THE CAMPAIGN IN INDIA

Results Summed Up.

REBELS HEAVILY PUNISHED.

Way Paved to Permanent Settlement of the Country.

LONDON, Dec. 29.—A despatch from Peshawar says: The British columns have returned from Kheiber Pass after punishing with slight opposition the Seak-kahkheis in the Basar Valley.

The military operations on the frontier are now concluded. Every Afridi and Orakzee Valley has been visited.

It now appears that the enemy's loss has been more severe than was first believed, and out of all proportion to its possible fighting strength. The complete submission of the Orakzies is now accomplished. The vaunted prestige of the Afridis has been lowered and their punishment has paved the way for a permanent settlement of the country.

FAST ATLANTIC LINE.

Peterson, Tate & Co. Give An Additional Guarantee

For the Performance of their Contract.

QUEBEC, Dec. 29.—Hon. R. R. Dobbell, speaking on the present position of the Fast Atlantic Steamship Line, states that a letter has just been received by the Government to the effect that Peterson, Tate & Co had satisfied the Government as to the second ten thousand pounds they were required to put up as security for the due execution of their contract. Unless this is carried out the whole twenty thousand pounds will be forfeited.

Mr. Dobbell sees in the fact that the firm has satisfied the Government in the matter of the second ten thousand pounds, the strongest possible assurance that they intend to execute the contract.

ANOTHER ACQUISITION.

FATAL DISASTER AT SEA.

Six Seamen Killed or Drowned.

BERMUDA, Dec. 29.—The ship, Vanloo, of Yarmouth, Captain Baker, arrived here on Sunday afternoon in distress having lost her fore-yards and six seamen during the voyage by an accident to the spars. The following is a list of the killed and drowned: Patrick Walserson, of Barrow; John Downe, of Lisbon, Portugal; Aldoph Kirger, of Hamburg, Germany, ordinary seaman; L. B. Gillies, St. John, able seaman; Robert Miller, of Glasgow, James Ellingson, of Norway, able seamen.

ST. JOHN LOAN OF \$125,000.

Taken By a Halifax Man

ST. JOHN, N. B., Dec. 29.—The Treasury Board of the Dominion Council, yesterday afternoon, opened tenders of the issue of \$125,000 bonds in connection with the St. John harbor improvements. They are 4 per cent debentures, payable in 40 years, interest payable half yearly. The tender of J. C. McIntosh, of Halifax, of \$107,265 or \$134,081.25 with accrued interest was accepted.

LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL

NEW YORK, December 27.—Mrs. Lizzie Gallagher was burned to death last night at her apartments in Brooklyn, in her efforts to save her children. The body had pulled the cloth from table, upsetting the lamp. Mrs. Gallagher's clothes caught fire, but she devoted her efforts to rescuing her children, neglecting herself. Covered with burning oil she heroically carried her three little ones to safety. It was only then that she thought of herself, and running to a neighbor's room rolling herself in blankets. It was too late, however, as, burned from head to foot, she died quickly after reaching the hospital.

ALBANY, N. Y., Dec. 27.—John E. Overton and Stanford P. Goodspeed, proprietors of "Line Stores," have been convicted in Clinton County of trafficking in liquor without a liquor tax certificate, and each sentenced to pay a fine of two hundred dollars and serve thirty days in the county jail. The proprietors of these "line stores" attempt to evade the provisions of the liquor tax law and the excise laws of Canada by establishing their places of business precisely on the line between the United States and Canada, so arranging their place of business that sales may be made in either place. Through the efforts of the excise department four of these proprietors have been indicted. Three have been convicted.

LONDON, December 27.—Lord Salisbury, the premier, has written to United States Ambassador Hay, in response to America's latest proposals in the Behring Sea controversy, her request that Great Britain should enter into an agreement with the United States, Russia and Japan, to stop sealing. Great Britain declines to enter into such an agreement. Lord Salisbury says in substance, that he has communicated with the Canadian government, which has the foremost interest in the sealing question, and that Canada is unwilling to become a party to such an arrangement as is proposed by the United States. Therefore, England, continues Lord Salisbury, those interests would not be justified in according to the proposals. Lord Salisbury's answer emphasizes the policy of England not interfering in Canada's foreign relations.

WILMINGTON, Del., Dec. 26.—Rev. W. W. Taylor, aged 86 years, the oldest Presbyterian preacher in this state, died today. He was graduated from Yale 60 years ago. At one time he was pastor of the church which President McKinley's wife's parents attended, and officiated at their marriage.

LONDON, Dec. 27.—Despite the suspension of tariff negotiations between the United States and Germany, which has created great uneasiness there, the Berlin correspondent of the Daily Chronicle says it is not believed in Berlin that a tariff war will result.

OTTAWA, Dec. 27.—Another little trip has been arranged for a minister. This time Sifton has gone to Washington to consult with General Alger on a number of questions affecting the Yukon, in which Canada and the United States are jointly interested. Alger was coming to Ottawa, but owing to being in ill-health, Sifton decided to go to Washington instead. Among the questions to be discussed are uniform customs regulations, bonding privileges, mail service, etc.

LONDON, Dec. 27.—A special despatch from Shanghai says: "It is reported that seventeen British warships are off Chemulpo, Corea, southeast of Seoul, supporting the British consul's protest, really amounting to an ultimatum against the king, practically yielding the government of Corea into the hands of the Russian minister."

"The protest is specially directed against the dismissal of McLeavy Brown, British adviser to the Korean customs, in favor of the Russian nominee."

"The news has produced consternation at Seoul, which is heightened by the knowledge that Japan has a fleet of thirty warships awaiting the result of the British representation that Japan fully supports. Japan is irritated by the arrival of Russian troops in Corea, and it is believed she will oppose them."

"According to advices from Tokio, Japan has offered to assist the officers at Pekin in drilling the Chinese army and to consent to a postponement of the payment of the war indemnity. Many of the viceroys and Pekin officials favor the proposal."

LONDON, Dec. 26.—According to a despatch to the Daily Mail from Shanghai it is reported there from a reliable source that a British force landed at Chemulpo on Saturday and caused the re-instatement of McLeavy Brown. The same despatch refers to "a native rumor that the Union Jack has been hoisted on an island in the mouth of the river Yang Tse Kiang."

FORT WORTH, Texas, December 27.—James Lyons, a cattleman, who has just returned from Mexico, says concerning Mexican importations: "There prevails the greatest scarcity of cattle this year in Mexico ever known. It is now impossible to get a head from districts from which thousands were sent last year. The reason is that there has prevailed a severe drought for several months. There is no grass, and breeders have been compelled to sell off their cows to keep them from dying, which has left the ranges practically depleted."
