N.Y. Port Traffic Moves Again After Fire Threat

NEW YORK (AP) — Uneasy patrols ranged over the East River Wednesday after a flaming ship collision which sank one vessel and covered miles of water with gasoline. Two crew members were lost when a Swedish freighter plowed an American tanker. Thirty-seven others were injured. The Manhattan Bridge, high above the ships, caught fire briefly. The burning tanker sank, losing a flood of fuel over the river surface. For hours, all river traffic was prohibited. But by noon boats were creeping warily past the wreckage zone. Swift currents of the river, which flows between Manhattan and the boroughs of Queens and Brooklyn, carried off much of the inflammable liquid, but ribbons of fuel snaked along the docks. DANGER NOT OVER "The danger is not yet over," said deputy fire chief Hugh Haligan. He said the gasoline forms pockets along the water edge, it could spread throughout the harbor area, imperiling 50 miles of shoreline. Both the coast guard and police ordered investigations into the accident, which occurred in midstream of the half-mile-wide river. The 5,200-ton Swedish-American line freighter Nebraska rammied amidship into the 531-ton Empress Bay, owned by the Tanker Petroleum Corporation. An explosion rocked the two ships and a sheet of flames shot skyward, igniting the bridge more than 130 feet above. "I saw a mass of flames that looked about half a mile high and 100 yards wide," a witness said. "I could hear men in the water being swept upstream, yelling for help." Let Breakwater Extension Contract At Launching Pond

OTTAWA. (Special)—A \$23,050 contract for an extension to the breakwater at Launching Pond, Prince Edward Island, has been awarded to Norman N. MacLean of Murray River, it was announced Wednesday by John A. Macdonald, M.P., for Kings. Completion date for the 300-foot extension is next March 17. After it is finished a basin 25 feet wide throughout the length of the structure will be dredged. The basin will be on the channel side

Let Contract For Wall At Beach Point

OTTAWA — The Federal Department of Public Works has awarded a contract in the amount of \$25,125.00 to Morrison and McRae Limited of Summerside, P. E. I., for the construction of a retaining wall at Beach Point, P. E. I. Specific completion date for this project is April 10, 1959.

This work involves the construction of a retaining wall of sheet steel piling tied back with steel tie rods to a concrete anchor. It will have a length of approximately 160 feet and will form the outer face of the work. Steel sheet piles used in the project will be of one length throughout and driven to a minimum of three feet into rock or 8.7 feet

below low water. The wall will then be tied to the concrete anchor with two-inch steel tie rods with ends upset to 2-1/4 inches. Tie-rods are to be placed at ten feet centre to centre and in two lengths connected with standard turnbuckles or sleeve nuts. Placing of the tie-rods will closely follow the driving of the sheet pile wall and care will be taken in tightening the tie-rods so that the tension in each rod will be approximately equal when the work is completed.

Before pouring the concrete anchor wall, which will measure two feet wide by four feet high, the site will be levelled and compacted to a certain elevation. It will be covered with clay after being placed.

Stone fill will be placed at the back of the steel wall to form a one to one slope toward the clay. It is estimated that 700 cubic yards of the clay fill and 250 cubic yards of stone fill will be required to complete this project.

Plans and specifications were prepared by the Harbours and Rivers Engineering Branch of the Department of Public Works in Ottawa.

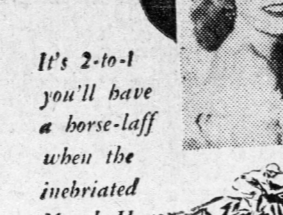

Wharf Repair At Montague

OTTAWA — The Federal Department of Public Works has awarded a contract in the amount of \$30,868.14 to Stanley Reid, Contractor, of Port Hillford, N.S., for repairing the wharf at Montague, P.E.I. Specified completion date for the project is April 10, 1959.

The existing curb, plank deck, untreated stringers and caps will be removed from the entire area of the new work. Piling now in use is to be trimmed where necessary in order that the caps and the concrete surface will have a slope of one inch in eight feet inwards from the channel

face. This will be followed by the construction of a timber concrete laminated deck on creosoted caps. Upon completion it will have a length of 336 feet nine inches and widths varying from ten feet to forty-four feet.

The timber base of the composite deck will be constructed of creosoted, two-inch by four-inch and two-inch by six-inch plank. Upper edges of the plank will be dapped one half inch by six inches with one such dap every twelve inches.

Top surfacing of all work will be of three-inch thick asphaltic concrete laid in two layers of one and one half inch each. Eleven thousand feet board
