**British Press Deplores U. S. Moves Against Its Main Ally**

LONDON (Reuters) — The British press lashed out Sunday at the United States and in particular the Eisenhower administration for its failure to take a positive stand during the Suez Canal crisis and to back its one great ally—Britain.

The Sunday Times declares point blank: "President Eisenhower proclaims his faith in the Atlantic alliance, yet almost every act of commission or omission by himself or his government during the last three weeks has been deliberately directed against America's principal partners, and so against the alliance itself."

"Very shortly after the ceasefire," the paper says, "Sir Anthony Eden approached the president personally and received a cordial response to his suggestion that he visit Washington forthwith to clear away misunderstandings and rebuild mutual confidence. A few hours later, this message was reversed."

The popular News of the World accuses the United States of adopting "a holler-than-thou attitude."

The U.S. "has been like a petulant schoolmarm whose favorite pupil has let her down," it says.

"But what if her lifeline was the Suez Canal and not the Panama Canal? Would she have been Nasser tweak her nose month after month and even try to talk sense into him after he'd snatched Suez?"
