Addresses Y's Men On Activities In Paraguay

Members of the Charlottetown Y's men heard the political economic and social life of Paraguay discussed in a very interesting and informative talk given by Mr. Robert C. Tilford, a world service secretary of the Y.M.C.A. doing work in that country. There was a good attendance at the dinner meeting held last night. Mr. J. O. MacLean, president of the Centennial Club, presided. Mr. Tilford who is now on furlough in the United States, has been associated with the Y.M.C.A. since 1921. He has had a wide experience in Y work in various parts of United States, he volunteered for service in South America when the Paraguayan Y.M.C.A. made an appeal to the International Committee for a North American worker to help them. Mr. Tilford has worked for Canada and the United States who are serving in 30 different countries of the world. "It is indeed a pleasure to come back to a part of the country where people rely on Christian principles," said Mr. Tilford who told his audience that he had the choice of going to three different fields but went to Paraguay because of the challenge it presented. In order to make his listeners see clearly some of the conditions that exist in Paraguay today, Mr. Tilford dealt briefly with the history of the country which was founded 35 years after Columbus discovered America. He noted three periods of digression which followed the gaining of their independence in 1811. There were three dictators, the first of which he believed in making the country self governing. He did not approve of having anything to do with any other country nor would he allow any other country to trade with them. He started iron smelting and since Paraguay is well provided for, in so far as food stuffs are concerned, the country made progress. The second dictator had dreams of building an overflowing national treasury which he succeeded in doing by appropriating a large portion of the country's wealth. He sent his son to Paris to study and the young man who became the third dictator came back with the idea of becoming the Napoleon of South America. When two of his neighbours, Uruguay and Argentina became involved in a boundary dispute, he elected himself as arbitrator and when these two countries would not accept his decision, he attempted to force his will upon them. The result was that Brazil joined forces with the other two countries and it took five years of fighting before Paraguay was finally subdued. The resulting peace deprived Paraguay of many of its fertile lands and industries. Their libraries which were said to be among the best in the world at that time were either destroyed or the writings seized. About 90% of the male population had been killed in battle and Paraguay was left with very little. It is a white population of European extraction which now inhabits the country. Census taking in Paraguay reveals that five sixths of the population are Catholics. Hook worm is predominant among the children. The Rockefeller Foundation has ways of curing the plague but since parents are not allowed to buy shoes for their children, they quickly become barefooted on the damp ground.

GERMANY (CP)—The United Kingdom and the Netherlands today presented cheques totaling \$117,075 to the Ontario Hurricane Relief Fund. Prime Minister Laurent has handed a cheque of \$25,000 by Sir Archer Canada, and another for \$100,000 by the Netherlands.

Gale force winds accompanied by mountainous seas crushed the bridge housing of the M/S "Germa" (above) while riding out a storm 600 miles off Newfoundland at 4:20 p.m. on Oct. 27, inflicting painful head injuries on Capt. Simon Holmedal and minor injuries to two crew members on watch at the time. Capt. Holmedal received a three-inch cut over the left eye and bruises on the nose and right eye and a crushed left shoulder. The Quartermaster at the wheel received facial lacerations from splintered glass and the lookout man on duty in the wheelhouse received leg bruises. The "Germa" was hoisted on the morning of Oct. 26 and remained under slow steaming all night and the next day. Following the accident, the S.O.S. call was sent out as reported in Canadian Press. The distress call was answered by two other Norwegian ships within one hundred miles of the "Germa". A hurried survey of the ship by Capt. Holmedal, Chief Officer Jakob Kristensen and the chief engineer proved the ship seaworthy. The S.O.S. was cancelled within an hour and the voyage to Charlottetown resumed and continued without further mishap. The "Germa", which left Hamburg, Germany, on Oct. 17 carries a cargo of 3356 tons of potash now unloading at the Railway Wharf. The necessary repairs to the ship will be made here during her stay which will approximate ten days. The "Germa" is a 3800 ton M/S, 311 feet long with a speed of 12-12 knots and carries a crew of 31. Mrs. Holmedal accompanied her Captain husband on this memorable voyage.

Commencement Of Seasonal Layoffs

Seasonal layoffs of workers by Federal Government Agencies and by private employers has commenced. Because of the annual slow-down of traffic by way of the railway service at Borden, the extra men needed during the summer season have been released. Many of the men filed benefit claims at the Charlottetown unemployment insurance office during the first two days of this week. Other groups of men caught by seasonal layoffs have been working with the Dominion Public Works Department in various parts of the province, and the City of Charlottetown. All told, about sixty men registered claims at the Charlottetown Employment office during Monday and Tuesday and more claims are expected today. Many of the men released by the Car ferry Service and the Public Works Department are residents of rural districts. The upswing in claims is a normal occurrence at this time of year, say local employment officials, and the number of claims on hand is about the same as this date one year ago. In Charlottetown the outlook for winter employment is brighter than in most years because of the lively construction program, which is headlined by the block-sized Federal building. The big job will be proceeded with steadily and will employ between fifty and one hundred men throughout the winter. The arrival of two fertilizer boats in Charlottetown yesterday, and the scheduled docking of a potato carrier on Friday, heralds a brisk autumn shipping season which will set work to many longshoremen, between now and the close of navigation.
