Bag Shortage Only Temporary

A reported shortage of potato bags here is more apparent than real, Col. G. E. Full stated last night. It has been caused by an accident to the ship leaving Calcutta, India, last July.

The ship did not sail on schedule and as a result there has been a shortage of the bags in Canada, although there is no shortage of bags in India. It is expected that the situation will be fully relieved by the first week of November when the cargo, due shortly in Montreal, is unloaded and shipped by rail to this Province.

Two New Dragger Leaving N. S. Port For Here Today

Two new draggers in addition to the one recently arriving at Alberton and now in operation out of that port, are scheduled to leave Port Grenville N. S. this morning for Charlottetown. Eldred Hutt and sons Harvey, Mort and Cecil will bring one of the draggers around to the Island with Alberton as its ultimate destination while the other will be under command of Henry Doucette of Tignish.

The possibility of the three new draggers being able to carry on with Alberton as an unloading base this fall is very remote and Souris will probably be called upon to handle the catch although much of the "take" may be nearer Alberton. The Cold Storage and plate freeze plant at Souris is well equipped to handle deep sea fish. The draggers are diesel powered and equipped with ship to shore radio-telephones and sonar depth indicators. All the necessary equipment has been installed and the ships are ready to commence operations shortly after arriving at the home port.

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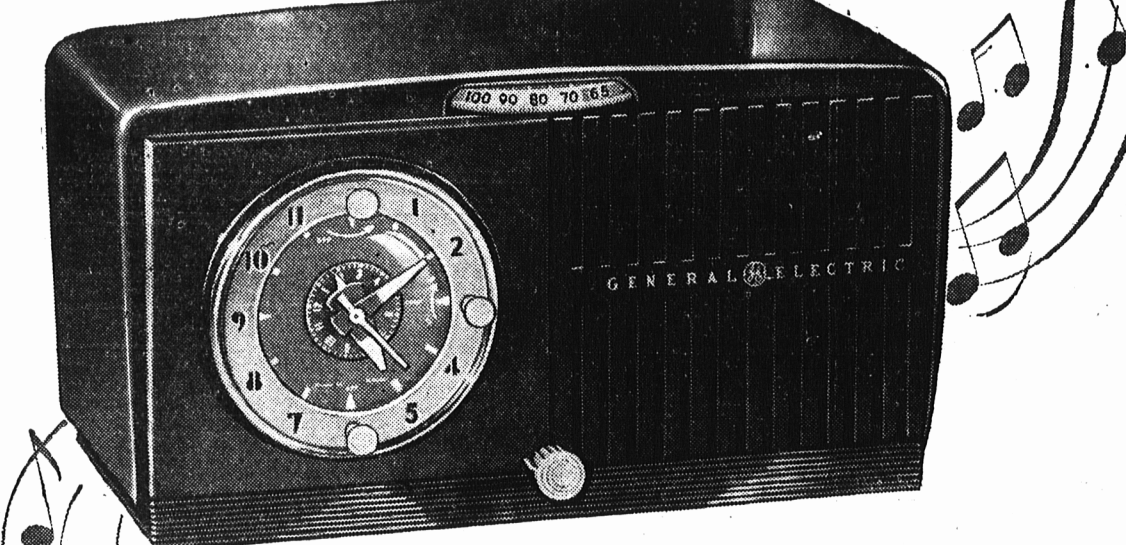

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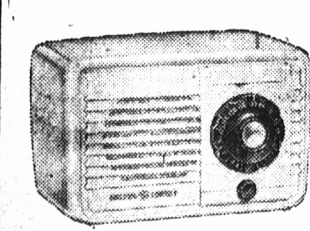
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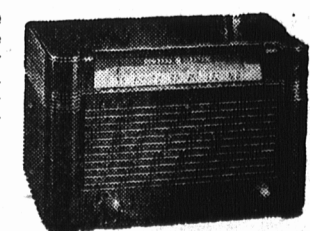
