SUPREME COURT meets at Georgetown tomorrow.

PERSONAL.—Mr. Roper, late of the Railway Department in this Island, is here on a visit. He is at the Rankin House.

INSURANCE.—The Queen Fire Insurance Company has ordered the payment of all losses by the St. John fire and contributed \$2,500 to the relief fund.

LACROSSE.—Owing to the unavoidable absence of several of the members the return match of Lacrosse, advertised to take place on Saturday, was postponed to a future day.

THE TEA at Little Sands was a very successful affair. Persons of every denomination contributed to the enjoyment of the day. The amount realized was, we hear, about \$50. The tea at Freetown was largely attended.

SUFFERINGS OF LOST FISHERMEN.—Gloucester, Mass., June 13.—The fishing schooner, Centennial, at this port from the Grand Banks, picked up, on the 15th of June, four Frenchmen of a vessel belonging to St. Pierre, Miquelon. Two persisted in searching for their vessel and were probably lost in the storm which arose soon after. The others were brought here.

CORRECTION.—In our summary of Mr. Fletcher's speech, made at the meeting of Friday in the Orange Hall, there was an error in the statement that Mr. Fletcher said "five of the Policemen were in sympathy with the rioters and would do nothing." What he did say was, that the Policemen were either in sympathy with the rioters or too cowardly to do their duty.

AN IMPOSTER.—A man calling himself Andrew McGillivray has been going about Halifax obtaining money from charitable people on the faith of representation that he had been burnt out of house and home at the St. John fire, had his wife and several small children to support and no means, &c. Yesterday afternoon he was arrested by Policemen Inglis, who had ascertained that his real name was McCleave, and that he was a native of a village near Charlottetown, where he had been arrested for begging under false pretenses some time ago. He was taken before the Stipendiary Magistrate, fined \$6 or 50 days, and told if found in the city again he will get 12 months imprisonment. He paid the fine and left.—Halifax paper.

MONTREAL, July 14 All quiet to-day. The four wounded men are recovering.

Hackett, the murdered man, will be buried on Monday. Orangemen from Ontario are coming down in large numbers to attend the funeral.

There is great indignation at the want of action of the Mayor, who is held morally responsible for the bloodshed.

The Orangemen have expressed a determination to walk next year.

"Irish Catholic Union" has condemned the rioting repudiating the action of their countrymen engaged in it.

The liabilities of Young, McNaughton & Co., shirt and cotton manufacturers, are placed at \$24,000; assets, \$7,100.

The Ottawa lumber trade is improving. The Americans are purchasing shipping culis freely.

Murray, of Toronto and Murray, of Montreal—two prominent merchants, are under arrest on charge of a conspiracy to defraud.

There is a good deal of excitement here over the riot in Charlottetown.

WAR DESPATCHES.

(Special to the Daily Examiner.)

LONDON, July 14.

Fighting is said to continue all through Thursday and yesterday with advantage to the Turks.

A serious engagement is also progressing near Beula.

It is rumored Muranis has tendered his resignation.

English provincial journals fiercely oppose British interference and advise letting Russia occupy Constantinople.

THE WAR.

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 13.

Many Musselmans with wives and children, fleeing before Russians, have been killed by Bulgarians in Khanbogan defile, between Ternova and Kezanlik.

St. PETERSBURG, July 13.

The Russian telegraphic agency says Prince Bismarck has declared in his opinion any mediation is at present impossible.

A Russian official despatch from Tiflis states that the Turkish forces have been defeated. When General Terkugassoff relieved Bayazid, it numbered 13,000 men, not 30,000 as reported in a previous despatch.

New YORK, July 13.

It was reported in Havana on the eighth that General Maiz no, Gomez and Vincent Garcia, with a large force, invaded Cienca Villos territory, defeating the Spaniards, killing over six hundred. Another encounter has taken place, but no particulars. Three war vessels has been ordered to relieve the Spanish forces in great haste. Yellow fever prevails among the Spanish troops.

LONDON, July 13.

The attempt of the Russians under Terkugassoff to relieve the besieged garrison at Bayazid failed, notwithstanding the garrison made a determined sortie. The Russians, after suffering severe loss, retreated to Mount Ararat, where they were attacked by the Turks, and again defeated. The Tur took many prisoners and captured six guns.

KARS, July 13.

Mulhar Pasha and the commandant of Kars are preparing a combined attack on the Russian centre, consisting of 45 battalions of infantry, 2 regiments of Cossacks and 13 field batteries. More than 30 siege batteries are in position 4,000 metres north-east of Kars.

LONDON, July 13.

The adjournment of the Greek Chamber is believed to mean that the King with the aid of British influence has gained the ascendancy over the war party, and that for the present, at least, apprehensions of Greek participation against Turkey will not be realized.

LONDON, July 13.

Bishop Von Kettler, of Mayence, is dead.

The Wimbledon meeting has thus far been very successful and the shooting in the first stage for the Queen's prize was exceedingly good. At Bow Street Police Court yesterday, Chief Inspectors Driscovitch, Micklejohn and Palmer, the best known officers of Scotland Yard Detective Service, and a solicitor named Froggatt, were arraigned at the instance of the treasury officials, accused of conspiracy to defeat the ends of justice in a recent celebrated confidence case in which a number of betting men were convicted of defrauding the Countess de Goncourt out of \$30,000. Froggatt was admitted to bail in \$2,500, but bail was refused for the officers.

VERY REV. DR. MACDONALD ON THE LATE DISTURBANCE.

IMMEDIATELY before the sermon yesterday, the Very Rev. Dr. McDonald addressed a few remarks to the congregation upon the proceedings of last Thursday. He declared that those who threw stones and created the disturbance were in no sense representatives of Catholics. They were "corner loafers," who seldom, if ever, went near the Church; and he protested against Catholics being held accountable for their evil deeds. He would not be so unreasonable as to hold respectable Protestants responsible because some Orangemen fired shots into the crowded streets. That Irishmen were not permitted to forget the day by displays calculated to irritate and annoy their feelings, bringing home as it did, and as it was intended to do, the recollection of years of suffering and wrong, was matter for deep regret. Those days were past and gone; and it was better to let the memory of them die out. He hoped that those who threw stones would be punished as they deserved; and that those who, in reckless disregard of the lives of their fellow citizens, discharged loaded firearms, would be dealt with as the law directed. In short, he trusted that all who broke the law would be punished.
