The Lough Mask Tragedy.

DUBLIN, Dec. 8. The trial of Patrick Higgins, Thomas Higgins and Michael Flynn, for the murder of Joseph Huddy and John Huddy, at Lough Mask, was commenced yesterday. It will be remembered that in January last the murdered men Joseph and Patrick Huddy, two bailiffs, while in the discharge of their duty were captured by a band lying in ambush. They were tied together—whether first killed remains unknown—placed in a sack and thrown into Lough Mask. A short time ago the above prisoners were arrested and identified as three of the lawless gang.

Egyptian Exiles.

Cairo, Dec. 8. The trial of Mohamud Sami, Abdallah Pasha, Ali Fahmy and Touba Pasha, Egyptian rebel leaders charged with complicity in the burning of Alexandria, the massacre of Europeans and rebellion against the Khedive, was commenced yesterday. They all pleaded guilty and were sentenced to death. This sentence was afterwards commuted to exile for life. Europeans in Alexandria object to the commutation of the death sentence passed on these blood-thirsty rebels. They threaten to lynch them before they leave the country.

French Personal Property Tax.

PARIS, Dec. 8. The French Chamber of Deputies has rejected the motion tabled yesterday to increase the tax on personal property.

GENERAL CABLE NEWS.

OTTAWA, Dec. 6.

The Bishop of Saskatchewan, who is in England, will read before the Royal Colonial Institute next week, subject, "The North-West of Canada." In connection with the resurrection of the Morgan slander by the New York Sun, Mr. Forbes, of Rochester, a very near relative of Morgan, states that he is personally aware that Morgan was released on condition of his leaving the country; that he published a paper in Melbourne, Australia, until his death a few years since, and that the paper is still published by his son.

The various delegations appointed to confer with the government on the question of vital statistics are in the city stopping at the Russell House. The following are the delegates in town: Halifax: Drs. Wickwire, Moren and Almon, and Mr. MacCoy, M.P.P. Charlottetown: Dr. Conroy. St. John: Drs. Botsford, Harding and Daniel. Quebec: F. Langlier, R. Ronfret, Drs. Dionne and Roy. Toronto: Drs. Oudright, Canniff, Wright and Playter. Londonderry, N. S.: Dr. Macdonald. Montreal: A. A. Stevenson, J. A. Mooney, F. N. Dexter, J. W. Beaudry, Drs. Fairbairn, Hickstone, Howard, Larocque and Campbell.

The delegates were in private session this afternoon for the purpose of making up suitable resolutions to be presented to the Minister of Agriculture to-morrow. The principal case before the Supreme Court to-day was that of the Queen v. Smith, an appeal from the Exchequer Court of Canada, on an action for a breach of contract. This case in connection with the contract let by Mr. McKenzie for the construction of the Georgian Bay branch of the Pacific Railway. The claim consists of—1st, balance due for work performed; 2nd, re-payment of outlay in preparing to go on with the work; and 3rd, loss of anticipated profit. In the Exchequer Court, Judge Henry, who tried the case, gave judgment in favor of the plaintiffs for one hundred thousand dollars anticipated profits, and \$71,040 outlay incurred in preparing to go on with the work; in all \$171,040. From this judgment the Court appealed to the Supreme Court. Mr. Lash, Q. C., and Mr. Hogg appeared for the Crown, and Mr. Hector Cameron, Q. C., and Hon. Mr. McDougall, Q. C., for respondent. Judgment reserved.

The vice regal party leave British Columbia to-day for home via Puget Sound and Oregon. CANNO, Dec. 6. A body, identified by Mr. Jenkins, of Halifax, as that of Captain Fritz, was brought up by divers from the hold of the "Cedar Grove." His watch had stopped at seventeen minutes past seven. The remains were brought to Canso by steamer "Rimouski." The face is very much disfigured. ELMIRA, N. Y., Dec. 6. The passenger train bound north on the Lehigh Railroad collided with a freight train on a side track yesterday by reason of switches giving wrong signals. Both engines were wrecked. The mail, express and baggage cars and several freight cars caught fire and burned. Engineer Warren and fireman Davidson of the passenger engine had no time to jump. Davidson was taken from the wreck with probably fatal injuries. Warren, although pitched in the wreck, was rescued before being severely burned. A most terrible fate befell freight engineer Faulke and fireman Lander Kinsman; the latter was burned near the tire of his locomotive and was probably killed immediately, although he may have been burned to death. Engineer Faulke was pinioned in the cab. He saw the flames spreading and called the train hands to pull away the cab. His right leg could not be extricated, and the flames spread so rapidly that no one could get near, though they worked with axes, and he met his death by inches bravely in the flames.

BERLIN, Dec. 6. The parliamentary situation and the Egyptian question were subjects of discussion in an interview yesterday of Bismarck with Emperor William. The Emperor expressed satisfaction with Bismarck's policy. COLOGNE, Dec. 6. The Rhine has risen 31 centimetres since 2 o'clock this morning. The Meuse is again rising rapidly. The Neckar and Main are also rising, but more gradually. BERLIN, Dec. 6. Loss by floods in Rhenish districts

amount to millions of marks. The damage to Duisburg alone amounts to a million marks. Sixty houses near Mayence have been ruined and swept away.

DURBAN, Dec. 6. Intelligence has been received from the Transvaal that Caffres have been driven into Chief Maphoch's caves. One cave has been destroyed with dynamite and it is supposed fifty natives have been killed. The commandant and a Boer were also killed.

LONDON, Dec. 6. Standard Court, in Worcestershire, the seat of Sir Francis Winnington, was burned to-day, together with valuable plate, pictures and manuscripts.

LONDON, Dec. 6. Herr Von Flotow, the well known composer of operas, has become blind from cataract of the eye.

LONDON, Dec. 6. A collier foundered off Berwick to-day and ten persons were drowned.

LONDON, Dec. 6. A man named Michael Kelly has been arrested at Anner, County Limerick, in connection with the murder of the Joyce family. A private letter from Madagascar states that the French gunboat has left Tamatar, thus releasing the Malagassy war vessel from embargo. The gunboat's destination is unknown.

VIENNA, Dec. 3. Of eleven persons in connection with the recent riots in the suburbs of this city, eight have been sentenced to imprisonment from fourteen days to two months. Three others were acquitted.

LONDON, Dec. 6. The Daily News says the Queen will receive the Malagassy Embassy next Tuesday.

The steamer "Phoenician" landed the crew of the British ship "Roumania" from Quebec, November 8th, for Liverpool. The "Roumania" was abandoned waterlogged on the 22nd ult. eighty miles east of St. John, N. B.

A vessel foundered at Tynemouth. All on board were drowned.
