

# Rangers Defeat Bruins 5-0 For First Victory In Last Nine Starts

NEW YORK, Dec. 17 (AP)—New York Rangers scored their first victory in nine starts tonight and prevented Boston from taking over second place in the tight National Hockey League race, by beating the Bruins 5-0 before the smallest Madison Square Garden crowd of the season, 4,551.

The tail-end Rangers turned in their finest performance of the season. Only a terrific goal-tending job by Sugar Jim Henry prevented Rangers from running the score into box-score figures. Henry came up with 45 saves.

Goalie Chuck Rayner, minor-league bound a few weeks ago, made only 18 saves, few of them difficult, in chalking up his first shutout of the season.

Rangers jumped off to a 2-0 lead in the first period on goals by Paul Ronty and Ed Slowinski. Slowinski's marker was his first of the season.

Following a bruising but scoreless second period Rangers locked it up with a three-goal third-period barrage. Wally Hergesheimer, Rangers' top goal-getter, assisted on all three goals. Rookie Neil Strain started and ended the clean-up drive. Edgar LaPrade, playing his last game for Rangers, tallied the other marker. LePrade plans to return to his Port Arthur, Ont., home this week-end for business reasons.

Defenceman Bill Quackenbush of Bruins suffered a nerve injury in his right shoulder in the second period following a check into the boards by Allan Stanley. He may be out for one game.

Rookie Ian MacIntosh, brought up from Vancouver, made his debut for Rangers and played a sound game.

## Robinson Refers To Negro Question

NEW YORK, Dec. 17 (AP)—Jackie Robinson said today he had talked with Commissioner Ford Frick about a television interview in which the Brooklyn infielder had accused the New York Yankees of discriminating against Negro players.

Robinson added, however, he had not been "silenced" by the Commissioner but simply had been asked to avoid such issues in the future.

"Frick called me" explained the Dodger second baseman, "and asked for a transcription of the interview. I told him exactly what had taken place at the studio. The question was brought to me 'Why the Yankees did not have any Negro ball players' and I merely answered what I honestly felt. Whether it's true I do not know, but that's the way I felt."

"Frick asked me to avoid the issue in the future if I could do so and I said 'Certainly'. But I also told him while I was not looking for any arguments with the Yankees or anybody else, I would give the same answer if I were ever asked the same question again."

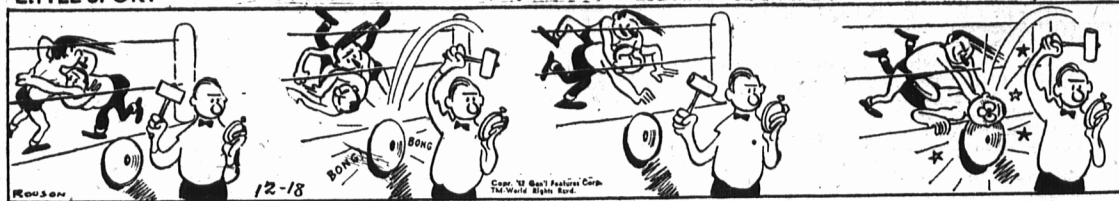

## Promoting East-West Bowling Championship

TORONTO, Dec. 17 (CP)—The Canadian Bowling Association is promoting an annual east-west five-pin bowling championship in which every one of Canada's thousands of bowlers could compete.

President Charles Hill of Toronto, just returned from a Western Canada tour, said in an interview today that bowling associations everywhere are favorable to the idea.

The big obstacle to an East-West competition is the different scoring systems in use in the East and West. Before the all-Canada championship can become a reality the two factions must agree on a uniform scoring system.

Mr. Hill said league officials in Western Canada were receptive to a revised system incorporating the best points of the current ones. He said action may be forthcoming next spring.

The chief variation is the scoring value placed on the pins. In Central Canada, the headpin or centre pin is worth one point; in the west it's worth two points; in the east it's worth one point in the West and four here.

If the Canadian championship comes into being, Mr. Hill suggested Winnipeg as the site of the first match, with succeeding contests alternating between East and West. The two competing teams would be decided by elimination tournaments starting in city leagues and working through provincial and zone playoffs.

## Top Golfers For 1952 Selected

CHICAGO, Dec. 17 (AP)—Julius Boros, golf's Cinderella man, today officially was crowned 1952 money-winning champion and sharp-shooting Jack Burke, Jr., certified as Vardon Trophy winner for the best scoring average.

Final Professional Golfers Association tabulation credited Boros with \$37,032 against a paltry \$4,697 in 1951 when he finished 34th money-winner in his first full year of pro tourney play.

Boros finished some \$6,100 ahead of runner-up Cary Middlecoff. Burke, whose 70.54-stroke average for 78 rounds won the coveted Vardon award, was third in money-winning with \$21,003. The handsome pro from Houston, Tex., also leads in Ryder Cup points as of Dec. 15 with \$19,712, about 17 ahead of Sammy Snead's \$02 2/3.

Snead was fourth in earnings with \$19,908. # Archie Moore Wins Light-Heavyweight Crown In Decision

ST. LOUIS, Dec. 17 (AP)—Grim-faced, determined Archie Moore made up for years of bitter frustration tonight by battering light-heavyweight champion Joey Maxim into a bleeding hulk to win the 175-pound title by unanimous decision.

Ignored by one champion after another for over five years the "unowned champion" made it official tonight by blasting the steel-chinned, 30-year-old Cleveland with a blistering barrage of punches from beginning to end. A roaring crowd of 12,610 in the St. Louis Arena and millions more on the country-wide television beam, watched the powerful, 36-year-old Negro score his one-sided triumph.

Moore became the oldest light-heavyweight king since Ruby Bob Fitzsimmons grabbed the crown at the age of 41. Maxim's defeat came in his third defence of the crown he won nearly three years ago.

The challenger, fired up for his big moment, rocked the champion in the very first round, staggered him often afterwards but couldn't bring the game Maxim down.

At the finish, Maxim was bleeding from cuts under both eyes, from a gash on his left cheek bone and from the nose. There was no doubt as to what the decision was going to be.

Judge Howard Hess scored it 82-68; Judge Fred Connell had it 87-63 while referee Harry Kressler

who kept up a running fire of chatter throughout the fight, had it surprisingly close, 76-74.

The Associated Press had Moore the winner, 87-63, giving Moore 12 rounds, Maxim two and calling one even. One of the rounds, the fourth, went to Joey because of a low blow.

Moore, who was out-weighted 174 1/2 to 172 1/2, was the 8-to-5 favorite when the bout got under way.

The challenger, who has lost only one fight in nearly 3 1/2 years, poured on the pace in a relentless fashion. Fighting out of a crouch, he whaled Maxim's body with devastating body punches that took the spring out of Maxim's legs, cut his face to ribbons, and rocked him in almost every round after the seventh.

When Maxim held on for dear life, Moore snarled at him: "Fight, Maxim! Just hold."

All that Maxim could offer were his occasional left jabs and short left hooks plus a few rights that just brought a smile to Moore's face.

The crowd which contributed to a record St. Louis gate of \$89,487, at times roared for Moore to "Put him away" and Maxim to "Hold on."

A scowl on his face, Archie gave an indication of what was to come in the very first round when he smashed a terrific right to Maxim's jaw. The champion shook all over and then held.

Despite his beating, Maxim said he wanted a return bout with Archie. Under their contract, Moore must give him a return bout within 60 or 90 days.
