

Braves Edge Yankees 1-0 In Fifth Series Game

MILWAUKEE (AP)—Fidgely Lew Burdette blanked New York Yankees with seven hits Monday 1-0 for his second world series victory as Milwaukee Braves took a 3-2 edge at the end of five games.

Joe Adcock, benched Sunday because of a severe hitting slump, drove in the only run of the game in the sixth with a line single to right following singles by Eddie Mathews and Hank Aaron.

Whitney Ford, matching Burdette pitch for pitch on this beautiful fall afternoon, head retired two batters in the sixth before trouble struck.

Mathews, whose 10th inning homer won Sunday's game for the Braves, rolled a high hopper toward second baseman Jerry Coleman. The veteran Yankee didn't charge the ball but waited for the hope and Mathews just beat his throw to first base.

Aaron dunked a single into short right field that fell between overcharging Hank Bauer and the back peddling Coleman. With two out, Mathews was running with the hit. He easily reached third.

Adcock, who had bounced into a double play last time up and had only two series hits in 14 previous at bats, ramed Ford's second pitch into right as Mathews romped home.

Burdette, a 30-year-old righthander who once worked for the Yanks before he helped carry the \$50,000 to Boston for Johnny Sain in 1951, didn't walk a man. He struck out four, including the first two batters in the ninth.

ROLLED SINGLE
After that Gil McDougald rolled a single into centre field, then Burdette forced Yogi Berra to pop to Mathews for the game-winning out.

A grinding Burdette was virtually mobbed by his eager mates who rushed from the dugout en masse to pump his hand and rub his college-style crewcut.

The big crowd of 48,811 was slow to leave as though reluctant to see the Milwaukee end of the series finished.

Both teams flew to New York shortly after the game. They will work out today, an off day for travel purposes in the series schedule. The sixth game will be played Wednesday at Yankee Stadium.

In sharp contrast to the other two games here that were loaded with homers and extra base hits, every one of the 13 hits in this fifth game was a single. Andy Pafko and Aaron each had two of the Braves' six off Ford, and Mathews and Adcock had the others.

Hank Bauer kept his series streak alive with two singles, making it 12 consecutive series games in which he has hit safely. Enos Slaughter contributed two singles and McDougald, Berra and Coleman each added one.

The Yanks were forced to play without Mickey Mantle, their slugging centre fielder, who had injured his shoulder sliding in Saturday's game. He was able to play Sunday but was handicapped at bat and in his throwing.

MANTLE IN BRIEFLY
Mantle did get into the game briefly when the Yankees staged a threat in the eighth. He went in to run for Coleman after the infielder singled with one score.

After pinch-hitter Elston Howard was called out on strikes, Mantle tried to steal on the first pitch to Bauer. Left Crandall's perfect throw to Felix Mantilla cut him down with room to spare.

Mantilla played second from the second inning on after Red Schoendienst pulled a groin muscle while trying vainly to stop Slaughter's roller that went for a single.

Wes Covington, who made a sensational catch at Yankee Stadium to save Burdette in the second inning of the second game, repeated with another spectacular



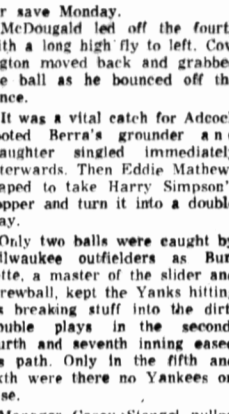

lar save Monday.

McDougald led off the fourth with a long high fly to left. Covington moved back and grabbed the ball as he bounced off the fence.

It was a vital catch for Adcock booted Berra's grounder and Slaughter singled immediately afterwards. Then Eddie Mathews leaped to take Harry Simpson's hopper and turn it into a double play.

Only two balls were caught by Milwaukee outfielders as Burdette, a master of the slider and screwball, kept the Yanks hitting his breaking stuff into the dirt. Double plays in the second, fourth and seventh inning eased his path. Only in the fifth and sixth were there no Yankees on base.

Manager Casey Stengel pulled out all the stops in his book of strategy in the eighth after Coleman singled with one out.

First he let Ford move to the eighth, retiring the Braves in the eighth. He caught both Johnny Logan and Mathews on called third strikes.

In the clubhouse after the game, Stengel said Turley, a 27-year-old righthander who was knocked out in the second inning of Saturday's game, would be Wednesday pitcher.

ALL FUTILE
It all turned out to be futile for Howard took a called strike, fouled off one and then looked at another strike. Mantle took off for second on the first pitch—a strike to Bauer and was out on an attempted steal.

Football Returning To St. Dunstan's In New Form

A history making event in the local football world may occur here this week with the meeting of Saint Dunstan's University and Prince of Wales College in a Canadian football game.

