

Local and Other Items.

HAY is coming in plentiful. The price is still high. No cases before the Stipendiary Magistrate to-day. Ontario has 3,744 miles of Railway in operation. A FARMERS' CLUB has been started at Missouche. The market to-day was very small. Prices are unchanged. TWENTY-THREE degrees below zero at Chicago, on Monday. Go right at once to Dorsey, Goff & Co's, and buy a right pair of Boots. AMONG the passengers crossing at the Capes to-day is Mr. Percy Hope, of Regina. Those who wish to secure a good seat at Mr. Earle's Concert to-night should go early. THE people of Hamilton, Ont., on the 22nd inst., sent 3,000 marks, to relieve the sufferers by the floods in Germany. Mr. EARLE will sing the "Intense Young Man" at his Concert to-night. It is full of good local "hits." THE Mission service to-night at 7.30, will be on "The Love of God." To-morrow at 4, there will be a children's service. A MONTREAL stock broker has, under a by-law, been fined by the Board of Exchange \$25 for calling a confere a liar and a thief. THE Students in McGill College, Montreal, having "struck" against the professor of Modern Medicine, a new professor will be appointed next session. The barquentine "City of Charlottetown" arrived at St. John on Sunday, from Pernambuco, with a cargo of 7,500 bags of sugar for the Moncton refinery. Mr. EARLE'S Benefit in Y. M. C. A. Hall to-night will be a grand success. The Programme is excellent. Mr. FOX, of the Police Gazette, announces that he is ready to match Mace to stand up four rounds against John L. Sullivan and match Sade to fight Sullivan for \$2,500 a side and the championship of the world. GREAT preparations are being made for the Carnival, which will take place on the 1st February, in the Citizens' Skating Rink. Eight or ten of the most attractive figures at Summerside Carnival will take part. We beg to acknowledge the receipt of a bag of new potatoes from Mr. George Smith, of Winsloe Road. They are "very early roses"; but the seed were, we think, "prolific." They were grown in Mr. Smith's cellar. A GRAND literary and musical entertainment, under the auspices of the Caledonian Club of P. E. Island, will come off at the Market Hall, about the middle of February next. An excellent programme, which is being prepared, will shortly be published. THE first salmon of the season caught in the Penobscot river was received yesterday in Quincy Market. No purchaser could be found here at the price asked, \$1.50 a pound, and it was sent to New York.—Boston Traveller, Jan. 29. THE boats containing mails and having seventeen passengers left Cape Tormentine this morning and landed at Cape Traverse this evening at 4.30 o'clock. The boats which left Cape Traverse landed at Cape Tormentine about four o'clock this evening. THE friends of Mr. W. S. Macgowan, Jr., formerly of this city, but now of Q'Appelle, N. W. T., will be pleased to learn that information that he is recovering rapidly from injuries received on the Canada Pacific Railway about two weeks ago. It is the intention of the Government to erect at Winnipeg one of the finest post offices in the Dominion. It will be built on the site of the present post office. It is also reported that the Government will erect a new Custom House in Winnipeg, of the most elegant design. The samples include lines of goods which heretofore have been entirely imported. At the factory there are about ten machines in operation. A number of new machines, shortly expected at the factory, are now being fitted up at the establishment of Messrs. Abrams & Kerr, St. John.—Transcript. THE Manitoba, of Emerson, says:—"An enthusiastic meeting of Odd-fellows was held at the Carney House Saturday night. Bro. D. Evans was chairman, and Bro. D. Shaw, secretary. After some discussion it was resolved to petition the S. G. L. for the return of the charter of the Gateway City Lodge, No. 4. Bros L. T. Owens, Waterworth, B. F. Longworth, Mills and McKay, were appointed a committee to rent a hall for the lodge. The meeting adjourned to Wednesday next at the Gateway House. Mr. Brown, of Franklin, Pa., dreamed the other night that a French officer came to him and told him where he could find a supposed treasure buried on the site of an old French fort. Next day he went to digging and unearthed an iron chest containing \$27,000 in foreign coins bearing dates of the last century. Missie pie just before going to bed has suddenly become a popular dish in that neighborhood, in hopes that the rest of the garrison will rise from the dead and tell where the rest of the plunder is buried.—Detroit Free Press. WILLIAM HEAVENSIDE, a New York Policeman, died on the 18th inst. He was one of the champion athletes of the department, and was bitten in the right hand by a lunatic whom he arrested three months ago. He paid no attention to the matter, but a month after his hand began to swell and his condition grew worse until Thursday when he died in awful agony of pneumonia or blood poisoning. From a medical point of view the case was totally different from hydrophobia. There was no barking, spitting or frothing at the mouth, and no aversion to water.

