Prince Bismarck's Election.

Another Ballot Necessary.

BERLIN, April 18. The latest returns from Gieslenmude, where an election for the Reichstag was held on Wednesday, show that Prince Bismarck has not received sufficient votes for a choice. Another ballot is necessary.

THE MCGREEVEY LABEL SUIT

A BIG JOB ON HAND.

QUEBEC, April 18. Judge Andrews dismissed the application of Mr. Tartes' lawyers for delay in the McGreevey label case. It will now go ahead. The general opinion is that the editor of Le Canadian has a big job on hand and would like to get out of it.

Wharfage Regulations.

OTTAWA, April 18. The new regulations regarding the fees for harbors and wharves are gazetted. The old regulations provided that all steamboats making fast to wharves paid for each day, or portion of day, one dollar wharfage dues irrespective of tonnage, while sailing vessels were required to pay only in proportion to tonnage—thus placing steamboats at disadvantage and giving rise to complaint, the majority of steamboats using government wharves being of small tonnage, and the wharfage dues proving an onerous tax. According to the new regulations, steamboats pay dues at the rate of double those imposed upon sailing vessels, calculated upon tonnage according to following scale: On each steamboat under fifty tons twenty cents; over fifty and under one hundred tons, thirty cents; over one hundred and under two, forty cents and so on. Steamboats having occasion to make use of the same wharf more than once the same day shall be required to pay dues only for first time and steamboats carrying mails shall pay the same dues as other steamboats, but they shall be entitled to preference of berth at wharf when engaged in delivering or receiving mails. Circulars have been issued to receivers of wharfage pointing out that no fees can be collected unless actual service is rendered, and forbidding receivers taking charge of any ship cargo or material contrary to the expressed wish of the master or owner. The receivers are warned not to proceed against any vessels unless in their belief strong measures are necessary.

Advertizing the Northwest.

MONTREAL, April 18. The Canadian Pacific Railway are about to undertake a new method of making the Northwest known to the people of Great Britain. A colonization or exhibition car will be filled with samples of products and sent to all parts of England and Scotland. By this means the company hopes to reach farmers of the old land.

The "Modus Vivendi."

LONDON, April 18. The second reading of the Newfoundland modus vivendi in connection with the lobster fisheries was postponed in the House of Lords to-day, until next Friday, to enable the counsel for Newfoundland delegates to appear at the bar.

Obituary.

HALIFAX, April 18. Martin P. Black died at 2 o'clock this morning (Saturday) after a protracted illness. He was one of the wealthiest merchants in Halifax, and retired from active commercial life a few years ago with three quarters of a million.
