A RARE COIN.—We were shown on Monday, says the Hants Journal, a rare coin in the possession of Rev. E. McNab, of Newport. It is a bronze coin, issued in the reign of Domitianus, son of Vespasian, who was born 51 A. D., named Caesar in 69 A. D., and created emperor in 81 A. D. This coin was struck for capture of the Germans. On the reverse is a captive chained to a Roman standard.

A FINE GOLD BRICK.—The manager of the Philadelphia gold mining company has forwarded from Bridgewater, N. S., a fine gold brick weighing four hundred and sixty two ounces and worth in the vicinity of nine thousand dollars. This the second largest one month's crushing of any mine in western Nova Scotia and is the result of three weeks crushing by ten stamps and quantity of ore three hundred and twenty five tons. The mine is at North Brookfield.

SICKNESS IN NOVA SCOTIA.—A Halifax despatch says that measles are epidemic in several Nova Scotian towns along the line of the I. C. R. Diphtheria and scarlet fever also prevail. There have been numerous cases and several deaths from diphtheria at Brookfield. At Truro on Sunday last six little household treasures in as many afflicted homes lay dead from measles, and several have since died. At Amherst measles of a very severe type have aged with fatal effect.

FOOTBALL MEETING.—At the annual Spring meeting of the Abegweit F. B. C., held last evening at the office of Peters & Peters, the following officers were elected: President, G. E. C. to visit Charlottetown on May 24th. The Abegweits are likely to have a strong team this season, and a good game may be expected with the New Glasgow Club.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT

Summary of Proceedings.

THE BANKING BILL AGAIN.

OTTAWA, April 23. The House met at 3 o'clock. The motion for the second reading of the Banking Bill monopolized the attention of the House to-day. Mr. Foster announced the changes made since the bill was introduced. In the case of the impairment, or even the exhaustion of the circulation guaranteed fund, the banks will not be called upon to make up the amount immediately, but will only be called upon for an annual payment of one per cent. of their average circulation until the fund is restored. The proposed audit has been dropped. Objections have been made to the proposition that balances unclaimed for eight years should be paid over to the Government, to be by them paid to the proper owners if subsequently claimed, but this clause he would insist on as a vital part of the bill. After considerable discussion the bill was read a second time and considered in Committee of the Whole. An additional clause was inserted referring to majority of every bank to be Canadian by birth or naturalization. The Committee rose and reported progress, and the House went into Committee of Supply, taking up the main estimates. All the remaining items having been passed the House adjourned at 12.15.

The Rykert Inquiry.

OTTAWA, April 23. The committee to inquire into Cyprus Hills timber limit deal, better known as the Rykert inquiry, had another meeting this morning which made a further revelation as to the methods of the Administration of the Interior Department. Dalton McCarthy proved that he was not in Ottawa during the alleged interview between himself, Rykert, Lindsay and Russell is said to have taken place. He declared it was a plot to cheat Laidlaw out of the limits between Rykert, Russell and Ryley, the latter being a clerk of the Interior Department at the time. Rykert admitted to Blake that when he secured the money from Sands in Winnipeg there was \$1,000 missing, for which he did not ask any account. The committee will try to find out whether any of this amount went to the Department. The committee will have another sitting to-morrow.

The Bremner Fur Case.

OTTAWA, April 23. The Bremner Fur Committee this afternoon reported to Parliament that Middleton ordered Bremner's furs to be confiscated, and ordered two bales to be put up for himself, and others for his staff, and shipped to Winnipeg in the same boat he came down in, but were missing afterwards; that the confiscation was illegal and unwarrantable, and the appropriation to Gen. Middleton and staff highly improper; that the value of the furs taken was \$4,500, and the committee recommended this amount to be paid with interest.

Cromer Arrested.

HALIFAX, April 23. City Marshal Cotter received a despatch from Detective Power to-day, dated Sand Beach, Mich., as follows: "Have Cromer under arrest. He is going to return without any fight." When the detective left Halifax he went to Edmundston, where is located the agency of the Peoples Bank, from which Cromer is alleged to have taken money. From there the detective went to Bangor, and on his arrival he got trace of the man through the railway ticket agent.

Senator Frye's Bill.

WASHINGTON, April 23. A bill was introduced by Senator Frye to-day providing that it shall be lawful for citizens of the United States engaged in foreign trade and residing abroad, to own vessels built in the United States and have them registered as United States vessels. Foreigners connected in business with citizens of the United States are given the right to own not exceeding one quarter share in vessels belonging to the United States.

