Canada Temperance Act!  
European News, etc.

*Special Dispatch to the Examiner.*  
Abdul Khan is still at Kundus. The mill people sacrificed at Mandalay for the restoration of the King's health were not burned but buried alive.  
It is announced that General Skobloff will not leave for Central Asia.  
The Supreme Court of Canada have announced that the decision on the constitutionality of the Canada Temperance Act will be given to-day, Tuesday.  
Miss Mary Mills, a daughter of ex-Minister Mills, died Sunday of consumption, aged 17 years.  
The wife of McKay Wright, ex-M. P. for Pontiac, who was a daughter of Senator Skead, is also dead.  
An Ottawa despatch says the New Brunswick Penitentiary case—Messrs. King and Tuck for New Brunswick, and Mr. Lash for the Dominion Government—was yesterday morning adjourned till Wednesday, in order that another question should be added and the case submitted.  
The Viceroy of India was to start for Simla on the 12th inst. It appears beyond doubt that he has placed his resignation in the hands of the Secretary of State; but is prepared to retain office until the arrival of his successor.  
A Berlin despatch says that the States which opposed Bismark's stamp bill have promised submission.  
Grave apprehensions are felt for the safety of the training ship "Atlanta," now 73 days out from Bermuda for Portsmouth. Eleven officers and 200 young seamen are on board.  
The Chilians are blockading Callao.  
Lord Lytton has resigned the Vice-Royalty of India.
