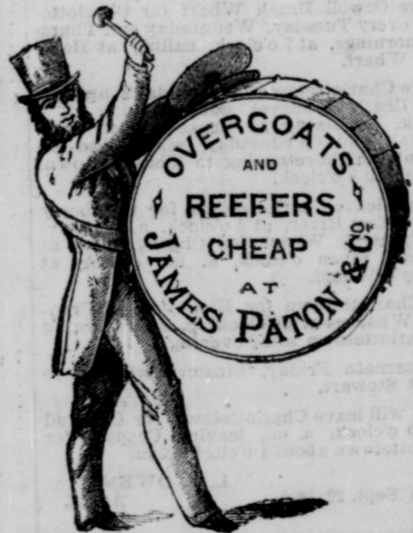

MARKET FOR POTATOES.—Kentville, N. S., Star: The steamer load of potatoes which was sent from Kingsport, N. S., to Havana by Canning firms, is said to be going to clear the shippers 75 cents per bushel. It was thought after the discovery of so many rotten ones in the thousand barrels that was left over from filling the steamer that what went would have proved a total loss. Those left were all picked over and enough more purchased along the C. V. R. line last week to fill a vessel, which will be sent to the same place. This hardly seems to indicate a coming down in the prices here to 40 cents as is reported.

The Wreck of the Melmerby.

NEW GLASGOW, N. S., Oct. 14. All day yesterday the wrecked barque Melmerby, which was stranded at Little Harbor, was watched from the beach. On account of the terrible sea no service could be rendered the four men on the wreck, who could be seen moving about on the ship. At noon to-day, the sea having abated sufficiently to render an attempt at rescue possible, Captain P. Graham, with a boat crew consisting of Daniel Fraser, William and Dr. McLean, of New Glasgow, Jas. McGlashen, of Big Island, and a man from Descausse whose father was on the wreck, put off and reached the stern of the wreck, and the ship-wrecked men were successfully lowered into it and brought safely to land. The four rescued to-day consist of the steward, the captain of the schooner taken on board as a pilot, and the two men, Kane and Evans.

Sugar Refinery Prospectus.

HALIFAX, Oct. 14. The prospectus is issued of the Halifax Sugar Refinery (limited), capital £150,000 in 30,000 shares of £5 each. The Company is formed in England for the purchase of the Woodside Refinery at Halifax, which is capable of producing 80 tons of refined sugar per day. It is proposed to pay £50,000 for the Woodside property, £4,000 in cash and the balance in shares for cash. The Halifax solicitors are Borden, Vichie, Parker & Chisholm, and W. L. Lowell & Co. are receiving applications for shares.

Fisheries Conference.

GLoucester, Mass., Oct. 14. Hon. Robert Bond, Colonial Secretary of Newfoundland, held an audience to-day at the Board of Trade rooms with President Smith and other prominent men connected with the fisheries. The object was to submit a proposition for admitting the produce of the Newfoundland fisheries free, and in return the American fishermen would have free access for bait and other outfits at Newfoundland ports.

Norwegian Barque Wrecked.

ASPY BAY, C. B., Oct. 14. The Norwegian barque Marie, of Christiansia, forty-four days out from Barrow-in-Furness for Charlottetown, P. E. I., with part cargo of steel rails, was wrecked on North Harbor Beach on Sunday morning, at six o'clock, in the gale. The crew narrowly escaped. The ship will be a total wreck.

He Led A Double Life.

MONTREAL, Oct. 14. A great scandal has been caused here by Rev. Mr. Crochets' resignation from the Canning Street Presbyterian Church. It came out that the Rev. gentleman, who is a widower, was keeping a woman on the other side of the line. She had a child in September.

The Ulunda Sails.

HALIFAX, Oct. 14. A despatch from Westport says that the Ulunda left there at 10 o'clock this morning, steaming about about five knots and making very little.

Who is Responsible?

SIR,—Yesterday, Oct. 14th, as teams from Rocky Point drove on the steamer Southport for the city, those who were in charge were informed that they would have to discharge and go home, or stay in the city all night, as the steamer would leave at 3 o'clock. Now, Mr. Editor, we ask who is responsible for this sudden change of time table? Surely, after waiting most of the summer for the steamers to begin their regular trips, it is too bad that no sooner has she begun, after being laid up for repairs, than her usefulness is destroyed by the change in her time. The country is paying for the support of a large expensive steamer, manned by a large crew, and yet the people cannot make a trip in the afternoon of a market day and return. Is this as it should be? We look for more efficient service in this line under our new Commissioner of Public Works.
