Riotous Scenes Mark Opening Of League Assembly

Negus Is Bitter As He Addresses Delegates. Police Quell Riot.

GENEVA, June 30—Riotous scenes of cursing and fighting in the galleries shattered the dignity of the League of Nations Assembly tonight when black-robed Emperor Haile Selassie charged: "You deserted us to Italy."

Police were called to restore order after a chorus of heckling boos and curses greeted the Emperor when he rose to make a final dramatic plea for aid.

"God Will Remember"

It was almost 10 minutes before police restored order and the Negus was allowed to resume and bitterly tell the League members: "God and history will remember your judgment!"

Persons alleged to be Fascists started the tumult, shouting curses at the Negus in Italian, French and Spanish. Fighting broke out when League attaches tried to restore order. Only when police came and ousted the hecklers was calm restored.

Later the Emperor said what he had to say, calmly and fully. "I could not believe that 52 Nations—among them the most powerful in the world—could be defeated by a single aggressor," he said sorrowfully.

Against Greed

"In this struggle I have been fighting the cause of all small countries against the greed of a powerful invader."

Demonstrators in the galleries were hustled away to jail in taxicabs. They will be held, pending an investigation of the manifestation.

Foreign Minister Nicolas Titulescu of Rumania, furious at the commotion, stood on his chair and turning toward the rioters, shouted:

"Barbarous"

"Cease these barbarous and uncivilized methods"—only those at his elbow could hear.

At the close of his long speech Haile Selassie was heartily applauded and received an ovation from the crowd outside the League palace as he left. The same crowd had booed the hecklers when they were carried out by police.

Premier Mussolini also communicated his views to the Assembly through a memorandum describing Italy's action as "a sacred mission of civilization," in "the spirit of the League Covenant."

Asks "Reform"

He suggested, however, the League "requires adequate reform" and asserted that Italy was willing to aid. The note was read by Premier Paul van Zeeland of Belgium, president of the Assembly, elected to that office today to succeed Eduard Benes of Czechoslovakia.

Haile Selassie's voice was rather flat as he spoke in Amharic. His words were translated for the assembled delegates.

"The representatives of 52 nations assured me the aggressor would not triumph," he said, after asserting "I did not wish the war that was imposed upon me."

Had Confidence

"Despite our lack of airplanes,

artillery and other modern weapons, my confidence in the League was absolute.

"I could not believe that 52 nations—among them the most powerful in the world—could be defeated by a single aggressor."

"I never expected the people of foreign countries to have their sons shed their blood for us, but I did expect the League powers to grant me financial assistance so I might purchase badly needed arms."

"Outside the Kingdom of the Lord, there is no nation which is greater than another. God and history will remember your judgment!"

Abandoned

Referring to the movement to lift sanctions, he asked: "Does this not mean that you abandoned us to Italy? Will the world states accept this precedent and bow down before force?"

Van Zeeland was elected Assembly president at a secret meeting, receiving 47 of 50 votes.

"The League is at a turning point in history," he said upon taking the chair, and "never before have the difficulties been so great. The fate of a large section of humanity hangs in the balance."

OIL SOUGHT ON ROYAL RANCH

King Edward's Ranch May Be Source of Oil Flow.

CALGARY, July 2—King Edward VIII may find himself the owner of rich Southern Alberta oil lands it became known today with developments in the search for the true crude oil pool in Alberta.

The King has had a 99-year lease for six years on the oil and mineral rights underlying the Royal "E.P." ranch in the Peisako district south of Turner Valley, Alberta's oil field. The area is 50 miles southwest of here.

For years drillers have sought the crude oil pool believed to be the major source of the flow which has poured millions of gallons of Naphtha into the Turner Valley wells. From recent developments in the field, many oil men believe the unlocated pool may be found on the Royal ranch property.

The 99-year lease was not acquired by King Edward, then Prince of Wales, with any intention of allowing drilling operations to proceed on the ranch. It was obtained for the purpose of preventing exploitation.

Will Make Bluenose a Modern Banker

LUNenburg, N. S., July 2—That stately queen ship Bluenose, North Atlantic fishing schooner champion, is going back to the "bank" with engines.

But installation of a motor and stripping the fisherman of her graceful gear would have no effect on her racing career, Captain Angus Walters, her doughty skipper insisted tonight as he revealed the plans to make Bluenose a modern Banker.

"A vessel without power can't get anywhere in fishing nowadays," he stated and there was a deep note of sadness in the briny Captain's admission. His words sounded the death-knell for the tall-spired sailing vessels which made Lunenburg famous. With her white wings Bluenose has triumphed over Un-Under States contenders in North Atlantic schooner classics for more than a decade.

According to Captain Angus, dependency on wind placed sailing vessels at too great a disadvantage in competition with other vessels equipped with auxiliary power so off will come the vessel's bowsprit.
