A NEW EASTER.—Winds increasing to
gales, easterly to north easterly, with
snow.

TEACHERS' INSTITUTE.—At the meeting
of the Charlottetown Teachers Institute on
Saturday evening Mr. B. F. Messervey
gave an excellent address treating of pub-
lic speaking. The subject matter of Mr.
Messervey's address was discussed by R. vs.
Fullerton, Spencer and Kirby, Dr. Ta. Jor,
and Messrs Landrigan, Seaman and
Arsenault, all of whom spoke in terms of
praise of the opener's presentation of the
case. Mr. Messervey was tendered the
heartly thanks of the audience for his ad-
dress, which he fittingly acknowledged.
The report of the representatives to the
Women's Council was received and adopt-
ed. The representatives of last year were
re-appointed. There was a short discussion
of the question "Are we justified in requir-
ing our pupils to prepare lessons at home?"
