

Argentine Gov't Making Peace With Oil Firms

BUENOS AIRES (AP)—Argentina is progressing satisfactorily on agreements with the 13 oil companies whose multi-million-dollar contracts were annulled two months ago, a high official said Wednesday. Dr. Facundo Suarez, president of the state oil agency YPF (Yacimientos Petroliferos Fiscales), said U.S. officials of Cities Service and Tennessee Gas Transmission Co. of Houston were to arrive this week for talks on a proposed agreement. "I am confident a satisfactory agreement can be reached with each of the two companies," Suarez told The Associated Press. "Work toward reaching agreements also is progressing with other companies. A settlement is imminent with the two Argentine companies, Astra and Cadipsa. We are close to agreement with the Italian firm, E.N.I." Suarez indicated new works and services contracts would be signed with the companies. This has been the plan pushed by him and President Arturo Illia, who annulled the contracts Nov. 15. Illia alleged the contracts approved in 1958-1959 by then president Arturo Frondizi were illegal and against the best economic interests of the country.

Shippers End 3-Day Talks

WHITE SULPHUR SPRINGS, N.Y. (CPA) — About 150 shippers from the United States and Canada ended a three-day convention Wednesday at this West Virginia mountain resort. During the conference, the shippers representing the Canadian Dominion Marine Association and the U.S. Lake Carriers Association were told by Joseph H. McCann, administrator of the St. Lawrence Seaway Development Corporation that Great Lakes ports are not doing enough to promote themselves. He said Toronto, Chicago, Toledo and Milwaukee are exceptions. McCann said the corporation and its Canadian counterpart, the St. Lawrence Seaway Authority, would announce within a few weeks dates for receiving briefs on a current review of seaway tolls. A report on tolls is to be released in April or May.

DAMAGE FEARED

Dr. Pierre Camu, vice-president of the seaway authority, said the authority was reluctant to use ice-breakers to keep the seaway open during winter because of the possibility of damaging installations in confined sections. E. H. Thiele of the Cleveland Stevedoring Company replied: "You're all wet. You can keep the seaway open a lot longer if you want to." Dr. Camu said the problem had to be considered immediately. "Opening part of it isn't going to open all of it," he answered. Official closing date for the seaway is Nov. 30 but it is kept open as long as weather and ice conditions permit. Last year it closed Dec. 15.

Defence Reserves Will Be Studied

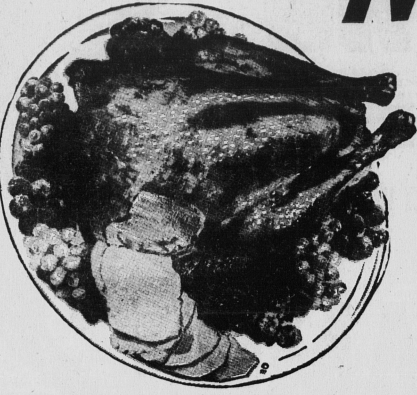
OTTAWA (CP)—Committees have been established by the defence department to study reorganization of the navy and RCAF reserves, officials said Wednesday. When Defence Minister Helliwell announced Dec. 3 reorganization of the reserves of the armed forces, he said a committee would be set up to study the overhaul of the militia, to be cut to 30,000 from 51,000 men. No committees were announced, however, for the navy and air force reserves. The reserve organizations asked for a committee study similar to that of the militia and the defence department now has agreed to this. The navy reserve is being reduced to 2,700 personnel from 4,000 and the RCAF auxiliary will be cut to 800 men from 2,200.

Appeal Planned On Art Show Ban

EDMONTON (CP)—A. D. Elliott, chairman of the Alberta Liquor Control Board, said Wednesday no request has been received from Distillers Corporation-Geagrams Limited to reconsider a decision prohibiting display of the company's art collection in Alberta. Charles Brumman, vice-president of the firm, said Tuesday the company would ask the board to reconsider because the collection is a public service undertaking and not designed to increase consumption of liquor. Mr. Elliott said he would draw the board's attention to the request when it is received. The board earlier ruled the collection could not be shown in Alberta. The province bans liquor advertising.
