Early Egyptians Used Wax Dolls

NEW YORK, July 28—(CP)—Wax dolls go back to the days of the ancient Egyptians who fashioned wax images of their deities. There is also abundant evidence, writes Imogene Anderson in "The American Collector," that they made miniature figures of human beings and dressed them in the prevailing fashion. Sent all over the world by France and England in latter days, they reached North America about the middle of the 18th century.

In 1790 a doll with hollow beehive head and arms, brown eyes that opened and closed with a wire pull, was imported from Paris to show the styles of the day. It was bought in Philadelphia by Benjamin Bourne of Bristol, R.I., member of Congress from 1790, as a gift for his niece, Miss Lillie E. Turner, daughter of Dr. Turner, who had been a surgeon in the Revolutionary Army.

"Miss Lillie," as she was called, still retains the original finery in which she crossed the ocean. Her white hair is adorned with real thread lace cap over which is a blue satin bonnet trimmed with rose colored silk. Her dress is a sheer white linen yellowed with age. She wears hand-made brown kid shoes and is, I believe, the oldest wire pull wax doll with an American history.

"Anstis Derby" was also a mannikin doll, sent over in 1826 from France to Salem, Mass., for Martha, the granddaughter of Elias Hasket Derby.

The individuality of the beautiful wax heads that came from England can easily be recognized. For many years these dolls had no equals in realistic and delicate qualities of beauty in France or Germany. The bodies of those made in the 18th century were usually of wood or of kid or cloth stuffed with bran or rags. They were long stiff and not jointed. The arms were often short in proportion to the bodies.

The glass eyes were difficult to manufacture, especially violet and sapphire. Consequently these colors are rarely found and the dolls that have them are much sought after. Dolls with brown eyes are usually older and rarer than those with light eyes which came into fashion after Queen Victoria ascended the throne. Then, every little girl wanted a doll with blue eyes like the Queen's and manufacturers, finding their brown-eyed dolls a drug on the market, sold them in Spain or elsewhere on the continent where they were eagerly welcomed.

Make Ice Well In Summertime

The preliminaries for the storage of ice on the farm should be completed long before the advent of winter. Many farmers who have promised themselves good ice storage have found that when winter comes there are difficulties in the way. This is particularly true of the ice-well refrigerator which is a favourite method on the farm in many parts of Canada. Summertime is the time for digging the well. As a means of preserving ice for household use, the ice-well refrigerator has no advantage over the storage of ice in a rough shed, but it certainly does provide facilities for holding milk and cream and for cold storage of other articles of food where a supply of ice cut from a stream or pond is not available. The ice-well is therefore of particular value to the dairy farmer during the hot summer months.

The ice-well refrigerator should be about 12 feet deep and of a diameter to suit requirements. It may be either round or square. The larger it is, the longer the ice will last. A well six feet in diameter filled six feet in depth with ice, will hold four tons. A handy size for a square ice-well is eight feet and eight feet deep. A depth of six feet of ice in a pit of this size will last about five months. In selecting a size for the ice-well, it is advisable to keep away from any well which supplies drinking water, as the seepage from the ice-well may contaminate it. If possible, a shady spot where there is some protection from sun and winds should be