The Cimbria Disaster. LONDON, Jan. 26. The examination into the cause of the "Cimbria" disaster confirms the statement of the captain of the "Sultan," that the collision was the fault of the "Cimbria."

A Note from the Porte. CONSTANTINOPLE, Jan. 26. The Porte has sent a note to the Powers pointing out that the conduct of Great Britain in Egypt is at variance with the sovereignty of the Sultan. Germany has advised the Porte to submit the matter to conference of the Powers. Excluding French Princes. PARIS, Jan. 26. The French Ministry have adopted the proposition of M. Floquet to exclude the Princes from French Territory, and to punish the transgressors by imprisonment.

SHIP NEWS.

In port at Pernambuco, Dec 22—barque M J Foley, Townsend, and Sharperton, Thomas, for New York, loading; briggs Parnell, McIsaac, and Eleanor, Cann, do. Barque John F Robertson, from Parahiba for Liverpool, with sugar and cotton, put into St. Thomas, Jan 2, as before reported, leaking, with loss of jibboom, fore and mainmast, mizzenmast and sails. She had discharged cargo and was waiting on the 12th; would probably be condemned. The barque Jane Law, Captain McKinlay, arrived at St. John, on Monday morning last, from Greenock, with a cargo of coal and pig iron. The Jane Law sailed from Greenock September 26th, 1882, but it was not until October 6th that the vessel really started on her voyage. Captain Alexander, who had taken ill on leaving Greenock, had to leave the ship, and his place was taken by Captain McKinlay. After leaving the Channel the Jane Law experiences very heavy weather. Occasionally there was a fine day, but it was a rare exception. The gales were very heavy and after being out nearly a month, and having scarcely a sail left, the Captain decided to make a port and refit. St. Michaels was reached on November 6th and the ship laid up for repairs. This occupied a month, and on December 6th Captain McKinlay set out again for St. John. A new crew was shipped at that port, and judging from the remarks made by the officers last evening, to the reporter, they know more about peeling oranges than they did about navigating a ship. "My word for it," said the first mate "they didn't know one mast from the other when they came aboard." After leaving St. Michaels the Jane Law again encountered heavy weather. In latitude 39 north, longitude 66 west, the stern-frame of a small vessel was passed; and at other points pieces of wrecks were noticed. At every attempt to come north the vessel was met with heavy weather, and had several of her sails split. On Sunday morning last a heavy gale was experienced. When off Petit Manan the cargo shifted and the vessel was thrown on her beam ends. The list was so great that at times the officers thought she would turn over. The wind died away, however, and at four o'clock yesterday morning Point Lepreaux was passed. Pilot Casseley boarded the Jane Law off Musquash Head and brought her to port. The portwardens made a survey of the cargo yesterday afternoon. She is now lying at the new pier and will likely begin discharging this morning.

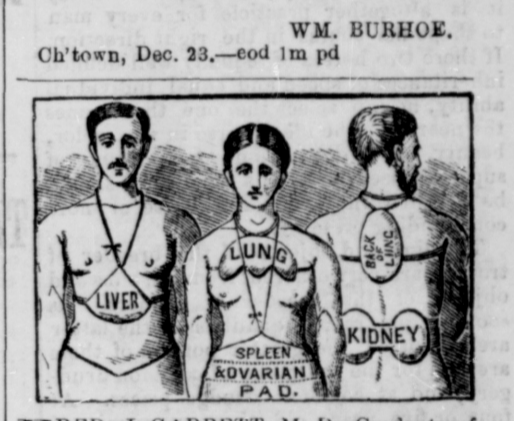
