Historic Mission Of St. Alexis, Rollo Bay



St. Alexis Church, built in 1853, enlarged in 1870; now the Parish Hall.

When in 1755 the edict went forth, which commanded the expulsion of the Acadians from Grand Pre on the shores of Bay of Fundy, six families, more fortunate than the others, managed to keep together. They did not repair to the church, but concealed themselves in the woods and from their hiding place saw their large canoe called Pirogues or dug outs, they made their way across the strait to the Ile St. Jean and landed at Pointe Prime. These people were John and Ambrose Bourque and their families, Joseph Pitre and family, Honore Michael, a blacksmith, and wife, Chaisson and family. When they arrived at Pointe Prime Mr. Chaisson addressed them in many happy words. They then knelt and gave thanks to God for having delivered them, and bringing them to a place of refuge. After this, so tradition says, Pind could, in cheer everybody. Pind could, in short sojourn at Pointe Prime that they were not safe from the English, who at that time frequented Port La Jolie, they took their canoes and paddled up to Bay Fortune where they were joined by five or six families from St. Peter's Harbour. These people had been suffering from the measles when their unfortunate countrymen were shipped from St. Peter's, and being ill to be moved, escaped expropriation. A few families of Chiverlies, D'Aigles and others who were concealed, or lived at Savage Harbour removed later to Little River, to the south of Bay Fortune, (now Little Pond Parish). During the first few years that these Acadians spent in Bay Fortune they refused to take the oath of Allegiance and were regarded as prisoners of war. Every spring officers from Port-La-Jolie would come to take an account of the seed that they sowed and in the Autumn would relieve them of their hardly won crops, leaving them barely sufficient to sustain life through the winter. As fast as the grain was threshed, would conceal a portion of it in their clothing and carry it away to the woods, where they would hide it, and thus secure an extra store. After some years, having taken the oath of Allegiance, they were permitted to have undisputed possession of the land.

Knights Of Columbus Convention At Souris

District Deputy Leo F. MacDonald of Charlottetown was unanimously elected state deputy of the Prince Edward Island Knights of Columbus State Council, at the annual meeting held Wednesday in Souris. Retiring state deputy, M. J. McQuaid of Souris, presided. Attending were delegates from the three Island councils and members from various parts of the Province. Plans were made regarding the boys' camp at Rustico and it was hoped to liquidate the balance of the capital debt on the camp. The financial statement of the camp showed that during the past summer it had operated at a profit. Reports from the various councils indicated that the Order was in a sound and healthy condition in this Province, with all councils showing additional members for the past year. A resolution was passed commending the government for the steps taken to ban immoral comic books and indecent literature in Prince Edward Island and strongly recommending the government to continue its good work along this line. Plans were made for the formation of chapters of the Columbian Squires in Prince Edward Island and a committee will be appointed to go into this project. The date of the 1954 convention was set for the last Wednesday in May, at the Knights of Columbus Home in Charlottetown. Other officers of the state were re-elected as follows: State treasurer, Charles Boylan, Souris; state secretary, George Cheverie, Charlottetown; state advocate, George Glow, Summerside; state warden, Ben Callaghan, Charlottetown-Souris.

The death occurred at the King's County Memorial Hospital on Wednesday of Mr. Hillis MacDonald of Greek River, at the age of 51 years. The deceased was the son of John A. MacDonald of Greek River. He leaves to mourn, besides his sorrowing widow (nee Lexie Henderson) of Murray Harbour North, two sons, Carl and Jimmie, of Greek River; two brothers, Newell and Artemas of Alliston, and one sister, Lauretta, Mrs. Raymond Reynolds, Murray Bay. The funeral will be held Saturday afternoon at 2:30 from Peter's Road Presbyterian Church.

A special meeting of the Montague Town Council was held in the council room last night with Mayor B. H. Peo presiding. Present were Councillors MacGowan, Reynolds and Hessian. Mayor Peo reported that certain streets in the town were in the process of being prepared and gravelled by the Poole and Beer Construction Co. Mayor Peo also announced that the new 10 by 16 foot sign for Montague to be placed at Wood Islands had been ordered, and that the site for the sign had been prepared. He also said that a new Union Jack had been purchased for the Town Hall, and that the staff and pulleys were being prepared. On motion it was decided to ask the members of the Fire Department to decorate their main street for the coronation activities since they possessed the necessary ladders and equipment. The newly gravelled Market Road from the New Road to Queen's Road is being prepared for paving this year. Mayor Peo announced that Councillor Green was appointed temporary chairman of the street committee following the resignation of Councillor Jamieson, who was appointed chairman of the light and sanitation committee.

Death Of Mr. C.A. Steele, Gaspereaux

The death occurred at his home in Gaspereaux on Wednesday of Charles A. Steele at the age of 73 years, after a lengthy illness. The late Mr. Steele was a veteran of the First World War, having joined the 98th regiment and later the 102nd. Following hostilities, he returned to Gaspereaux where he took up farming and fishing. C. Knight, Georgetown. The funeral will be held this morning at 9 o'clock from St. Paul's Church, Sturgeon.
