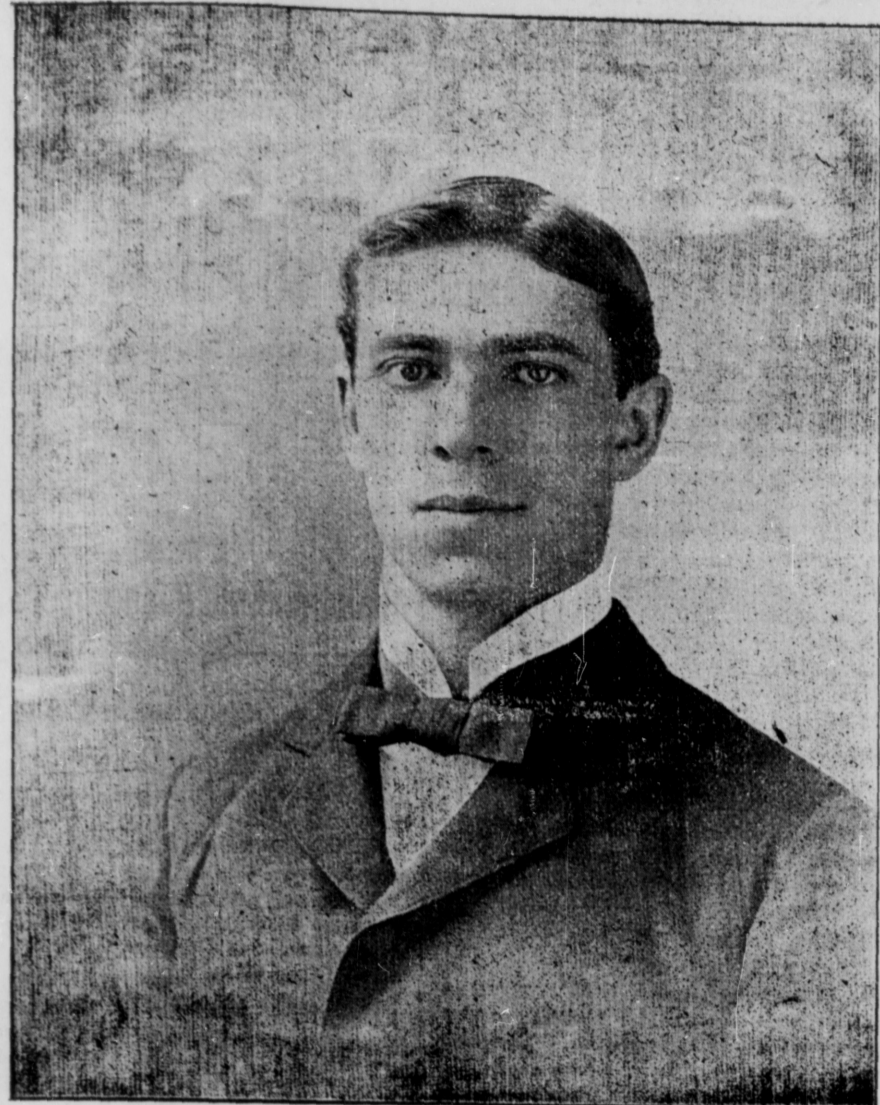

MR. A. A. LEFURGEY, OPPOSITION CANDIDATE FOR EAST PRINCE.

Mr. A. A. Lefurgey, B. A., LL. B., the Conservative candidate for East Prince, is the youngest son of the late Hon. John Lefurgey, who, as a merchant and public man enjoyed the confidence of the people in no unusual degree during a long business and public life. The subject of this sketch was educated at St. Dunstan's College, Mt. Allison and Harvard University, taking the degree of B. A. at Mt. Allison, and subsequently that of L. L. B. at Harvard. On leaving the latter University, he decided on a commercial career, which he has since prosecuted with marked success, and has now important interests both in Prince Edward Island and Cape Breton. In 1897 he became the candidate for Summerside for the Provincial Legislature, and was elected, redeeming his father's seat for the Conservative party. He took an active part in the proceedings of the Legislative Assembly during the session of 1898, and evinced an excellent capacity for business. In the fall of 1898 he became the Conservative candidate for East Prince,

the Hon. John Ye, being called to the Senate. Notwithstanding that desperate efforts were put forward by the Federal and Provincial Governments to elect his opponent, the Hon. W. S. Fielding leading the campaign, Mr. Lefurgey came within a few votes of being elected. Indeed, it is firmly believed that he would have been found legally elected had not the recount which he demanded been frustrated on technical grounds. Owing to the pressing nature of his business engagements he found it very difficult to enter the political arena on the present occasion.

