times Board of Trade, submitted proposals for a survey of economic conditions in the Maritime Provinces as adopted by the Board in Charlottetown last year.

"Many times have we heard such questions as these," said Mr. Curtis; "What is wrong with the Maritimes, or is there anything wrong? Why is there not greater industrial expansion? Do we actually lack natural resources and are our trade possibilities definitely limited? Why do we not have a greater population, and why do so many people migrate elsewhere. Can anything be done to expand our industrial life, and raise the well-being of our people to the same standard as that prevailing in other provinces. When an attempt is made to analyse the situation, the lack of definite and positive information concerning the matter is quite apparent."

"It is axiomatic," said Mr. Curtis, "to say that before any problem can be solved it is necessary to have all the facts and information relating thereto, and in this instance, facts are sadly lacking."

"We do not know why and we do not feel that our rate of progress should be slower than elsewhere in Canada. In explanation we are told that the Maritimes lack sufficient electric power to attract large industries; that we do not have sufficient natural resources; and that distance from great population, with high costs of transportation are our undoing."

"It may be that too much emphasis has been laid on our seeming disadvantages. It is suggested that instead of dwelling unduly upon our handicaps, might we not more profitably be making a united effort to correct our disabilities and utilize the opportunities which we think we possess."

Mr. B. Graham Rogers, Director of Transportation, said that development and transportation go hand in hand, "one cannot exist without the other. One produces and the other delivers." Four divisions of transportation were mentioned at the conference of Premiers: rail, highway, air and coastal and ocean shipping. "Railways are a necessary part of our existence," Mr. Rogers said, "but the thought was expressed that the railways are pricing themselves out of business. Continued increases could be followed by financial results causing a great decrease in railway employment. "The question

of railway monopoly in certain areas was mentioned, Mr. Rogers said, and the thought was expressed that there should always be some competing form of transportation." Traffic of autos, trucks and buses on highways was discussed and a close study of highway markings, signals, speed limits and regulations generally was advocated. Buses were considered an important adjunct to general transportation, and of particular importance in serving areas not otherwise provided with facilities. Additional passenger schedules available between railway schedules were stressed.

Joint Tourist Program
Mr. Frank MacKenzie, speaking on the suggestions of a joint tourist programme for the four Atlantic Provinces said "Such a programme was not designed to interfere with the work of the regular department of each Provincial Government but rather there would be an overall pooling of some of the money now devoted to Tourist promotion by the various provinces. It was also suggested that joint offices might be arranged at certain centres. It was further suggested that coupled with Tourist advertisements a reference might be made to business opportunities available to visitors."

Orin Simons was chairman of the meeting and President, the thanks to the speakers on behalf of the club being extended by President W. W. Reid.

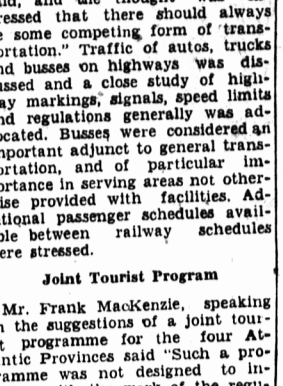

unless East-West trade is made normal Britain "will be living in Uncle Sam's pawnshop for another generation."

Hughes claimed Britain's present arms burden "makes a tremendous threat to our standard of life."

"Philip Noel-Baker, a cabinet minister in the former Labor government, said disarmament by Britain would not of itself end the world's troubles. An arms cur must be undertaken by all the big powers, he said, adding: "Let this conference appeal to Russia to come in with us and bring about disarmament."

A majority of the 1,266 delegates defeated the left-wing resolution on a show of hands along with a companion measure calling for the removal of all trade restrictions with the Communist world, regardless of whether the goods involved were strategic or not.

Two left-wing members of Parliament, Harold Davies and Emrys Hughes, took the floor to support the trade resolution. Davies said

Mr. Arthur MacNeill passed away at his home in Elmira on September 10.

Restricted Diets Easy with NEW Wafer