The possibility of such a game was seen here yesterday and if the game becomes a reality it will be the first time that the two colleges have faced one another geared in the complete outfits of Canadian football players.

And it is also possible that Saint Dunstan's will play Moncton at the S.D.U. field next Monday. Saints have been negotiating with Moncton for this game and hope to be able to announce that the game has been arranged before this week ends.

Coach A.J. MacAdam, who won singular success with S.D.U. rugby teams during the past few years, is guiding the Saints in their new undertaking. MacAdam has been working out 30 players daily and expects to have a reasonably strong squad ready for the proposed exhibition

game. The S.D.U. Coach is building his team around a number of partially experienced players from outside the Province and about 20 Island boys who have shown an aptitude for picking up the fundamentals of the game.

Biggest find in the S.D.U. camp this year probably is 20-year-old Gil Collins from Regina, Saskatchewan. A quarterback with considerable experience in Western Canada Junior ball, Collins could be the shot in the arm which the Saints require to introduce the game to Island fans.

Collins took a year off from his studies last year and took a turn at the newspaper game but headed back to College this fall. He picked Saint Dunstan's on the recommendations of his friend Brian Noonan, also from Regina, who studied at S.D.U. last year.

Along with Collins and Noonan from Regina came husky Pat Hegan, an 18-year-old Westerner who plays both football

and basketball. Collins and Noonan also are basketball players. Hockey players working out with the team include Jack Kane of Charlottetown and big Ray Hache. Basketballers Lorne MacGuigan, Gerard Tingley, Kenny MacKinnon and Don Tooke are also playing.

Among the boys from this Province who may be in uniform when the Saints play their first exhibition game are Jack Kane, Pat A. Nault, Vernon MacDonald, Ian MacDonald, Ed Foley, Joe McIsaac, Ed Morrison, Phonso Smith, Charlie Sark, Bob Simmonds, James Gallant, George Trainor, Kenny MacKinnon, Ed Murphy, James Smith, Lorne MacGuigan, Donnie LeClair and Don MacCorrack.

Others players will include Emile Bouchard, Pleton Trudeau, Vince MacIntyre, Gil Collins, Brian Noonan, Ray Hache, Gaston St. Louis, Don Tooke, Gerard Tingley, Pat Hegan, Jack James and Howard White.

Coach MacAdam plans to dress two full squads, one a defensive team and the other an offensive team.

NHL To Start 41st Season

MONTREAL (CP)—The National Hockey League faces off its 41st season today with indications that annual forecasts of a mad scramble for top placings may turn out more factual than proverbial.

Wholesale player-swaps since last season, with at least three big names involved, have put even speculation on a topay-turvy basis.

There is fairly general agreement, however, that the strength of the Chicago Black Hawks not only will climb out of the cellar but should barge into select company as one of the four playoff teams.

There is also a feeling that Montreal Canadiens will finish first and regain the NHL title they surrendered to Detroit Red Wings last season.

Another school holds to the theory that the hat-pin method is as good as any.

The Black Hawks usher in the season in the only game scheduled today when they are hosts to Toronto Maple Leafs.

TWO ALL-STARS

Acquisitions by the Hawks since last season include leftwinger Ted Lindsay and goalie Glen Hall from Detroit, both all-stars, defenceman Jim Thomson from Toronto Maple Leafs and forward Ron Murphy from New York Rangers.

Thursday Hawks play at Montreal while Detroit Red Wings entertain New York Rangers.

Boston Bruins open their schedule Saturday, hosts to the Black Hawks. New York plays the same night at Montreal and Detroit at Toronto.

Once all teams get rolling there is a coming epoch-making event—the 500th goal by Montreal's colorful Maurice (Rocket) Richard. The famous Rocket, 36 years old and starting his 16th NHL season, has amassed 493 goals.

SCORING LEADERSHIP
Another feature of the season will be the battle for the scoring

leadership. The big question will be whether Gordie Howe of Detroit can again grab the honors despite the loss of his linemate, Ted Lindsay.

Any of a half dozen or more are ready to challenge Howe. They include Lindsay himself, who was second last season; Jean Beliveau of Montreal, Andy Bathgate of New York, Eddie Litzenberger of Chicago and Rocket Richard.

Boston Bruins, who may upset all calculations, will go along with Don Simmons in goal, the youngster who took over when Jerry Sawchuk walked out last season. Sawchuk now is with Detroit. The Bruins also acquired forward John Bucyk from Detroit and Bronco Horvath from the Montreal farm chain. The Bruins last year were a bang-up third and went to the Stanley Cup finals, losing to Montreal.

Montreal Canadiens start out as an intact team, plus a couple of prospects. They are Stan Smrke, acquired from Chicoutimi of the Quebec Hockey League last season, and Marcel Bonin, Boston chattel drafted from Quebec Aces of the QHL.