Finding, however, that the hearts of the people were set on his becoming the standard bearer of the party he felt himself impelled to make the necessary sacrifice. While Mr. Lefurgey is esteemed by all parts of the community he is a particular favorite with the young men who are attached to him on account of his real worth and unassuming manner.

He will undoubtedly redeem East Prince by a handsome majority.

### A HARP REPLY.

Sir.—In the Patriot of the 15th is a spiteful scurrilous letter against Alex Martin, the esteemed Conservative candidate for East Queen's. This writer signified himself Conservative. No Conservative or Liberal either wrote this letter from Caledonia. This letter is no doubt the work of D. A. McKinnon's henchman, or brow-beater, as boys call him, who is always sent out in the district to do the dirty work for the Liberal candidate. He dares to cast slurs at Mr. Alex. Martin's manner of doing business. Mr. Martin's business is conducted on honest business principles. So is Mr. Martin's; and what is more he got his nomination as Conservative candidate for this riding in an honest open upright manner. Can his opponent say so? It is well known by the leading Liberals and the Conservatives of East Queen's, also, that McKinnon had no chance of receiving the Liberal nomination, had he not, as secretary of the riding, resorted to trickery and manipulated the polls to suit himself. He put no notification in the Patriot or any paper calling on electors of the different polls to hold meetings and appoint delegates. He simply sent letters to the electors in the polls that suited Mr. McKinnon, and there hole and corner meetings were held in places that suited best for Mr. McKinnon's interests. Many of these letters were only received at the polls the day before the general convention was held, and in many polls no letter or notice was received at all, so our Liberal neighbors inform us; and at the convention, we learn, there were only present about 90 delegates when there ought to have been 130 to 140. This, of course, was all first rate on our side. This was doing our work. But at the same time it exhibits the character of the man who aspires to represent a respectable, wealthy district like East Queen's. The man who will play tricks on his own friends and get in in such a dishonorable way is not the man to represent us in East Queen's, and we shall have the help of a good many of the liberals to return Alex. Martin as our representative. The Patriot's writer says "a man can smile and smile and be defeated." But he will discover that a "man can smile and smile and be a villain," and villains deserve to be defeated. Mr. McKinnon will be defeated in East Queen's on the 7th of November; for the electors of East Queen's, both Conservative and Liberal, want no tricksters to represent them. Mr. McKinnon had better cast no more stones.

### A TIMELY ADMONITION.

DEAR SIR.—After Mass, at St. Ann's Church, Lot 65, on Sunday, the 7th inst., the pastor Rev. D. B. Reid, took occasion to address a few words of admonition to his congregation, regarding the practice, now so prevalent, of buying and selling votes at elections. Father Reid explained that he was not speaking as a politician or in the interests of any party or candidate, but simply as a priest whose duty it was to instruct his people in their moral obligations and the duty they owe, as good citizens, to the State. He pointed out the degrading and demoralizing consequences of corrupting the electorate and the danger to the State and honest Government resulting from a purchased vote.

The reverend gentleman then proceeded to explain, in clear and convincing language, that it was a mortal sin for an elector to sell or barter his vote for money or for any gift, favor or promise made by, or on behalf of any candidate.

He also clearly explained that it was a mortal sin for an elector to "quibble" about his vote—that is no elector can record his vote for any candidate in consideration of having received a gift, favor or promise from such candidate or any person acting on his behalf, although at the time of receiving such gift, favor or promise the candidate or the person acting for him, may not ask the elector for his vote. "An elector," said Father Reid, "may quibble" about his vote and deceive his neighbors. He may quibble and deceive the candidate. But he cannot deceive Almighty God.

In concluding the reverend gentleman then advised his congregation to give no countenance to the numerous hirelings who are roaming around the country, night and day, attempting to corrupt and debase the electorate with money and liquor, and exhorted his people to go to the polls as free and independent electors and as good citizens, voting according to the dictates of their conscience for the party they conscientiously believed would honestly and efficiently govern the country.

Father Reid cannot be too highly commended by the press and all good citizens for his seasonable and salutary admonition; and it is to be hoped that clergymen of all denominations will emulate his good example.

Who will be the next clergyman to denounce bribery and corruption at elections and raise his voice in the interests of morality and good honest Government?
