MONTREAL (CP)—Crews of transatlantic vessels are bucking capricious weather in what they describe as the most severe and hazardous North Atlantic shipping season in years.

The hazards continue right up the St. Lawrence. Shipowners say moody weather in the gulf have added hours to their loss. Storms sweep through, followed by dense fogs, slowing ships to a crawl.

FRANCONIA HELD UP

The liner Franconia was set back more than 24 hours by the combination of her last trip and the Empire of Australia also lost time in the gulf.