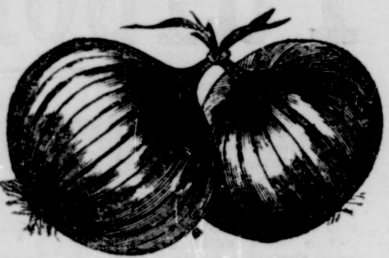
DIED.

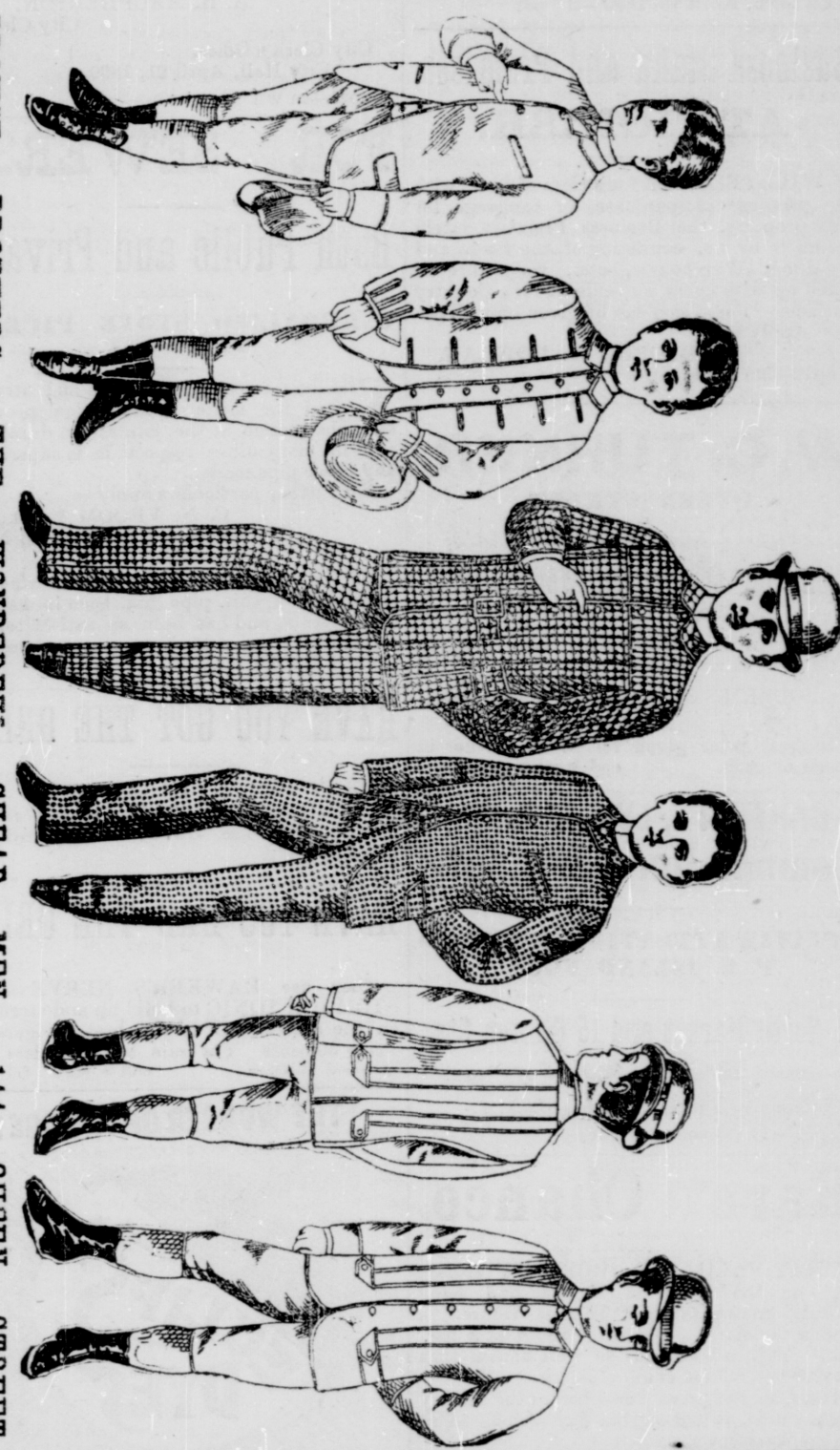
