### ROYAL CAMBODIAN DANCERS IN PARIS

PARIS, June 26.—Half a hundred little Cambodian dancers of the Royal Ballet, accompanied by the famous royal orchestra, and escorted by a hundred soldiers of the Annamite Guard, arrived in Paris from the Marseilles Colonial Exhibition as the "clou" of the Colonial Ball given at the Opera last evening.

The ball was a great success. The little Cambodian dancers, with their tissue of good costumes, their jewels, their funny headdresses, and their graceful posturing were a perfect joy to the eye.

But when they had gone to bed, at an hour appropriate to their tender years, one realized the mistake made by the promoters of the ball in not insisting on the wearing

of fancy dress, as prescribed by advertisements. Many of the women, indeed, wore beautiful Oriental garments, but at last three-quarters of the men wore ordinary dress coats or even dinner jackets, with the result that the early brilliance of the affair was dimmed by a mass of black.

On Tuesday the dancers were shown the sights of Paris and fell into ecstasies of delight over the grocers' shops, with their display of choice fruit, whereas the renowned jewellers' shops of the Rue de la Paix, with their pearls and diamonds, left them cold.

Among the dancers is the beautiful Mademoiselle Ith, whom King Sisowata is reported to have singled out for the highest destiny. Her companions bear names still more picturesque and equally monosyllabic: Ph Kal, Soun, Lem, Than, Don.

You and Ou. Their stature is as diminutive as their names; their hair is black as night and waxed and on the stage, where they look like living statues which have stepped down from the temples of Angkor, the chief dancers make light of carrying jewels of a total weight of over six pounds.

SANDWICH, Eng., June 26.—The driving competition held today among the golfers competing in the British open championship was won by J. Smith of the Royal Ashdown Forest club with an aggregate of 532 yards, 8 1-2 inches for his two best drives. J. S. Morrison, of Sunningdale, was second with 525 yards, two feet, nine inches. G. Easterbrook, Sidmouth Professional, was third with 522 yards, five inches. The competitors were allowed to drive two types of balls, one of St. Andrews specification, the other any weight and size. Smith, who is an artisan, made his longest drive with a regulation ball, namely 271 yard, 10 1-2 inches.

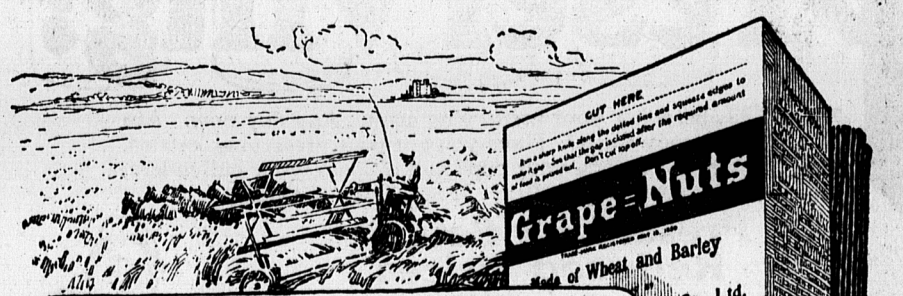
