Food Conditions Much Improved

Flooding conditions in many sections of the city were improved last night, but although the water had disappeared it may have ended up inside rather than out.

Yesterday many cellars were flooded and many homes isolated by the water from weeks end storms and melting snow.

City Foreman Ralph Crockett said his crews were working steadily since three o'clock yesterday morning as calls came pouring in for assistance.

Some of the worst areas were on Nassau, Beoch and Belmont streets.

Water was rushing across North River Road and it was reported that the five-foot pipe lining running all the way from Green's service station on the Malheque Road to the naval barracks could not handle the flow.

On Kensington Road, part of the railway leading into the Roman Catholic cemetery was under water. The road to Riverside Hospital was impassable due to part of the road having collapsed.

On the new shore road to Riverside near the dump, garbage was floating freely across the road in a heavy stream of water.

13th Marriage Said 'Kaput'

CHAPPAWIA, N.Y. (CP) — Millions of playboy Tom Maville, 67, says his 13th marriage is "kaput" and that he has offered his present wife, Christina, \$100,000 to join his squad of former wives.

Maville said Sunday at his estate here that Christina, 22, a former waitress who left her first husband and infant daughter to marry the asbestos heir Jan. 1, 1959, departed by plane for Germany Friday to seek a movie contract.

"She called me today and said she didn't get the contract and wanted to come back," Maville added. "She can stay here, or go anywhere she pleases, but she isn't coming back here."

Foul Bay Road Name Change Sparks Upheaval In Victoria

VICTORIA (CP) — A rose by any other name may still be a rose, but a road by any other name is enough to divide residents of greater Victoria and to put it indelicately, cause quite a stink.

Many prominent people here have become furious because of a move to change the name of Foul Bay Road to University Way.

So incensed did British Columbia Deputy Recreation Minister D. B. Turner become at the thought of a change that he suggested that if the three local councils involved refuse to drop the proposal he will call for volunteers to play the part of Lady Godiva.

"This," said Mayor Dick Wilson of Victoria, "would be engaging in buffoonery of the barest sort."

The reves of Oak Bay and Saanich municipalities appeared surprised by the vigorous protests and said their municipalities wouldn't go against the wishes of local residents in renaming the street.

The name Foul Bay Road, was taken from the bay which is at its terminal. It is believed early day mariners gave the bay that name because of vicious rip tides.

The road extends several miles through Oak Bay, Victoria and Saanich to the new Gordon Head campus of Victoria College which has yet to be completed.

Greater Victoria municipal officials, anticipating the day when the college becomes a university, felt that University Way would be a distinctive name for the road.

Most people on the road seem to disagree, although there are those who are anxious for a change.

Dr. Turner, leader of the "Keep Foul Bay Road Campaign," says: "It is a wonderful, historic name, and we don't want to swap it for what everybody else has got besides it's an incredibly good advertisement for Victoria."

Another resident wrote a letter of protest, saying: "Nearly every town on the continent from Nicks Corners to New York has a University Way, avenue, street or road, but I'll wager there is no other city in the world that can boast of having a Foul Bay Road."

However, among those anxious for a change is one man who has a sister in Australia who lives on Ruston Bay Road. He thinks this is too much for any family.

president-elect of the American Cancer Society said Monday. Dr. J. S. Haxby of the University of Pennsylvania said this would be twice the number now saved through surgical attack on rectal - colon cancer. He said that type cancer kills more Americans than any other form of malignant tumor.

Haxby made his estimate in remarks prepared for a National Press Club symposium "Progress and Hope: Man Against Cancer."

The Philadelphia surgeon added out this particular form only as an example to illustrate his statement that, as research in cancer in general, "we now know enough to save many more patients..." by early detection and treatment.

"The fact is," he said, "that not enough of us do the things we ought to do for our protection."

The American Cancer Society has repeatedly said that while one out of three cancer patients is now being saved from death through surgery and radiation, it should be possible to save at least one in two if people would get annual health examinations, learn the danger signals of cancer, and quickly seek a doctor's help if they have any such signs.

Impaired Driving Case Adjourned

Three witnesses were heard in the case of Keith Joseph Francis, Charlottetown, in a Queens County Magistrate's Court before the case was adjourned until April 9.

Francis is charged with driving while his abilities were impaired by alcohol. He is represented by John P. Nicholson.

James W. Conway, Bonshaw, testified on Feb. 10, the date of the accused's arrest, he was upstairs in his home when he heard a car knocking out the window, he saw a car travelling west on the Trans-Canada Highway, it crossed the opposite side of the road and continued along on the shoulder of the road across the Conway gateway and coming to rest in a snowbank and a telephone pole.

Mr. Conway said a man got out the right side of the vehicle. Mr. Conway then came downstairs. The man who had been in the car came to the help in being pulled out of the ditch. The man, whom Mr. Conway identified as the accused, came into the house and sat down on a chair. "He didn't get straight on the chair," Mr. Conway testified. "I wouldn't say he was drunk, but he was drinking."

Mr. Conway's two sons James and Lewis accompanied the accused to the home of the operator Elmer Boech to get him to pull the car out of the ditch. When the snow came, James Conway got into the car and steered it onto the road. Meanwhile the police came and Mr. Conway said the police put Mr. Francis in their car.

In a cross-examination by Mr. Nicholson, Mr. Conway stated that there was a curve in the road about a quarter-mile east of his home. He said the Francis car was coming from the east. Asked by Nicholson if he remembered on what day the incident occurred, Mr. Conway said "No, I only know it was Feb. 10". Mr. Nicholson then asked "how do you remember Feb. 10?" Mr. Conway replied "with the brains in my head". Mr. Conway said he did not see Mr. Francis driving the car that became fast in the ditch.

Elmer Boech, Bonshaw, operator of the snow plow that pulled the Francis car from the snow bank, testified that the two Conway men and Mr. Francis came to his home to ask for help in removing the car from one ditch.

Arriving at the scene of the incident, Mr. Boech said one Conway man fastened a cable to the snow plow and the other got into the car to steer it. Mr. Francis got into the snow plow and remained there during the extraction of the car from the ditch.

RC Priest Notes Changing Trend

MONTREAL (CP) — One of Montreal's top-ranking Roman Catholic clergymen has told an Anglican audience that the movement toward closer unity among Christians has become "a great wind of change."

"The very fact that I am here," said Rev. John McConnell in the church hall of St. Mathias Anglican parish, "is an indication of change. So is the fact that I have been invited."

Father McConnell is the vicar-general of the Roman Catholic Archdiocese of Montreal. He addressed a meeting in St. Mathias hall Wednesday night on the invitation of the rector Rev. J. N. Dolige.

Differences about doctrine were the great stumbling block in the way of complete Christian unity.

The 18-for-1st began last week when the dairy changed over from counter service to self-service and added nylon stockings to the goods arrayed on its shelves.

Despite assurances from the dairy that it was not going into the lingerie business the dress shop owner proceeded to give away bottles of milk with each object sold.

"I do not give them away because he has no food licence to sell," he said. "It's not very good business," he said "but it is the only form of protest I can make."

"If the dairy starts selling gloves or scarves I'll give away cheese."
