

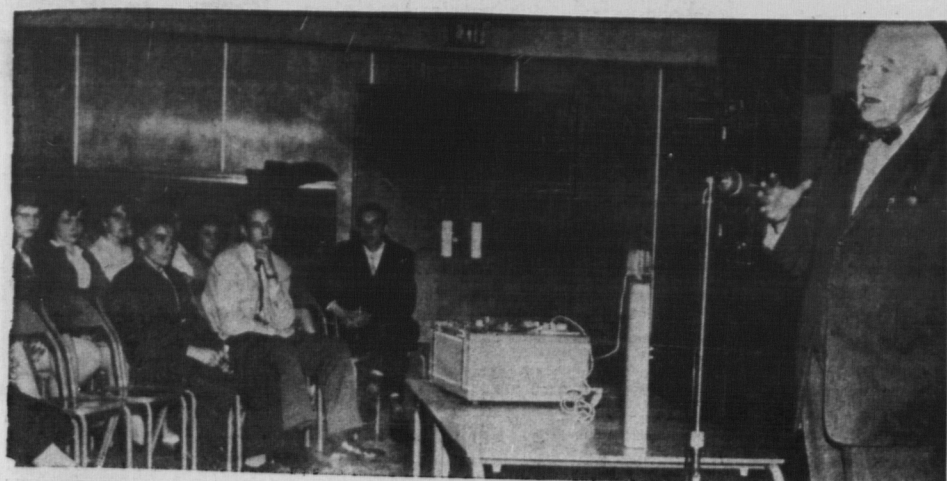
L. Davis Ward Elected Grand Master Of LOL

Youth Conference Hears Authority On Alcoholism

The provincial youth conference on alcohol opened yesterday morning at the Charlottetown YMCA, with sessions being held throughout the day. There are 87 young Islanders in attendance.

David M. Boswell, provincial director of alcohol studies, welcomed the delegates to the meeting and briefly outlined its purposes. Also addressing the group was Rev. T.W. Howard, North River.

drop-outs at college and secondary levels of education." SET EXAMPLE Commenting on the alcohol situation in general, Mr. Ellinwood said, "I still think the only thing to change the 'bad picture' is by both you and I setting examples for others to follow. Alcohol companies say that advertising of a testimonial nature will pay off. The power of examples attracts others. If we set good examples, we may influence others. This, Allied Youth clubs can do. I heartily recommend it as a good way of life."

Mr. Ellinwood closed with an excerpt from the "serenity prayer" said at many Allied Youth meetings. "Grant me serenity to accept the things I cannot change, courage to change the things I can, and the wisdom to know the difference." He was thanked by Mr. Boswell, who said "this encouraging and inspirational talk has opened new avenues of thought to many of us. I sincerely hope that you will promote alcohol education to give it the recognition it deserves. You are the youth, the potential

leaders of the future. It will be extremely difficult, but we've had a soft foot on the pedal too long". A question and answer period following Mr. Ellinwood's talk brought out many very interesting subjects. Mr. Ellinwood, in reply to the question, explained the difference between a drunk and an alcoholic. He called alcohol "a sort of respectable narcotic" and said we are morally responsible for those who do not know how to use it. "A society who can take in millions of dollars in revenue from alcohol, should surely be able to know how to properly use it", he said.

USE KINDNESS Mr. Ellinwood also said, in reply to a question, that the best way to treat an alcoholic is with kindness. He said that the average drinking person in his drinking career will spend enough money on alcohol to completely furnish a comfortable home. The group completes its discussions today with morning and afternoon sessions in the Charlottetown YMCA, followed by a supper banquet in Montgomery Hall.

Sr. Citizens' Housing May Start In July

Construction of low-rental housing for the province's senior citizens may get underway in July, Labor and Welfare Minister Henry Wedge said yesterday.

Mr. Wedge said that the officers of a corporation, approved at the last session of the Legislature, will likely be appointed at the next meeting of the government's Executive Council. Mr. Wedge said he will call an early meeting of the officers to begin work on plans and by-laws for the corporation. He said he also has housing plans and slides to show of low-rental housing projects in other parts of Canada.

The minister said that several communities have offered free land for the projects, and these lands are to be surveyed. "The hope is," the minister said, "that the first units will be built in the West, Prince and East Kings areas."

Break And Enter Case Adjourned

SUMMERSIDE — An Albany man, Leo Austin MacLeod, was charged before Prince County Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald yesterday with breaking and entering the dwelling place of Mrs. Benjamin Bernard, Albany, with intent to commit an indictable offence.

The accused was remanded without plea until May 1, and made no application for bail. The charge arose out of an incident at the Bernard home on April 22. James Waldron, Cameron, Albany, told the court that after being stopped by a police constable, he was told the legal speed limit was 50 miles per hour, although he had understood that it was changed several days before. The man was charged on April 13.

In his evidence Mr. Cameron stated that he knew the RCMP constable was following him for about two miles, but he continued at 60 miles per hour because he thought that to be the legal limit. The wife of the accused was accompanying him at the time, and corroborated his evidence in court.

P.E.I. Teachers Are Urged To Stand Firm On Salaries

An address by Rev. Sister St. Michael, dean of studies, Mt. St. Bernard College, Antigonish, will be the major item on today's agenda of the three-day annual convention of the Prince Edward Island Teachers Federation, which opened yesterday.

Sister St. Michael will speak on "Survival and New Arrivals in Education." At Prince of Wales College yesterday morning upwards of 800 teachers from across the Island registered.

teaching and lack of interest on the part of the teacher. It is the children of the one room rural school who will become the backbone of the country's citizenry, they must be educated, and it is up to the teachers to provide the very best in education for them. She urged the teachers to approach the federation with their problems and difficulties, particularly in the matter of salaries.

An address by the president, Mrs. Marjorie Dover, greetings from the city by deputy mayor W. J. Cox, and an address by the minister of education, Dr. George Dewar, were the main points of the morning's agenda, with study groups for primary, intermediate and high school teachers scheduled for the afternoon.

PROBING THE ADDRESS Pinpointing the recent educational conference in Montreal as the most outstanding educational event in the past year, the president in her address emphasized the vastness of the field of education, and the important and responsible part teachers play in it.

Referring to the "familiar problem of salary," Mrs. Dover spoke of the recent announcement that trustees need not supplement the government grant paid to teachers, and the resulting rumors that many trustee boards would pay no supplement this year.
