### ANNIVERSARY SERVICES AT CENTRAL LOT 16

An event of historical interest will take place on Sunday next at Central Lot 16 United Church.

The congregation on this occasion will celebrate the 60th anniversary of the present church building; but Lot 16 can claim a much older history than that in church annals.

Away back in 1821 on October 11th was formed the first Presbytery of Prince Edward Island, by deed of the Presbyterian Synod of Nova Scotia; and the first meeting was held in the house of Archibald Campbell at Lot 16. This meeting will be commemorated on July 21st when the Presbytery will meet at the church in Central Lot 16. Visitors will be shown the exact spot where the first Presbytery met. The house of Mr. Campbell is now on the property of a neighbour and remodelled into a barn.

Pastors taking part on Sunday at the anniversary services will be Rev. G. Ernest Forbes, B.A., Weston, Ontario, who served at Lot 16 parish from 1898 to 1900 as a student pastor during the summer, Rev. B. Vans MacLean, B.A., of Lanark, Ontario, a native of Lot 16, and Rev. John A. Nicholson, Tyne Valley. Rev. Mr. Forbes will be the preacher at the morning service. The afternoon speaker will be Rev. J. K. Fraser, D.D., formerly of Alberton parish, and a grandson of the late Dr. John Keir, first moderator of Prince Edward Island.

At the evening service Rev. J. Wm. Crawford of Toronto will address the congregation. He is the son of the late Henry Crawford who was pastor of Lot 16 parish between 1864 and 1871.

Rev. W. E. Aitken, St. Peter's Bay, a former pastor of Lot 16, will assist at this service.

An historic review of the church will be read at the morning service dating back to the time of Dr. James MacGregor, when the whole of that district was one large parish.

The choir from the surrounding parishes will assist the local choir. The event is of great interest to all who have closely followed the history of the Presbyterian and United Churches of Prince Edward Island. Rev. E. R. Woodside, B.A., is the present pastor and is a descendant of the only layman, Edward Ramsay, ruling elder from Princeton, who attended the first Presbytery meeting at Lot 16 in 1821. S.

KING HONORS AGED TEACHER HAMILTON, Bermuda, July 16—(C.P.)—The beloved school m'arm who taught many principal business men and parliamentarians of Bermuda their ABC's has been honored by her King.

Ninety-four-year old Miss Janie Frith, still teaching a full day's curriculum in the little school in her home, has been made a Member of the British Empire in King Edward VIII's birthday list. Miss Frith consented to the acceptance of the honor on the condition that it be made without publicity.

Three or four generations of some of Bermuda's leading families attained their early education under her guidance.

### ADDRESSES EARLY HISTORY JOINT MEETING OF DUNK RIVER AT BORDEN DAIRY COMPANY

Mr. E. J. Garland, ex-M.P. for Bow River, Alta., addressed a joint meeting of the Young People's Unions of Borden and Cape Traverse in the Union Hall at Borden Wednesday evening.

Following the singing of the hymn "Where Cross the Crowded Ways of Life," and prayer by Rev. Fred M. Young, the chairman, Rev. Arthur Organ introduced the speaker of the evening.

Mr. Garland, who is earnest, forceful and a delightful speaker, contrasting the capitalistic system with the Canadian Commonwealth Federation, said the United Church of Canada has given splendid leadership in courageously declaring that capitalism is wrong, inasmuch as it is contrary to the teachings of Jesus.

He spoke of the industrial revolution caused by the discovery and use of electricity and of the combined industry that both in factories and on farms, countless numbers of men have been permanently replaced by machinery, which can easily produce enough to supply all human needs. When dividends decrease, under the capitalistic system which is operated for private gain, production is cut down and often crops are destroyed, though 105 millions of unemployed, who desperately need food and clothing, are reported throughout the world, to the League of Nations. Only when we change the system, and work to satisfy human needs, instead of for private profits, can we hope for peace on earth. He stressed the point that as things which are a mere handful of men, economic power and political power are held by two different groups, which always leads to disaster.

In reply to a question Mr. Garland stated his belief that the future inevitably holds for Canada either C. C. F. or Fascism. Another question elicited the response that industrialism and often crops means hardship to the farmer as it means less money for the purchase of farm products. He outlined the origin and growth of the C. C. F. movement, and the rapid increase in its membership during the past year.

A vote of thanks to Mr. Garland was moved by Eric McKenzie, vice-president of Borden Union, and seconded by Eleanor Bell, president of Cape Traverse Union. D.
