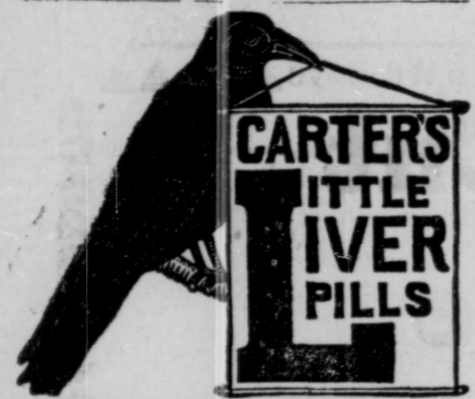
THE WEARINESS OF MONOTONY.

GEORGETOWN NOTES.

The interest taken in our annual regatta, now recognized as an event of no small importance in a locality which leads the Island in the matter of boating facilities, was aroused to a greater pitch than ever this year, by the prizes offered—the chief among them, being the beautiful Challenge Cup, presented by Judge Hodgson.

Tuesday, the 9th inst., the day appointed, proved unfavorable for a boat race. The breeze, light at the start, soon fell away altogether, and the race was called off before half the course was traversed.

The crowd, however, found ample enjoyment at the tea party held on the ground near the starting place, and a concert in the evening rounded up a day's pleasure, marred but slightly by the failure of the Regatta.

On the following day another start was made and 19 boats crossed the line. This time the breeze, though not so heavy as hoped for, blew steadily throughout the race and the Georgetown regatta of 1898 had a successful termination. The first boat to finish was the Fannie Bell, but the Can't Help It, which arrived next, captured the cup on time allowance.

Following is a list of the prize winners and owners: 1, Can't Help It, Capt. Wm. Stevens, Georgetown; 2, Fannie Bell, Capt. John King, Georgetown; 3, Ailsa, Harold Harvie, Georgetown; 4, Mamie C, J. W. McPhee, Annandale; 5, Wanderer, Joseph Pulten, Georgetown; 6, Klondyke, Angus Steele, De Gros Marsh; 7, Marion, Charles De Loria, Georgetown; 8, Bessie, John Macdonald, Georgetown.

Before starting the boats were measured and time allowance calculated according to the latest and most approved rules of boat racing. The Cruiser Kingfisher, glorious in her display of bunting, mingled her stately charms with the graces of her smaller sisters of the racing fleet, and the committee of management are under a deep obligation to Capt. Kent who rendered such valuable assistance in the capacity of starter and judge.

The Cup, now in possession of Captain Stevens, is a beautiful piece of workmanship of silver and gold, and bears the inscription "Challenge Cup Georgetown Regatta 1898."

This Cup, together with cash prizes will be competed for year after year, and will be held under the same conditions as govern the races for the America's Cup. Needless to say, the worthy act of the donor in thus encouraging wholesome sport will be duly appreciated by the people in this section of the Province.

CRUELEST KING OF MODERN TIMES.

The most blood-thirsty villain unhung is the king of Benin, Africa. He used to slaughter his subjects daily for amusement but when he massacred a parcel of unarmed British negotiators his reign ended. His palace was partly built of human bones and surrounded with countless numbers of them. The British sent an expedition to Benin and annexed the country and the palace.

The King has been responsible for more needless bloodshed and sheer cruelty than any other savage living. Benin, the capital city, deserves well the title bestowed on it of "The City of Blood." Happily this ghoul is no longer at large. He is in the hands of the British officials on the Gold Coast.

Doubtless he will be transported and made an allowance by the British Government. The proper allowance for him is a long rope and a short shirt.

The British take a great deal of credit to themselves for putting an end to the brutal reign of the King of Benin. Probably they had more justification in this case of an attack on a native state than is usual.

Benin, the city is an extremely interesting place in a gruesome way. No white man had ever been there and left it alive, before the British expedition. The King's palace was approached by an avenue of poles, on the top of which were skulls. The doorway was made of human leg bones.

Flies are very numerous in Benin. The King had a noted aversion to them. Unlike most of his subjects he wore a garment that covered the whole of his body, except his face and hands. Two slaves were always on guard with fans to keep flies away from his Majesty. If a fly succeeded in alighting on an exposed part of his Majesty's person the two slaves were executed on the spot.

The ex-Queen Liliuokalani of Hawaii proposes to begin at Honolulu a suit against the United States for the value of a million acres of Crown Lands which have been annexed. She is demanding also the payment to her of \$400,000, the amount of back rentals collected by the present government. The ex-Queen has engaged several prominent San Francisco lawyers.
