Local and Other Items.

SNOW.—From three to five inches of snow is reported all over northern Wisconsin and Michigan.

REFINERY CLOSED.—A London despatch says that in consequence of the prevailing high prices for raw sugar, the largest refinery in Greenock has been closed.

FOREIGN LABOR.—It is said that large numbers of French and Italian workmen are arriving in Nova Scotia to work on the Cape Breton and Chignecto ship railways.

QUEEN'S BIRTHDAY.—It has been decided to observe the Queen's Birthday on Saturday next, and a proclamation to that effect has been issued by the Lieutenant-Governor.

A STRANGE SHIPMENT.—The Government steamer Newfield sailed from Halifax for Sable Island, on Wednesday. Among her cargo were fifty cats. They are to be used for killing the rabbits which overrun the Island.

ALL IN A BUNCH.—About 200 male and female converts of Jno. Jasper's great revival, which is now in progress in Richmond, Va., were baptised in the James river, on Sunday. Ten thousand people witnessed the ceremony.

THE PORTA DAMAGED.—A Halifax despatch of the 16th says: The steamer Porta, Capt. Ash, arrived in port to-night, from St. John's, Nfld. She went ashore on Thursday, and remained some time. She was not deeply loaded, having only about 1,100 barrels of cargo on board. After pumping out her ballast tank she came off. The damage sustained is not known. The portwardens will hold a survey.

LEPROSY IN BRITISH COLUMBIA.—Says the Nanaimo Courier: Considerable discussion over the question of leprosy among the Chinese in this province has been indulged in by the different newspapers, and the attention of the proper authorities has been directed to the fact that this loathsome disease does exist among the people. A Chinaman suffering from leprosy was brought down from Comox recently. It is said that he has this disease in a most malignant form and that he is indeed a sickening sight. The local authorities will look into the matter.

CANADIAN CATTLE.—A London cable of the 16th says: The Canadian cattle season is opening well. The Lake Nepigon's cargo of 300 head met a ready sale, and not a beast was lost on the voyage. The Lake Superior, with 600, is expected in a few days. The idea prevails in some quarters here that prices will be much higher than last season but the Canadian Gazette refers to the enormous imports of frozen mutton and beef, and warns the Dominion exporters to avoid a speculative rush on stock or space.

News Notes.

The steamship Abyssinian, which left Vancouver on Tuesday last, had 1,210 bales of cotton for Shanghai and 13,400 sacks of flour for Hong Kong.

Portugal will send delegates to the International Anti-Slavery Congress which will be held in August, in accordance with the arrangements of Cardinal Lavie.

The idea of holding a World's Fair in New York in 1892 to commemorate the four hundredth anniversary of the discovery of America, is being mooted in that city.

The Toronto Mail's exception to the form of plea in the Jesuits case has been dismissed, and all issues have been struck off except in so far as they refer to the unconstitutionality of the Act of incorporation and the oath published. An appeal will be taken.

Suicide at Lower Grand River.

Quite a gloom was cast over the settlement of Lower Grand River when, on Thursday morning, it was known that Mrs. George Robertson had committed suicide. The deceased was naturally a very clever, intelligent, and high-spirited woman; but, owing to trouble of one kind or another, she had been for the last few years in a melancholy state of mind. For a length of time the family kept a strict watch over her, but as she complained bitterly on account of it, and as there appeared to be no special reason to suspect any harm to herself or others, they were thrown off their guard. Of late she gave evidence of improvement, and the day before committing the fatal deed she appeared in very good spirits, in fact, almost well. But some time before daylight on the morning of the 9th inst. she left her house, and taking a ladder which lay some distance from the barn, she leaned it against the barn; then fastening a cord to her neck and its other end to one of the upper rounds, let herself drop. When found by her husband, a little after daylight, life was extinct. She was 55 years of age, and leaves a husband and ten of a family to mourn their sad bereavement.

For many years she had been a consistent member of the Presbyterian Church, and was universally respected by all who knew her. Belonging as she did to one of the most respectable families of Dundas, much sympathy is felt both on their account as well as on account of her own family. Her remains were interred in the graveyard at Lower Grand River followed by a large number of people.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

APPOINTMENT.—Messrs. Atinour & Co., the Chicago meat firm, have appointed Mr. Fred. J. Hall to look after the business in this city. Mr. Hall says he will be enabled to give at 10 o'clock each morning the quotations of plate beef and pork as they are reported in Chicago.—St. John Tel. May 13.

SIR.—Herewith I enclose a cutting from the Telegraph, of the 13th inst., in reference to the sale of Chicago beef in St. John. For some years past, pork in large quantities has been imported into this city from the United States. Now we have fresh beef.

As to pork, the Chicago article is put up in better barrels and better shape, but the meat is not as good as the Island article. Still, in the face of a stiff duty, it comes. If the duty were taken off how then? Some of the supporters of your local M. P. can ponder this question.

I have an idea that your shippers do not pay enough attention to the needs of the small local markets. Small towns cannot readily absorb cargo lots of produce; and even pretentious cities, like St. John, can only absorb a limited quantity of produce at a time. "A little and often" should be the rule. Lower rates of freight and better and quicker means of transit over Maritime railways is required. But even with these, enterprise is and will be required; and the employment of the hoarded wealth of your Province in developing its industries, of which agriculture must always stand first. There is a good deal of the abomination known as "pure American leaf lard," a mixture, often of cotton seed oil, and grease and some hog's fat, sold here. People would prefer the Island product if put up in attractive shape, as the other stuff is. For proof, I refer to an examination of pork packers before a committee of the Massachusetts House of Representatives in 1888. Why do not your farmers club together and build some creameries? Creamery-made butter and cheese are of uniform quality, and are readily saleable at higher prices than common dairy butter.

Now, I am not in the produce business, but I do not want to be compelled to use Chicago beef and lard when I know that P. E. Island, next door, produces a better article—which could be shipped to Maritime cities if better business methods prevailed. Negligence in packing, shipping poor goods, poor packages, irregular business methods, such as selling goods and failing to deliver, promptly, the leaving of letters unanswered, and a general slipshod way of doing things. This is the system that puts P. E. Island potatoes, eggs, butter and hay at or near the foot of the market, when they ought to be near the top.

I want to hear of my old farmer friends as growing rich and prosperous. The country is all right, and Providence helps those who help themselves.

Bishop's Death.

SERIOUS ACCUSATIONS OF THE MIND READER'S WIFE AND MOTHER.

The wife and mother of Washington Irving Bishop, the mind reader, claim that Bishop was not dead, but merely in a trance when the physicians made their post mortem examination, and that his death was caused by surgical instruments. It seems that but four hours elapsed from the time of his reported death until Drs. Irwin, Ferguson and House were making a post mortem examination of the body. The widow of the mind reader states that he had suffered several times from cataleptic attacks, and that he had lain in a trance apparently dead for periods varying from 6 to 52 hours. On one occasion in March she says the physicians pronounced him dead, and preparations were advised for his interment, but in a little over two days he recovered. About two years ago Bishop, while suffering with dangerous illness, was treated by Dr. Robertson in New York. While at the doctor's house he had a cataleptic attack and remained in a trance-like condition for two days. The physicians who performed the autopsy, however, say there can be no possible doubt of Bishop's death before the autopsy was decided upon.
