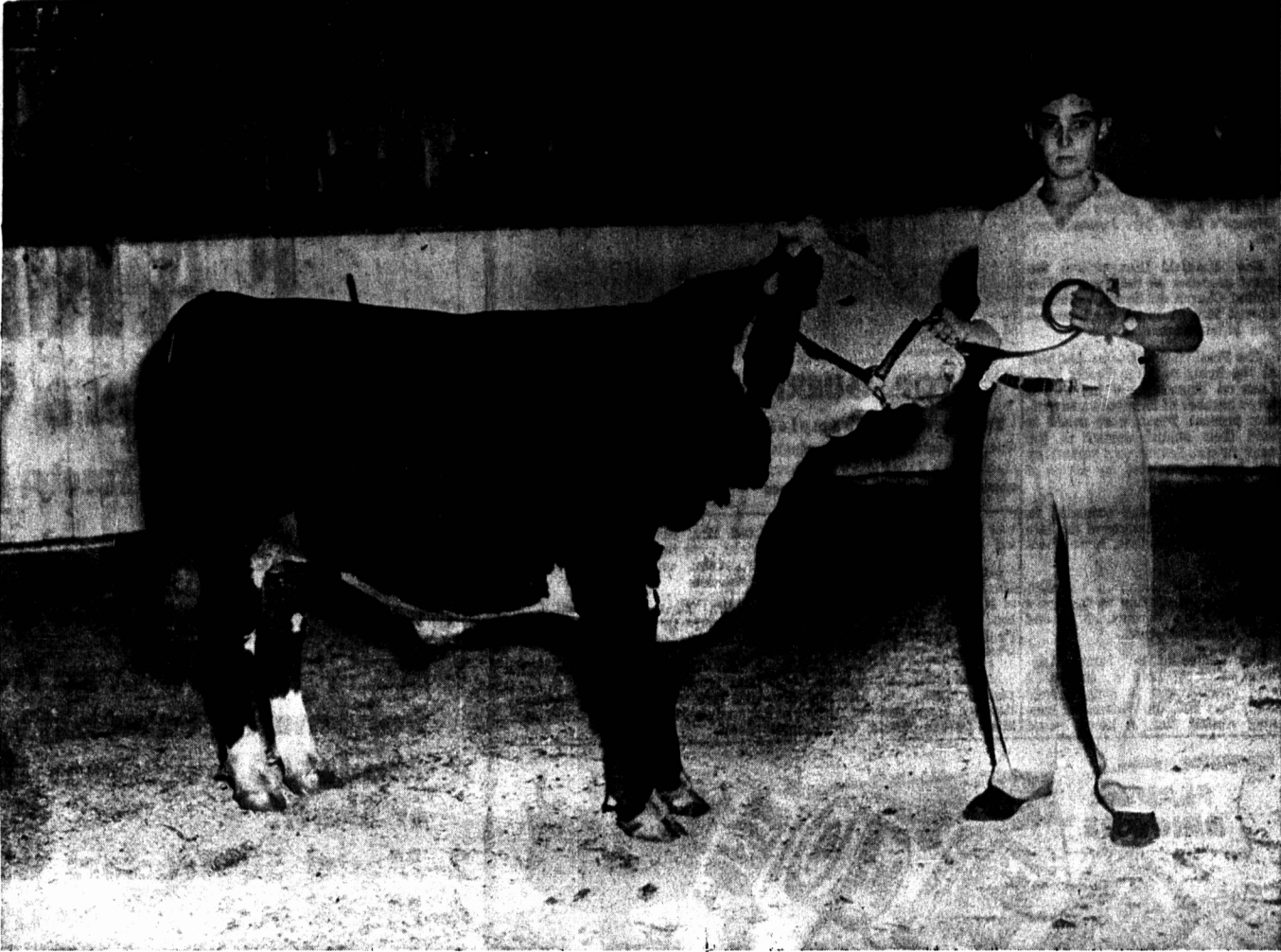
Mrs. James Evans, accompanied by her infant son, returned to her home in Burlington from Summerside on September 9. Bur.

Greater Demand For Arts Graduates Today

OTTAWA (CP)—The arts graduate—once the "Cinderella" of college graduates—is coming into his own says the Unemployment-Insurance Commission. After the Second World War the accent on specialization was so great "the arts graduate was the Cinderella among graduates," says a UIC bulletin on supply and demand of university graduates in the labor market. "Now the arts graduate is sought precisely because he is not a specialist," the report, issued today, says. The report—prepared by National Employment Service's executive and professional division—finds shortages of graduates in almost every profession except law. "Over the past year or two the general attitude of the business world towards the arts graduate has been changing," the bulletin says. It quotes a United States survey which found companies eager to hire liberal arts graduates "because they want men who can deal with people, and later become executives." "Some of the fields in which opportunities exist (for arts graduates) are—advertising, banking, personnel work, insurance, real estate, financial houses, and sales work," says the publication, issued for employers and NES placement officers. "College graduates generally are given the preference" in newspaper work, the bulletin comments. It says Canada produces so few graduates in journalism that it can seek for further recruits from other sources. The bulletin comments on several other professions: Agriculture—"Numbers (of graduates) are not enough to fill the needs." Architecture—"For the next two years graduates will be less than 100... drastically, these numbers will be too few to supply the needs." Dentistry—"There is a shortage of dentists in Canada and... it has reached a really critical stage." Education—"Demand is still greater than the supply in all grades." Engineering—"Even with... increases in enrolment the profession will not be overcrowded." Forestry—"A 50 per cent increase in enrolment in this course would pose no difficulties in placement." Medicine—"The shortage of doctors continues. The good old 'family' doctor shows signs of disappearing but there is still a great need of him. The rural areas of all provinces feel the pinch." Nursing—"The shortage of nurses... has not changed nor is any change anticipated." Social work—"As with other professions where the monetary return is comparatively low, there are not nearly enough graduates from the schools of social work to fill the demands."