The 29-year-old Smrke may turn out to be a real prize. He got into only four games last season after the mid-winter deal because of a knee injury. He was always a prolific scorer in the QHL, and a spurge this season could-put him in the rookie-of-the-year ratings.

If Smrke and Bonin make the grade, the axe will fall somewhere among the Stanley Cup winners—just where is anybody's guess.

Only one new coach makes his bow in the NHL this season—Billy Reay, with Toronto. Reay, one-time Montreal centre did a good job with Rochester of the American Hockey League last season. He replaces Howie Meeker.

Jerry Coleman Accepted Responsibility For Run

MILWAUKEE (AP)—Jerry Coleman accepted responsibility like the officer and gentleman that he is for the play that set up the run by which Milwaukee Braves beat New York Yankees 1-0 Monday in the fifth game of the world series.

"I blew it," he said, solemn and grim faced.

He referred to the high bouncer hit by Eddie Mathews in the sixth with two out.

"I played it badly. I should have taken one step in. He fooled me with his speed," said Coleman, the Yankee second baseman. "He should have been out."

Instead, Mathews was safe as Coleman lobbed the ball to Harry Simpson. Then Hank Aaron dropped a pop fly single between Coleman and Hank Bauer, and Mathews raced to third, scoring on Joe Adcock's single to right.

FLUKE SINGLE
Aaron's pop fly that fell for a single also came in for discussion in the gloomy Yankee dressing room.

"I went back as far as I could, but when I saw I couldn't catch it I veered off," said Coleman. "Our play is to go out until I can see I can't make it. If you go too far you can upset a guy trying to make a running catch."

Coleman was asked if he heard from Bauer.

"No," he said, "I didn't hear a thing."

Bauer confirmed this. "I had to play Aaron deep," said the Yankee rightfielder. "That's where his power is—deep in right field. The ball just fell between us. We didn't say a word."

Coleman, a marine major and one of the most popular players on the Yankee team, was the centre of a large group of reporters after the game. They tried to offer him sympathy and make up excuses but he would have none of it.

Manager Casey Stengel declined to take sides on the question of Aaron's single.

"I see the ball up in the air, but I couldn't tell you about it," he said, adding, in almost Bauer's words, that it was necessary to play Aaron deep.

Stengel said he plans to start Bob Turley in Wednesday's game in New York. Turley, a fireballer, pitched the eighth inning against the Braves Monday, forcing Felix Mantilla to fly out to centre, and retiring Johnny Logan and Ed Mathews on called third strikes.

WENT FOR TWO RUNS
Stengel was asked why he first sent up Ford to bat in the eighth, after Coleman had singled with one out, and then switched to Elston Howard.

"I was gonna sacrifice, and then I saw I wouldn't have a chance to use Howard again, so I decided to go for two runs instead of one," he replied.

Stengel said he does not know

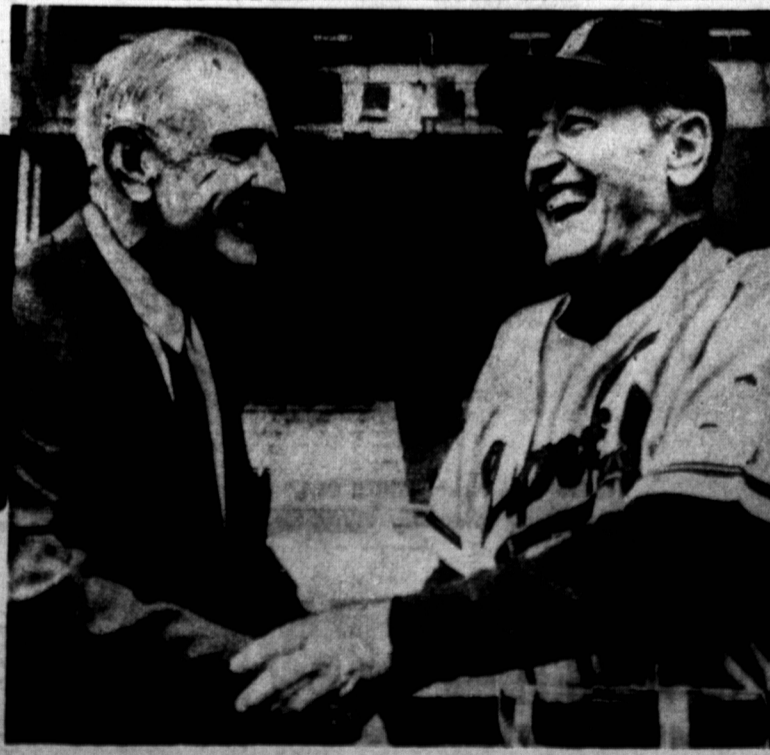
Joe Spieser, brother and manager of the fighter, said: "We have reason to believe Jack Kearns, Moore's co-manager, will accept our offer within a day or so."
