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United States Women Golfers Retain Curtis Cup

Visiting Team Plays Draw With British Players In Close Exciting Matches

Scottish Loss Climaxes Turbulent Day's Play By Spectacular Putt On 18th Green To Deadlock Series.

(Associated Press by Guardian's Special Wire) GLENAGLES, Scotland, May 6.—Playing through weather that would keep ducks on the ground, United States women golfers broke even with British players in nine turbulent matches here today and retained the Curtis Cup, first won in 1932 at Wentworth, England, and successfully defended at Chevy Chase, Md., in 1934. Each team gathered 41-2 points.

As a climax of today's play, Jessie Anderson, a 21-year-old blond freckle-faced Scottish girl from nearby Perth, ran down a putt clear across the 18th green to beat Mrs. Leona Cheney, Santa Monica, Calif., one up, and draw her side even with the Americans.

Each team won one foursome match and halved the third. Each won three singles, half of which were decided by one hole margins. Golf gets nothing more exciting than that.

Stirring Climax When Miss Anderson, who was playing home course, squinted at Mrs. Cheney's ball which lay almost dead in her line on the 18th green, then stroked the ball into the cup, the Scottish crowd of some 5,000 raised a cry that almost dispelled the mist which hung thick over the King's course.

When Norman Boase, Captain of the Royal and Ancient Club of St. Andrews, presented the Curtis Cup he insisted that Capt. Glenna Collett Vane of the United States team and Doris Elaine Chambers, non-playing captain of the British side, each hold one side of the trophy.

"Nothing else would be proper after a match like you girls played today," he said. The trophy, nevertheless, will return to the United States with Mrs. Vane and her colleagues after the British women's championship at Southampton.

Fail To Show Form Getting down to cases, the match chiefly featured the almost total collapse of two of America's most notable golfing figures, Patty Berg, the 18-year-old star from Minneapolis, and Mrs. Voj S. Hill, Kansas City.

Patty, suffering a severe attack of stage fright, managed to break even in the foursomes, thanks to some heroic work by her partner, Mrs. Vane. The red-haired girl was half-beaten, though, when she teed off against Mrs. Helen Holm, the former British women's champion from Troon, in the singles.

After losing the first two holes in the afternoon, she never had a chance for Mrs. Holm played superb golf and hit the turn in 37, two under par. Patty was three down at that stage and she finally lost 4 and 3.

Mrs. Hill, playing with Charlotte Glutting, South Orange, N. J., in the foursomes, failed to play anything like her usual golf. Miss Anderson and Mrs. Holm beat them 3 and 2. In the singles, Mrs. Hill's play was worse and she lost to Mrs. Marjorie Ross Garon, the 1935 English ladies closed champion, 7 and 5.

The match between Mrs. Vane, U. S. women's champion, and Wanda Morgan, the British champion, drew the crowd of the day, and though Mrs. Vane did not play spectacular golf she had the shots when she needed them to win, 3 and 2.

"He's as good as ever," said manager Pop Foster. "I wish he could go into the ring tonight." McLarnin's showing in his drills, plus the fact that he will have a 10 pound advantage, has made him the betting favorite at odds of 7 to 5.

Pearson Breaks Tiger Jinx As Yankees Trounce The World Champions 14-3

NEW YORK, May 6.—Chicago White Sox handed Washington its fourth straight defeat at Washington today, shelling three Washington pitchers for an even dozen hits and a 5-1 triumph.

Piet hit his fourth home run of the season in the seventh inning. Suffering with a bad cold, Buddy Myer, Washington's league batting champion last year, was replaced at second base by Ralph Kress.

Ed Linke, Washington's starting pitcher, was hit on the left shin by a drive from Bonura's bat in the fifth inning. His injury was not serious.

Pitching three-hit ball and aided by 14 hits, three of them home runs, Monte Pearson defeated Detroit Tigers for the first time in his career at New York as Yankees walloped the world champions 14-3 in their first clash of the season.

Pearson, while with the Indians, had dropped seven decisions to the Tigers. Pearson pounded out a homer and a double to drive in four runs. The Yankee offensive drove Schoolboy Rowe from the mound with a six-run attack in the first inning.

The Yanks then hit Roxie Lawson hard and were not stopped until Chad Kimsley took the mound in the seventh. Red Sox turned back the St. Louis Browns 7-4 at Boston in a game which saw expensive Sox hurler Johnny Marcano go the route for the first time this year.

The game featured by Marcano's effective mound work and a sparkling triple to right centre by the Brown's pinch-hitting Ed Coleman with the sacks loaded, marked St. Louis' 10th consecutive defeat.

Marcano, ailing much of the time since his acquisition from Philadelphia held the visitors to seven hits while the Sox were garnering 10 safeties off a quartet of Brown pitchers.

Cleveland Indians' extra base batting shelled the Athletics into a 7-1 defeat in the opening game of a two-clash series at Philadelphia for the Tribe's fifth straight win. Joe Gleason and Hal Trosky hit successive homers in the second and Joe Vosmik hammered out a circuit blow in the sixth.

Johnny Allen pitched shutout ball until the eighth, allowing the A's three scattered singles in seven innings.

Blake Blanks Maple Leafs At Home 6-0

Gabler relieved Pippo Marberry in the ninth with the score tied, as the result of the latter's error, and one on. Gabler passed Tom Padden intentionally and when Sam Leslie threw wild to second for an attempted force out the basis were loaded.

The New York hurler then fanned Woody Jensen, made Paul Waner send up a short fly to Joe Moore and caused Bud Hafey to hit into a force play.

Brooklyn Dodgers broke into the victory column for the first time in seven games at Cincinnati as they defeated Reds 5-2 with George Earnshaw pitching seven-hit ball.

Johnny Cooney and Buddy Hassett got three hits apiece as the Dodgers collected 12 safe blows off four Cincinnati hurriers. They scored four runs on five hits in the fourth when Hollingsworth was driven from the mound.

Tex Carleton picked up where he left off in his role of Boston jinx as the Cubs defeated the Bees 8-6 at Chicago. But he needed a lot of pitching and batting help to take the decision.

The slim righthander had a bad fifth inning when the Bees pounded out five hits for four runs to tie the score. After his mates had staked him to an 8-5 margin he weakened in the ninth and Roy Henshaw and Lon Warneke were called in to handle the situation.

The victory enabled the National League champions to retain first place in the standing. Two errors in the ninth inning, one of them relief pitcher Curt Davis' throw to first base when no one was covering the bag, gave Cardinals a 3-2 victory at St. Louis over Philadelphia.

Bucky Walters of the Phillies allowed only four hits, one of them Charley Gelbert's home run going into the ninth inning. Medwick opened it with a single. Substitute second baseman Gomez threw wild on Johnny Mize's grounder. Medwick scoring the tying run and Mize going to second. Lynn King, running for Mize, went to third on Gelbert's infield out.
