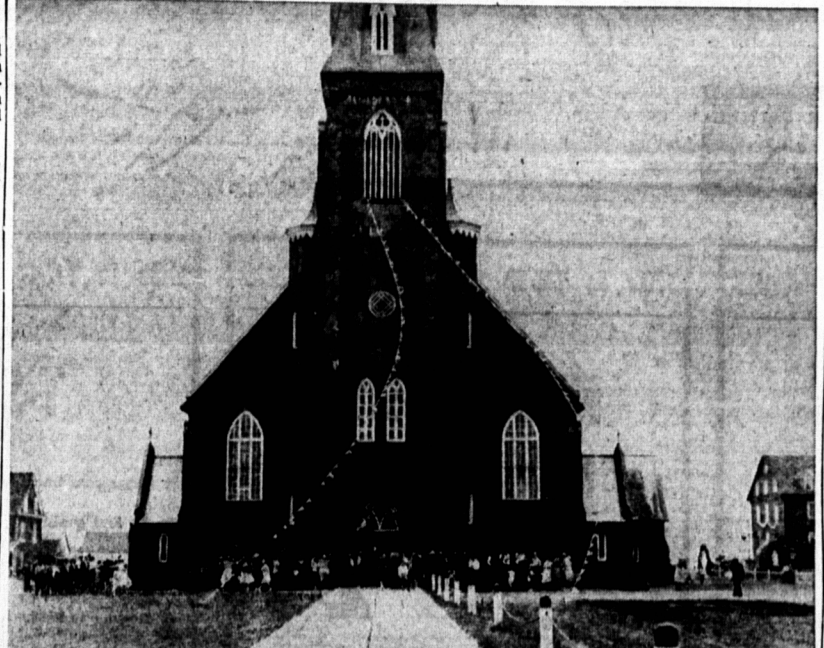




### ARCHBISHOP BERRY LEADS PROCESSION

The president Mr. Frank Bryan presided and following the reading of minutes and correspondence, gave a report of his attendance at the annual meeting of the Maritime Provinces Board of Trade in Halifax recently.

Dr. L.G. Dewar reported good progress on the work of preparing a roadside table site at Cane's Bridge and on motion it was decided to make this project the main one of the board for this year as far as roadside tables were concerned.

Aquatic sports day is sponsored by the board in the interest of tourists for West Prince and a number of prominent officials have been invited to attend, including the secretary of the Maritime Provinces Board, Mr. Alfred Parks. ### On Holiday Here From Activities In Pakistan

From Pakistan, where the temperature was 110 degrees at the time of their departure, where women wear a customary "burka" to protect them from the male gaze, and where each man is allowed three or four wives by Moslem law, Fred Campbell, a native of Alberton, has arrived to spend several weeks' holidays on P.E.I. Accompanied by his wife and three children, Mr. Campbell leaves the Island on August 1st to resume his duties at Peshawar, Pakistan, where he is supervisor of all equipment used in various Colombo Plan projects.

"I enjoy my job very much," Mr. Campbell told The Guardian yesterday morning as he related his impressions of life in Pakistan which, in comparison to Canadian standards, is quite primitive. "The people are very friendly," Mr. Campbell said. "They still ride donkeys and wear the same clothes as were worn centuries ago. The women get water from rivers or the village well, and farming is done mostly by oxen and wooden implements, with very little modern machinery."

Mr. Campbell lives in a Pakistani style house with a very high ceiling, but containing an air conditioner, electric stove, refrigerator, and other modern appliances. Like the other Canadians involved in Colombo Plan work, he also enjoys free movies twice a week, tennis facilities, dances, and other forms of amusement. A four-room school, with instruction up to the eighth grade by Canadian teachers, is also supplied to the Canadian colony, which numbers about 250 families.

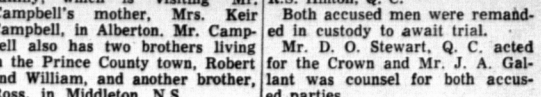

## Canadian Delegate Sees World War As Suicide

PUGWASH, N.S. (CP)—Dr. G. Brock Chisholm, a Canadian delegate to the international scientists conference here, says world government is inevitable because war today means suicide. As the four-day meeting of world nuclear experts neared its end, he said in an interview people must adjust their thinking to accept the facts of atomic and hydrogen warfare. He said men have accepted them only on an intellectual level so far. Dr. Chisholm, a noted psychiatrist and former head of the World Health Organization, said "people haven't adjusted their thinking to the new state of affairs. War is now impossible as a means of settling disputes. What's to take its place?" He offered this alternative: A world federation of some kind and a world police force. "We've got to realize that world government is not only inevitable, but also desirable. NOT THIS GENERATION "We won't be able to do it all in this generation... How long it will take depends on how far we get along in our thinking." He said people will have to learn to question many of the loyalties of their ancestors; they will have to find new ways of getting along together as individuals and as nations. Dr. Leo Szilard, the Chicago physicist who helped develop the world's first atomic reactor, said he thinks scientists can get along together more readily than politicians. With scientists it was a search for facts, with politicians a search for motives. "When scientists talk they usually ask if what their colleagues say is true. When a politician says something all the others ask, 'why does he say that?'" Dr. Szilard, top United States scientist at the 10-nation conference, said the Pugwash talks among Western and Communist scientists followed that pattern. "When we are discussing questions of fact we agree. When it's a question of opinion we find we disagree, but we usually find out quickly why we disagree." The scientists have been trying to find ways to help prevent the atomic power they developed from wiping out mankind. All day Wednesday they worked over a joint announcement on the result of the conference. But their differing views on some points delayed its release. Informed sources said it might not be ready until today. The conference was due to end Wednesday night.

### United Laymen Hold Annual P. E. L. Conference

Mr. W. E. Brooks was elected president and Mr. Hudson Pridham vice-president of the Conference of the P.E. Island United Church Laymen at their annual meeting held in Freetown on Friday, July 5th. Devotional periods at the several sessions were led by G. R. Leard, J. R. Bryan and Ralph Calbeck. The theme of the Conference was "The Need of Evangelism" and the topic was introduced and dealt with in a very efficient manner by Rev. G. N. Somers. He said that many Church members today are producing a very low grade of Christianity and showed how group meetings can be very helpful in raising this standard, that the essence of Christianity is "a friendship with God in Jesus Christ" and that it is the duty of the Church to tell people about God, that there is a great loneliness in the human heart until we accept Jesus as our Savior and Friend. Many took part in the discussion that followed. In the evening the Conference was addressed by Mr. Heber Hardy. He took as his text a verse from 2nd Timothy "having a form of Godliness but denying the power thereof". He made it very clear that there is no substitute for the Church and there is no other organization carrying on this work that God cannot accept any substitute for ourselves. A duet by Mr. Ashley and Mr. Leard was effectively rendered at this time. Reference was made to the passing of the late Rev. G. I. Green who was a faithful member of the Association. Resolution were brought in thanking the minister and Session for the use of the Church and also the people of Freetown for their hospitality. One resolution passed was urging our Government not to open any more outlets for the sale of intoxicating liquors and commending the Government for voting more money for temperance education. The delegates were entertained at homes in the Community at the noon hour and the evening meal was served in the Church Vestry. Rev. Mr. Walls was present in the afternoon and welcomed the Conference to Freetown Church and in the evening brought the meeting to a close with the observance of Holy Communion.
